MA Latif earns ire of party colleagues

For 'tampering picture of Bangabandhu'; he calls it conspiracy against him ARUN BIKASH DEY

Leaders of Chittagong city unit Awami League (AL) yesterday declared to take legal and disciplinary actions against MA Latif, an AL lawmaker from Chittagong-11 constituency (Bandar-Halishahar-Patenga), over an allegation of tampering with a picture of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman in festoons and banners, which were hung in Patenga and Bandar areas on the occasion of the prime minister's visit to Chittagong, last Saturday.

They alleged that Bangabandhu's face was tagged with the figure of MA Latif and Latif's name was at the bottom of the festoons. In the image, Bangabandhu's face was used on a body wearing Salwar and sneakers.

Contacted, Latif, who is in the capital now, denied the allegations and termed it as part of a conspiracy against him. "The festoons and banners had been hung three days before the prime minister's arrival. No one raised any questions till Monday and all of a sudden we saw the photo on Facebook on Tuesday," he said, adding, "What is my benefit by tampering the picture of Bangabandhu? I will find

on Facebook, criticisms poured in from different corners.

President of Chittagong city unit AL and former mayor ABM Mohiuddin Chowdhury termed the act as "audacity of Latif".

"We can reach a compromise with everything but not the Liberation War and Bangabandhu," said Vice-President of the AL unit Khorshed Alam Sujan.

Cancer treatment centre needed in every district

Oncologists tell Prothom Alo roundtable

Cancer specialists and health policymakers yesterday agreed that the country needs cancer treatment centres in every district.

Considering the size of the population, Bangladesh needs about 160 cancer treatment facilities across the country, but at present there are 18 facilities, said Sarwar Alam, chairman, Department of Oncology, Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University.

Noting that equipment needed for a cancer centre are very expensive, Health Minister Mohammed Nasim urged the private sector to set up more cancer hospitals.

They were addressing a roundtable discussion on cancer treatment organised by the Prothom Alo at its office in the capital.

"There are many rich people in the country. If they bought the equipment and donated them to the government

hospitals, the poor people would be benefitted," said the minister.

Prof Md Ehteshamul Haque of Anwar Khan Modern Medical College urged the government to reduce tax on importing cancer treatment equipment to reduce the expenses of treatment.

"Specify a national rate for the therapies, medication and other services and reduce tax on anything related to cancer treatment," he said. Sarwar Alam said counterfeit drugs

were a main hurdle for cancer treatment in the country. "The country's cancer specialists have to work in fear of counterfeit drugs."

Parvin Akhter Banu, chief consultant of Delta Medical College, said since cancer treating drugs were expensive, they were more likely to be counterfeited.

"It is most unacceptable because any delay, substandard medication, and wrong treatment can make cancer

incurable," she stressed.

She added that a majority of cancers could be cured if the treatment started at an early stage. "People need to be aware of the disease and where they should go if they have signs and symptoms of cancer."

Ferdous Shahriar Sayeed, consultant of medical oncology at United Hospital, said his patients often brought cancer treating drugs from abroad and asked him to apply those violating the standard protocol of using, carrying and storing of the drugs.

"No physician should apply any drugs that were not brought to the country following standard procedure," he said.

Prof Parvin Shahida Akhter of National Cancer Research Institute said there should be a medical oncology department to look after the storage, application and preparation of cancer drugs.

Rajuk drive against misuse of parking lots resumes in Dhanmondi

Only the Dhanmondi team of Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakkha (Rajuk) could resume its second spell of eviction drive yesterday in a bid to reclaim the basement car parking at buildings along Mirpur Road.

The Dhanmondi, Uttara and Gulshan teams, which were set to carry out a nineday eviction drive, could not carry out the drive on January 26, 27, and 28 due to Rajuk's public hearings and employees' association elections, said sources.

The current drive is scheduled to continue till February 25. The Dhanmondi team partially dismantled illegal structures at the basement of seven buildings, penalised

A Chittagong court yesterday sentenced a man to death on charge of killing his sister in 2008. The Chittagong Divisional Speedy Trial Tribunal's

Judge Mohitul Haque Enam Chowdhury pronounced the verdict convicting Nurul Amin of Chakaria in Cox's Bazar. The court also fined him Tk 5,000 in the same verdict, said court sources.

According to the case statement, Amin on November 26, 2008 hacked his sister Jahanar Begum, 52, to death following a quarrel between their children.

The victim's daughter Kohinur Begum filed a case the same day with Chakaria Police Station in this connection.
