Did Bangladesh's tendency to experiment get the better of them? With Tamim Iqbal rested and four debutants included in the squad, that was the most popular

question doing the rounds in the press box after the Tigers endured a thumping defeat in the third T20I against Zimbabwe at the Sheikh Abu Naser Stadium in Khulna yesterday.

While Bangladesh skipper Mashrafe Bin Mortaza did admit that it was always going to be 'difficult' to win the game with the new players in the squad, he blamed his side's inability to play as per the plan for the defeat. "From the outside it will seem like that

because we had four new players and a change. But honestly speaking these players were asked to be mentally prepared in the last few days. "On the whole, we weren't

up to the mark and we couldn't execute our plans," said Mashrafe.

"As a captain, the biggest thing for me is to win the match and the same goes for

the team. None of us wanted to lose the game," he added.

From promoting debutant Mosaddek Hossain to four to giving Imrul Kayes a go ahead of Tamim Iqbal, the team management, according to Mashrafe, wanted to provide these players with enough game-time surprised with the hosts employing so many in order to test them.

Mohammad Shahid, Abu Haider and Muktar Ali were the three other debutants.

"I don't want to name players and speak about their performances individually. Four of them have just started their careers. But it was a little difficult to observe all these players in a single T20 encounter," said Mashrafe.

The skipper also said that the rains had made things a bit difficult for the hosts.

"The ball started gripping a lot more in the second innings and that made it difficult for us to chase," said Mashrafe.

Zimbabwe batsman Malcolm Waller though disagreed with Mashrafe and said that the visitors faced difficulties as well since their bowlers couldn't grip the ball properly.

The Zimbabwean further said that the victory had lifted the spirit of his team, which had been desperately hunting for a win.

"It's very nice. The guys are very happy. Back in the change room there are lots of smiles and laughter. I think in the last few days we had games that we probably should have won and didn't quite get over the line."


The Zimbabwean believes that the visitors

Former Galle curator banned

The International Cricket Council on Wednesday imposed a three-year ban on top Sri Lankan official Jayananda Warnaweera for failing to cooperate with an anti-corruption investigation.

The world governing body said Warnaweera, a former Test player who was already facing a two-year domestic ban over allegations of involvement in match-fixing, had failed to attend interviews with its anti-corruption unit (ACU).

"Warnaweera failed, on two separate occasions, to attend a scheduled interview with the ACU in relation to an ongoing investigation and failed to provide documents required from him in connection with the investigation," the ICC said in a statement.

There was no immediate comment from Warnaweera, the former curator of the Galle International Stadium.

'It's anyone's game'

Any team could win the upcoming Under-19 World Cup, said Zimbabwean U-19 cricket team captain Brandon Mavuta.

"Now it is a tournament. It's any day, any game. It's anyone's game now. It's not like [it's] your home, you win obviously," he said, alluding to the home advantage of the Bangladesh U-19 team.

The captains of three participating teams in the upcoming U-19 world cup, beginning across the country from January 27, shared their opinions about the tournament in the press conference held at a Chittagong hotel yesterday afternoon.

Of the three teams, England and Namibia arrived in the port city yesterday morning while Zimbabwe came on Tuesday night.

England skipper Brad Taylor said, "We are excited about the tournament. We have prepared for a long time. It's a great opportunity to share skills with some of the best players of the world.

"We have plenty of options for subcontinent pitches. Of course we have had lots of practice playing in Sri Lanka pre-Christmas and playing against India in the tri-nation series. That gives us some of the best chances in the subcontinent. We have some talented seam bowlers and some talented batsmen." He made special mention right-handed opener Daniel Lawrence -- who has played first-class cricket for Essex -- and left-arm seamer Sam Karren.

According to the England captain, the Indian team will be the most challenging opponent in the tournament.

Zimbabwean captain Mavuta, on the other hand, thought that England will be the toughest opponent in their group.

Zane Green, the Namibia skipper, categorised the home side as being one of the toughest propositions for his side. "Anything can happen in Cricket. Bangladesh would be the team to watch with their home advantage," he said.

16 teams will play a total of 40 matches in the 20day tournament ending on February 14.

Shakib in elite club

Despite Bangladesh's defeat yesterday there were a couple of landmarks worth mentioning that were aced during the match.

Ace all-rounder Shakib Al Hasan, who had finished with figures of three for 32, took his 400th international wicket during the game. His 400th victim was Richmond Mutumbami whom he dismissed in the ninth over. He now has a total of 402

formats. Having surpassed the 400-wicket barrier, he has become only the sixth player to score more than 8000 runs and

wickets, a tally that includes wickets taken in all the three

scalp 400 wickets in international cricket. He joins a club that includes Jacques Kallis, Sanath Jayasuriya, Shahid Afridi, Kapil Dev and Chris Cairns.

Kallis tops the list with more than 25,000 runs and 577 wickets, followed by Jayasuriya's 21032 runs and 440 wickets. However, Shakib's next target would be overcoming Chris Cairns who has 8273 runs and 420 wickets.

The other achievement belonged to Sabbir Rahman. Sabbir has scored 139 runs in the three matches of this series and averages 69.50 at the moment. He has now scored the highest number of runs in a T20I bilateral series for Bangladesh.

He needs to score 48 more runs in the next match to be Bangladesh's highest run-getter in any T20I tournament. That's a record which currently Shakib holds. He scored 186 runs in seven matches during the ICC World Twenty 20

in Bangladesh back in 2014. The final T20I will take place tomorrow.
