Court takes case against AL MP Latif for "altering Bangabandhu's photo"

Designer takes blame onto himself but Ctg leaders reject claim STAFF CORRESPONDENT, Ctg

A Chittagong court yester-

day took cognisance of the case filed against Awami League lawmaker MA Latif over doctoring of the photo of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman in the festoons and banners, used for welcoming Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina to Chittagong city last week, and asked the Police Bureau of Investigation

(PBI) to investigate. The court of Additional Chief Metropolitan Magistrate of Chittagong Nurul Alam Mohammad Nipu passed the order, said Chittagong Metropolitan Public Prosecutor Fakhruddin Chowdhury.

The court ordered PBI to probe into the matter by an officer of the rank of assistant superintendent of police (ASP) and to submit the report by February 22, the PP added.

Abdur Rahim Zillu, a former leader of Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL), filed the case on February 4 alleging that Latif belittled the whole nation through the photo manipulation, which sparked an outcry among

Jatiya Party's (JP) Parliamentary Party yesterday decided to refrain from attending any meeting called by its Chairman HM Ershad, including today's views-exchange meeting, until JP Presidium Member Raushan Ershad was appointed "co-chairman 1".

The decision was taken at a meeting in Opposition Leader in Parliament Raushan's parliamentary office with her in the chair and 27 MPs in attendance, says a press release, adding that the parliamentary party would protect JP's unity at any cost.

A meeting of the parliamentary party on January 19, in Ershad's presence, had taken three decisions, none of which had been implemented till date, it added.

The first was on cancelling the "unilateral and undemocratic" appointment of GM Quader as co-chairman and

Genocide They Wrote exposes Pakistan once again


There is a long history of Pakistan's efforts to deny its guilt and stop the trial and punishment of the ones involved in the genocide in 1971.

With the help of local collaborators, Pakistan committed atrocities and genocide over nine months in Bangladesh, and 44 years later when these collaborators were tried and punished by the International Crimes Tribunal, Pakistan expressed anxiety for the trial.

The Daily Star Books has published a book, "Genocide They Wrote", to make present and future generations aware about how Pakistan committed the genocide.


Star Books at stall 335-336 in the Amar Ekushey Granthamela. In addition, 28 other books are on

Rajuk drive against misuse of parking lots halts again

None of the three Rajuk eviction teams yesterday could carry out their scheduled eviction drives against illegal establishments in parking lots due to the dearth of required police force.

"Getting police force is difficult and involves a long process in the capital as they remain occupied with various tasks", said Khandokar Zakir Hossain, executive magistrate designated for eviction drive in Uttara.

Executive Magistrate Md Nasir Uddin, designated for the Dhanmondi drive, and Authorized Rajuk Officer Md Adiluzzaman, designated for the Gulshan drive, said they too had to postpone their drives due to lack of adequate supply of police force.

Rajuk following a housing ministry decision launched the drive simultaneously in Gulshan, Dhanmondi and Uttara on January 18 in a bid to reclaim designated basement car parking spaces being illegally used for commercial purposes, and dismantle illegal ramps

Cops accused of not arresting 'abduction mastermind'

Alleges victim's father, says Narayanganj councillor often seen in town

Police are not arresting a Narayanganj councillor of ward 17 although he has been accused in a case of masterminding the abduction of a 19-yearold and is often going to his workplace, alleged the victim's father vesterday.

"If police arrests him, we will get my son back as he, of course, knows my son's whereabouts," Lutfar Rahman told a press briefing in the capital's Crime Reporters

Association of Bangladesh.

After Asif Imran went missing on October 7 last year, Lutfar said to have received calls from unknown numbers demanding from Tk 10 lakh to Tk 20 lakh as ransom at different times.

In the case filed on November 1 last year, Lutfar accused four people -- Alamgir Islam, the councillor; Golam Mostafa Ador, Lutfar's neighbour in Uttara and Asif's friend; Ador's father Golam Mohammad Kalu and Ador's friend Shakil.

Ador had taken Asif, a first-year student of the American International University of Bangladesh, and Shakil to his Paikpara home in Narayanganj on October 7 last year, said the case statement.

Alamgir called up Ador around 4:00pm asking to come over at his Baburail office in Narayanganj, says a letter Ador submitted to the Narayanganj superintendent of police on October 21 seeking Asif's rescue.

60m people face food insecurity in country

Reveals WFP study; another FAO study says 56pc pre-school children underweight; Unicef study claims one-third of reproductive-age women underweight

About 60 million people in rural and urban areas of Bangladesh face food insecurity, and do not consume the minimal daily caloric intake required for a healthy life, according to the World Food Programme.

Almost one-third of all women of reproductive age in the country are extremely underweight, and the analogous condition is prevalent even in the wealthiest section of the society; reveal Unicef data while another study by the Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO) of the United Nations shows that 56 percent of all pre-school children are

underweight. Given such conditions, the Embassy of the Kingdom of the Netherlands will fund three projects in Bangladesh with Tk 150 crore in the next 3 to 4 years to improve food security and enhance nutrition and health

security of the people. The inaugural event of the three projects, titled 'Development Partnership between the Netherlands and Bangladesh: Food Security and Safety, Sexual and Reproductive Health', was held yesterday morning at the Pan Pacific Sonargaon Hotel in the capital.

Of the two food security projects -- 'Krishi Utsho' and 'Making Market Work for Women (MMWW)', the first one will be implemented by CARE Bangladesh while the other one by ActionAid Bangladesh, and an ongoing food safety project being implemented by FAO will be extended.

Being present as the programme's chief guest, Health Minister Md Nasim said, "Though we have achieved self-sufficiency in food, we could not provide food security to people".

"With the projects, we want to contribute to the development of efficient and inclusive value chain to enable farmers to access quality seeds and other inputs, make agroentrepreneurs and improve food safety", said Ambassador of the Netherlands to Bangladesh Leoni Margaretha Cuelenaere while delivering her welcome speech.

Anowarul Haq, director of Extreme Rural Poverty Programme of CARE Bangladesh, said 65000 smallholder farmers, including 26000 women, would be reached out under the Krishi Utsho project through 230 informal shops that sell products including

Qatar to recruit over 3 lakh skilled workers

Says Expatriates' Welfare Minister Nurul Islam

UNB, Dhaka

Minister of Expatriates' Welfare and Overseas Employment Nurul Islam yesterday said Qatar assured him of recruiting over 300,000 skilled Bangladeshi workers in the next two years.

Talking to reporters the same day after his recent visit in Doha, he said a consensus had been reached with the Qatari government during a bilateral meeting on 3 February, and the assurance is seen as a boost for the country's economy, which is heavily dependent on remittances sent by Bangladeshi workers employed abroad.

Qatar was represented by their minister of administrative development, labour and social affairs, Issa Saad Al-Fafali Al-

The minister also added that a bilateral joint committee meeting would be held in Dhaka for the final agreement. The meeting would also revise the cost of sending workers.

He said that due to the upcoming 2022 World Cup, Qatar has great demand of skilled workers and Bangladesh can meet it. Some of the positions in demand include salesmen, nurses, doctors, engineers and office executives. During his meeting at Doha, he urged minister Issa to

come to Dhaka and formally meet with Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina.

Minister Abdullah bin Nasser bin Khalifa Al Thani on 4 February to formally convey Hasina's invitation to Dhaka in March.

The minister also paid a courtesy call to the Qatari Prime
