# PRECIOUS TOPSOIL burnt for bricks

Farmers forced to sell it to kiln owners, resulting in loss of agricultural productivity

At least 500 bighas of prime farmland loses productivity in five upazilas of Lalmonirhat every year, as their topsoil is sold to feed around 40 local brick Local farmers have alleged that they are often pressed to sell valuable

But a farmer can grow up to three crops a year and can make much more money than what he gets from the sale of topsoil of each bigha of land, said Ishaque.

This is happening not only in Lalmonirhat, but also in many other parts of the country. Most of around 7,000 brick kilns across the country use topsoil to make bricks.

#### Tk 1 crore or more in 1.14 lakh accounts

There are 1.14 lakh bank accounts in commercial banks having Tk 1 crore or more each as of December last year, Finance Minister AMA Muhith told parliament yesterday.

The number of such accounts was 1.8 lakh in 2014, 98,591 in 2013, 90,655 in 2012 and 78,150 in 2011, he added.

Replying to lawmakers' queries, he said four out of 56 commercial banks in the country incurred losses in 2015.

The four are Basic Bank, Bangladesh Krishi Bank, ICB Islami Bank and National Bank of Pakistan. They incurred losses of

# Khaleda sued for sedition

Court summons her after a lawyer files case over comments on number of Liberation War martyrs

A Dhaka court yesterday summoned BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia to appear before it on March 3 in a sedition case filed for her remarks on the number of Liberation War martyrs.

Momtaz Uddin Ahmad Mehedi, a Supreme Court lawyer and member of the ruling Awami League's central committee, filed the case in the morning with approval from the home ministry.

In the case statement, he alleged that Khaleda at a programme on December 21 last year said, "There

are controversies over exactly how many were martyred in the Liberation War. There are also many books and documents on the controversies".

Momtaz appealed to the court to issue an arrest warrant for the BNP chief. Metropolitan Magistrate Rashed Talukder passed yesterday's order after recording the statement of Momtaz, a former secretary of the Supreme Court Bar Association. The magistrate also said he took cognizance of the sedition charge.

The BNP protested it, saying the case was nothing but a mockery.

## 62kg gold seized in Dhaka, Ctg

Customs officials and detectives seized around 61.7kg of gold in separate drives in Dhaka and Chittagong yesterday. In Dhaka, customs officials seized 280

gold bars weighing around 32.7kg from a Malindo Air flight at Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport last night.

On information, a team of customs officials searched the aircraft that landed at the airport around 11:15pm from Malaysia, and recovered the gold, worth around Tk 16.5 crore, wrapped in black tape under passenger seats, Shahiduzzaman Sarker, assistant commis-

sioner of customs, told The Daily Star. Meanwhile, the detective branch of

police in Chittagong recovered 250 gold bars weighing around 29kg from a market in the port city.

### What steps taken against air pollution?

HC asks govt to report on Dhaka, Gazipur, N'ganj cities

The High Court yesterday demanded an explanation from the authorities concerned as to what steps had been taken to prevent air pollution in four city corporation areas, including Dhaka north and south.

A report has to be submitted by February 25 on the measures taken to remove dust, smoke and other deadly elements from air, which have been causing damage to public health in Dhaka North, Dhaka South, Gazipur and Narayanganj city corporations, it said.

The order came in response to a writ petition by Supreme Court lawyers Zulhas Uddin Ahmed and Md Mojibur Rahman.

The lawyers drew the court's attention to a World Bank report, according to which 15,000 people die and 65 lakh people's health is affected in Bangladesh every year due to air pollution.

In the petition submitted on January 17, they also said city corporation sweepers abruptly sweep roads between 7:00am SEE PAGE 2 COL 5

#### Dusty streets in city pose health risks

Dry weather, compounded by waning greenery and heavy construction work, has turned Dhaka's air seriously polluted.

Doctors say the high level of air pollution has increased number of patients with coughing and breathing problems in winter.

The capital city's air is thick with dust due to construction of residential buildings and a number of flyovers, and digging of roads for installing utility lines.

Locals in different city areas have said most of these "development works" are done without spraying any water to mini-

"Although these problems are not serious in nature, prolonged exposure to dusty air may lead to lung cancer or interstitial lung disease (ILD)," Kazi S Bennoor, assistant professor of respiratory medicine at National Institute of Diseases of Chest and Hospital (NIDCH), tells The Daily Star.

ILD reduces the amount of oxygen in the body, and can cause death, he says.

"Both the toxic air and dust pollution can cause diseases like asthma, bronchitis, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, nasal allergy and rhintis," he says, adding two more diseases, silicosis and asbestosis, have also increased recently.
