# U-19s warm up with easy win

Nazmul Hossain hit a hundred and followed it up with some economical bowling as Bangladesh Under-19s won their first

warm-up match of the ICC Under-19 World Cup against Zimbabwe quite convincingly, by 63 runs at the Zahur Ahmed Chowdhury Stadium in Chittagong yesterday.

After deciding to bat first, Bangladesh lost an early wicket when William Mashinge, who returned with bowling figures of 5-67, trapped Saif Hasan in front for six but Pinak Ghosh and Joyraz Sheik steadied the ship, adding 62 runs for the second wicket.

But it was Nazmul's 103-ball 102 that enabled the home team to post the challenging total of 284. Nazmul smashed five fours and a six. Later Nazmul also contributed with the ball as he conceded

only 15 runs in his four-over spell.

In reply, Ryan Murray scored an unbeaten 123 but the lack of support from the other batsmen saw Zimbabwe finish their 50 overs on 221 for seven.

In the day's other warm-up matches, Afghanistan beat Ireland by 126 runs at BKSP-3, India thrashed Canada by 372 runs at BKSP-4, England beat Namibia by 155 runs in Chittagong, Pakistan beat Nepal by 110 runs at BKSP-1 and Sri Lanka beat New Zealand by four wickets at BKSP-2.

# 'Experiments shouldn't disrupt balance'

Bangladesh dropped down a place in the ICC T20I rankings to stand at number eleven after their two consecutive defeats against Zimbabwe at Khulna. This was one frustrating statistic apart from their disappointment over sharing the four-match T20I series against Zimbabwe, who came here following ODI and T20I

series defeats to Afghanistan.

As it was a series of experimentation for the Tigers, chief selector Faruque Ahmed was not keen to focus too much on the results or the demotion in the rankings but the former national skipper raised a question about the manner in which the team management chose to go about experimenting during the series.

"Expectations are high but the reality is that we are not good in T20 cricket as we are in ODI cricket. It was not a series where we set our target to win; rather our focus was experiment with the composition of the side. It's not like we were in the top spot and the series loss took us to the bottom, so I am not interested in the rankings. We are now searching for a good combination; it will experiment: Faruque Ahmed not be achieved overnight and will take some time to find the right one," said Faruque.

"But we should be careful about what experimenting actually means. My personal opinion is you should not experiment by disrupting the balance of the team, which is what happened, especially in the third game against Zimbabwe. You can try one or two players in a game to discover alternatives like we did before the 2015 World Cup," he continued.

Faruque however said that there were some positives in the drawn series and he reserved high praise for Sabbir Rahman's efforts in the series and the way the right-hander capitalised on his promotion to the top order.

"I don't think our experiment was totally unfruitful. We tried some new players and got some ideas about them, though it's too early to come to any conclusion about any player. See, Sohan (Nurul Hasan) did a decent job behind the stumps and I am really impressed with the batting of Sabbir

up the order. Actually we have to find the right combination if we want to be a strong team in this format. At this moment I am not thinking about Bangladesh's result in T20 cricket; I am looking forward to shape a good, competitive team," said Faruque.

With the current state of affairs, how can Bangladesh achieve a measure of T20 success? Faruque has a very simple recipe for that.

"Our style of playing is not suiting this format. For example we don't have big hitters who can change the complexion of the game batting at number five or six. So we can play to our strengths. We can improve our bowling and fielding. And in batting we should be calculating instead of trying to hit every ball," he suggested.

Bangladesh will now start the long preparation in Khulna and Chittagong for the Asia Cup and the ICC World Twenty20 and play some practice matches among themselves so that the team management can get some more ideas before the two mega events. The chief selector however cautioned against any high expectations from T20 cricket for the moment.

## Chanderpaul calls time

Veteran West Indies batsman Shivnarine Chanderpaul, the seventh highest Test match run maker in history, announced his international retirement on Friday, 22 years after his debut.

The 41-year-old former captain from Guyana ends his Test career on 11,867 runs, just 86 short of the West Indies all-time record held by Brian Lara.

Chanderpaul, a gritty and stubborn lefthander, made his debut against England in March 1994, in Guyana, hitting a halfcentury as the West Indies won by an innings and 44 runs.

His final Test was also against England last May in Barbados where the West Indies won by five wickets to level a three-Test series against Alastair Cook's side.

Chanderpaul's highest score in his 164 Tests was 203 not out -- he achieved that figure twice, against Bangladesh in Mirpur in 2012 and South Africa in Georgetown in 2005 and he finished with an average of 51.37.

He hit a total of 30 Test centuries and 66 fifties.

Possibly, his finest moment came in 2003 when he made 104 as the West Indies successfully chased a world-record 418 for victory in the final Test against Australia in Antigua.

But the writing was on the wall for Chanderpaul when he was dropped for the two-Test series against Australia in June last year after making just 92 runs in the three Tests against England.

In his last 10 Test innings, he reached 50 just once.

Chanderpaul posted a top score of 150 in his 268 ODIs, finishing with an average of 41.60 with his last 50-over match coming in the 2011 World Cup quarter-final loss to Pakistan in Dhaka.

He made 8,778 one-day international runs with 11 centuries.

Chanderpaul also played 22 times for the West Indies in the Twenty20 format, but his last outing was in 2010.

"The West Indies Cricket Board (WICB) acknowledges the invaluable contribution Shiv has made to the game globally and we wish him all the best," said WICB President Dave Cameron.


Despite his international retirement, Chanderpaul has still been featuring for his regional team. Last week, he was part of the Guyana side that lost in the semi-finals of the domestic 50-over tournament to Trinidad. Such was his determined nature at the crease

that Australian spin bowling legend Shane Warne once famously described him as "a bloke you needed to crowbar away from the crease."

and Mitchell Marsh (102 not out). But after losing all four previous games in the five-match series -- despite scoring over 300 runs three times and 295 on the other -- India avoided a whitewash when they reached 331 for

four with two balls remaining. Pandey, who only came into the

team because of an injury to Ajinkya Rahane, was in magnificent touch as he brought up his maiden ODI century from only 81 balls.

The 26-year-old hit eight fours and one six as he teamed with Rohit Sharma (99) and Dhoni (34) to guide India to victory.

These four clubs are expected to spend big to sign the national team players as well as those on the fringes of the
