The lawyer asked the IO different questions about his investigation into the

Khaleda could not appear before the court due to her physical illness, said her another lawyer Sanaullah Miah.

With this, Khaleda had skipped trial proceedings in the case for 18 consecutive dates on different excuses.

She appeared before the court on September 10 last year. Later on September 16 last year, she left for London for treatment and returned on November 21 Judge Abu Ahmed

Jomadar of the Special Judge's Court-3 of Dhaka recorded statement of the witness and fixed February 11 for the next hearing. On that day, lawyers for two other accused will crossexamine the IO.

The court also accepted non-appearance of Khaleda yesterday. Earlier the court

recorded statements of 32 prosecution witnesses, including complainant of the case.

The ACC on August 8, 2011 filed the case with Tejgaon Police Station, accusing four persons, including Khaleda, of abusing power to raise fund in the name of Zia Charitable Trust.

TIB citizen group conference urges people

AHSANULLAH MASTER MURDER CASE

HC starts hearing on death reference, pleas

The High Court has started hearing on the death reference and appeals in the case filed for assassinating Awami League lawmaker Ahsanullah Master in Tongi on May, 2004.

The bench of Justice Obaidul Hassan and Justice Krishna Debnath began the hearing on January 21 and continued the proceedings yesterday for third day and fixed February 11 for its resuming, Deputy Attorney General Rona Nahrin told The Daily Star.

DAG Nahrin said she is now reading out the paper book of the case before the HC and will continue doing so for the next few days then the HC will start hearing arguments from the defence counsels. Led by pro-Jatiya Party Jatiya Chhatra Samaj leader Nurul

Islam Dipu, gunmen shot and killed Ahsanullah, also the president of Jatiya Sramik League, and Omar Faruq Ratan, a young man, and wounded 17 others in a staccato burst of fire at a biennial conference of Awami Shechchhasebak League in Noagaon near the legislator's house in Tongi. On April 16, 2005, a Dhaka court gave death sentences to

22 people and life terms to six others for killing Ahsanullah and also similar punishments to the same convicts for gunning down Ratan.

DAG Nahrin said the convicts, who are now behind bars, have filed appeals with the HC at different times seeking acquittal. She could not confirm how many convicted accused are now in jail.

Biopsy samples to be sent to US biologist

Researching on the disease's symptoms for over 20 years, W Martin dinator, Burn & Plastic Surgery Unit, Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH), told The Daily Star yesterday.
