Islamabad violated Geneva convention

Dhaka alleges in protest note over picking up of its mission staffer in Pakistan

Dhaka has accused Islamabad of violating the Geneva convention by picking up an official of Bangladesh High Commission in Pakistan and detaining him for around seven hours on Monday.

The Pakistani plainclothesmen had forcibly picked up and detained Jahangir Hossain, a personal officer of the Bangladesh mission's Press Wing, the Bangladesh foreign ministry said in its protest note, handed over to Pakistan High Commissioner to Bangladesh Shuja Alam on Tuesday.

Citing the protest note, official sources said the Pakistani law enforcers, instead of giving security and protection to the High Commission official, "dangerously" harassed Jahangir, and they did not reveal their identity while detaining him.

They way the Pakistani plainclothesmen detained Jahangir Hossain is "very alarming and matter of grave concern", it said.

Pakistan High Commission staffer Abrar Ahmed Khan in Dhaka. They also handed him over to the High Commission, unlike the Pakistani plainclothesmen who dropped Jahangir off at an unknown place, the protest note stated.

The foreign ministry also strongly condemned the Pakistan mission for issuing a press release even after Abrar Khan's release, and for bringing "gross allegations" against the Detective Branch (DB) personnel.

The allegation that the DB men had asked for Tk 5 crore from Abrar and threatened to kill him otherwise was a blatant lie and went beyond any decency, the protest note says.

It also criticised the Pakistan foreign ministry and other authorities for "failing" to give any clue when Jahangir went missing.

PAY SCALE DEMAND

University teachers sit today for review

They returned to classes from work stoppage on Jan 20 after PM assured them of addressing their grievances

The Federation of Bangladesh University Teachers Association (FBUTA) will hold a general meeting today at Dhaka University Teacher's Club to review the "government's progress" in fulfilling their demands over the 8th national pay scale.

After observing work stoppage for seven days over "discriminations" in the new pay scale, public university teachers returned to classes on January 20 as Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina assured them of a "quick solution".

"After reviewing the government's progress in meeting our demands, we will fix our next course of action at the meeting," Prof Farid Uddin Ahmed

told The Daily Star. Asked if there is any visible progress, he said, "Some secretaries are trying to foil the fulfilment of our demands

about it. ASM Maksud Kamal, secretary

general of FBUTA, said they me several times with authorities concerned, including the ministries of finance, education ministry and University Grand Commission after January 19.

Hopefully, he said, there will be a solution within a month.

FBUTA earlier placed a package proposal to the education ministry, suggesting that 25 percent professors should be given grade-I status while 5 percent distinguished professors whose salaries and status would be equivalent to senior secretaries.

Public university teachers have been pressing for a four-point charter of demand, including removal of the "discrepancies" in the pay scale. Things turned worse after the government issued a gazette on the pay scale on December 15. Frustrated with the pay scale for not having time scale and though the government is sincere selection grade, teachers of all 37 public universities began an indefinite strike on January 11.

"We welcome the government's intervention. But we do not know how or when the schools will return the money," he added.

However, school authorities were clearly not happy with the decision.

Some of them said they would discuss the matter with the school managing committees before making a decision.

"We will have to return money if the education ministry asks us. But it will not be possible to run the institution further if the government takes decisions hearing one side only," Abul Hossain, principal of the Willes school, told The Daily Star.

The school increased tuition fees by 45 percent for Bangla medium students and 61 percent for those studying in English version this year.

"If we do not hike the fees, we will not be able to give the teachers, who are not under the MPO coverage, the facilities like those who get the MPO," the principal said, justifying the fee

"It will create a chaotic situation and many bright teachers will leave this profession," said the princi-

Umme Salma Khatun, principal of Udayan Higher Secondary School and College, said they were respectful to the government decision. "We will have a meeting of the school managing

committee to decide on it." Her school increased tuition fees by 100 percent for Class-I students

and 50 percent for the other classes. "To ensure quality education, we

had no alternative to increasing the tuition fees," she argued.

A number of other renowned private schools in Dhaka and Chittagong suddenly hiked the monthly tuition and admission fees at the beginning of this year, citing teachers' demand for a pay increase after the government approved the

new pay scale for the public servants.

The fee hikes outraged guardians, who staged demonstrations for two weeks. Following this, the education ministry asked the school authorities to stop collecting the increased fees until further notice.

The Directorate of Secondary and Higher Education (DSHE) in an investigation found seven renowned non-government schools had collected tuition fees hiked by 11 percent to as high as 100 percent.

According to the admission policy, the capital-based Bangla medium schools, which enjoy MPO facilities partially, can charge a student highest Tk 8,000 in monthly fees, session charge and development fees during the admission. Tk 10,000 is the ceiling for the English version schools.

"We want to implement the policy completely," the education minister said during yesterday's briefing.

He mentioned the DSHE had been asked to come up with a complete list of schools that collected extra fees, violating the government's admission policy, and the amount of money they had collected this way.

"For the schools, I suggest they return the money and save their hon-

The government has already prepared a list of institutions that collected SSC exam registration fees much higher than the amount fixed by

the education boards, Nahid said. "The boards will inform us

whether these institutions will return the additional money within seven working days." The minister also urged guardians

to complain to the education ministry or the education boards whenever the schools increase fees

The government would soon hold a review meeting to discuss whether it was necessary to increase the fees, Nahid added.

Japan military on alert; Beijing joins chorus of int'l condemnation

North Korea plans

AFP, Seoul

China yesterday joined the global chorus of anger and concern over a planned rocket launch by North Korea, while Japan vowed to shoot down any missile that threatened its territory.

The reactions followed Tuesday's confirmation by Pyongyang that it would launch a rocket sometime between February 8-25 in what amounts to another major violation of UN resolutions just weeks after its fourth nuclear test.

"We express serious concerns about that," foreign ministry spokesman Lu Kang said in Beijing, calling on Pyongyang to abide by UN strictures forbidding its use of ballistic missile technology -- even for ostensibly peaceful purposes. In South Korea the government

echoed US warnings that the North would pay a "heavy price" if it went ahead, and Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe condemned what he called a "serious provocation". Abe's defence minister issued an

order to "destroy" the rocket with surface-to-air missiles if it violated Japanese airspace.

North Korea said the sole objective was to place an Earth observation satellite into orbit, but analysts saw the launch announcement as doubling down against an international com-

January 6 nuclear test. "It's a classic move," said John Delury, an associate professor at Yonsei University in Seoul.

"While waiting for a full response for the nuclear test, you might as well sneak in a rocket launch. The North tends to do these things in pairs," Delury said

The window dates suggest a launch around the time of the birthday on February 16 of late leader Kim Jong-Il, father of current leader Kim Jong-Un.

The United States, which has been spearheading a diplomatic drive for harsher and more effective sanctions on Pyongyang, was quick to condemn the plan.
