Think about cops' work setting before bashing them

Police chief urges all STAFF CORRESPONDENT

Inspector General of Police AKM Shahidul Hoque yesterday urged people to consider the environment police work in and other barriers they face before criticising them.

"I will request you to consider the work environment of police, working hours, uneven police to population ratio, shortage of equipment and vehicles, and people's tendency to break law and not cooperate with the force," he said.

The police chief said unprofessional attitudes and degeneration of a few policemen affected the force's reputation, and it would not take responsibility for those individual offenders.

His comments came amid a series of allegations against cops for torturing and threatening people with implicating them in false cases and also taking their lives.

The IGP was speaking at a press briefing at the Police Headquarters in the capital to inform the media about the Police Week which starts at the Rajarbagh Police Lines tomorrow.

This year 102 police personnel will receive awards including Bangladesh Police Medal (BPM) and President Police Medal (PPM) for their courageous roles.

Answering to a query, the IGP said police members faced allegations like power abuse, corruption, misbehaving with citizens, negligence in duty, and leaving duty without informing superiors in the past while departmental action was taken against them.

Reveals BWDB, IWM scientific study, mathematical model

Bangladesh's coastal districts will experience increased salinity by 2050, revealed a scientific study and a mathematical modelling.

"Groundwater salinity in almost all coastal districts would increase to 2 ppt (parts per thousand, a measure of salinity) in dry seasons from 0-1 ppt at present," Institute of Water Modelling (IWM) Senior Specialist Goutam Chandra Mridha explained to The Daily Star.

Besides, salinity will be prevalent up to 65 kilometres upstream from the sea, badly affecting Patuakhali, Barisal,

Bhola, Barguna and Jhalakathi while surface water salinity of Satkhira, Khulna and Bagerhat would also increase from 25 ppt to 35 ppt by 2050, he said.

The hydrogeological study, investigation and resource assessment in 19 coastal districts were carried out by Bangladesh Water Development Board (BWDB) which is funded under the Ministry of Environment and Forests' Climate Change Trust Fund.

It was done under a project which included the mathematical modelling carried out by IWM, a trust affiliated with the Ministry of Water Resources.

Madhusudan's 192nd birthday today

The 192nd birth anniversary of Michael Madhusudan Dutt, one of the most famous poets and dramatists in Bangla literature, is being celebrated today with President Abdul Hamid and Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina paying rich tributes in separate messages.

A weeklong Madhu Mela (fair) began from January 22 at his birthplace, Sagardari under Jessore's Keshabpur upazila.

The Jessore district administration arranged programmes including puppet shows, jatra and circus performances, traditional sports, cultural programmes, seminars and discussions on his life and works.

Born to a Hindu Bangalee family, Madhusudan aspired to be like an Englishman and converted to Christianity, to the ire of his family, as a young man and adopted his first name.

Later in life, the father of Bangla sonnets regretted his attraction to England and ardently mentioned of his homeland in his poems and sonnets.

He is specially known for the famous tragic epic Meghnad Bodh Kabya (The Saga of Meghnad's Killing) (1861), which is exceptional in Bangla literature in style and content.

He passed away at Kolkata General Hospital on June 29, 1873 and was buried at Park Street, Kolkata, India.
