

But the ministries are slow in utilising the Already different ministries have government's own fund this time compared to the last several years, according to statistics from the Implementation Monitoring and Evaluation Division.

In the first seven months, Tk 19,157 crore very slow. of the government's own resources have been spent, which is 31 percent of the total allocation.

However, during the same period last fiscal year, 33 percent was spent, and 35 percent in the year before.

Every year, ADP allocation was raised bowing to the pressure from the ministries and divisions, but the efficiency of implementation has not been improving to that extent, said a planning ministry official.

The pace of implementation of five out of the ten large ministries and divisions that got 73 percent of the total ADP allocation is

The water resources ministry managed to use up 18 percent of its allocation, energy and mineral resources division 23 percent, health and family welfare ministry 20 percent, bridges division 23 percent, railways ministry 19 percent.

However, the other five ministries' implementation was higher than the average implementation rate.

The power division spent 32 percent, the local government division 40 percent, road transport and highways division 37 percent, primary and mass education ministry 35 percent and education ministry 30 percent.

No progress in Robi, Banglalink audits

The telecom regulator is yet to start the audit process for Banglalink and Robi, in contrast to its tough attitude on the same issue for market leader Grameenphone.

The decision to look into Robi's books and network usage was taken last year, at the same time as Grameenphone's.

Not only has Bangladesh Telecommunication Regulatory Commission signed an agreement with Toha Khan Zaman & Co, a chartered accounting firm, to delve into Grameenphone's books, it also dispatched a warning letter to the telecom company on Wednesday asking it to fully cooperate with the auditors.

But it is yet to ink the agreement with Masih Muhith Haque & Co, the selected auditor for Robi.

Auditing is a very normal process and the regulator needs to run it at regular intervals without any discrimination, said State Minister for Telecom Tarana Halim, while terming the situation an unusual one.

"One operator will face audits while the others will not, this cannot be," she told reporters at her secretariat office in Dhaka yesterday.

Masih Muhith Haque & Co, a chartered accounting firm, was selected through a tender in October, but its appointment was delayed when its Indian partner, TR Chadha & Co, refused to come to Bangladesh.

The company has filed a request with the government to change its foreign partner. "The government recently told us to evaluate the new foreign partner status," a senior official of BTRC said yesterday.

"If the new company qualifies, we can start the audit soon. Otherwise we have to re-tender the job," he added.

The regulator has not however floated the tender for Banglalink's inspection this time, and its last attempt to review the company in 2011 fell through, when the appointed auditor resigned from the task after some time. The BTRC's finance division has refused to float the tender for Banglalink's audit and put the responsibility on the commission's engineering and operation wing instead.

"We are working to start all the auditing processes without further delay. But it is not going as quickly as we had hoped for," said BTRC Chairman Shahjahan Mahmood.

WAREHOUSING PLAN

Garment makers shift focus from Gujarat to West Bengal

Garment makers are no longer interested in setting up a warehouse in the Indian state of Gujarat and are now looking at West Bengal due to its proximity to Bangladesh. FBCCI President Abdul Matlub Ahmad, who has

been lobbying the Indian government for the warehouse in Gujarat, said the facility in Gujarat will not be beneficial for Bangladesh due to the long distance.

Besides, the Indian government is more interested in allocating the land for setting up factories, and not the warehouse, said Siddiqur Rahman, president of Bangladesh Garment Manufacturers and Exporters Association.

"There are a lot of investment opportunities in Bangladesh now."

Earlier, during Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi's visit to Dhaka in June last year, Bangladeshi garment makers demanded 50 acres of land in Gujarat to build a warehouse to supply apparel items directly to retail shops across India.

The plan for warehousing came as Bangladesh seeks to boost its annual garment exports to the Indian market to \$1 billion in three years from present \$100 million.

India is a very big market for Bangladeshi apparel exporters, as its annual retail market size is set to cross the \$40 billion-mark thanks to its growing middle-class, according to the industry insiders.

Setting up the warehouse instead in the Indian state of West Bengal would be commercially viable for Bangladeshi garment makers, said Ahmad, also the immediate past president of the India-Bangladesh Chamber of Commerce and Industry.

Subsequently, he proposed the idea of the warehouse in West Bengal in a business summit last month, and the government of the Indian state also showed interest in

allocating the land for it. If the West Bengal proposal goes ahead the exporters

Panel formed to oversee SIM re-registration

Tarana asks telcos to cooperate with govt

Telecom Minister Tarana Halim yesterday asked mobile operators to cooperate with the government for reregistration of all existing connections through biometric verification. To monitor progress in biometric SIM

registration, the government yesterday formed a two-member committee that will detect any anomalies in the system. If needed, the regulator will even

fine the respective operators, said Tarana, speaking at the inauguration of the website of Bangladesh Telecom Reporters' Network at the secretariat.

"I found several anomalies, such as a lack of biometric machine, and harassment of customers, while visiting many registration centres in the city. So, the committee has been formed to supervise the system."

The committee members are Brig Gen Emdad ul Bari, director general of systems and services department at Bangladesh Telecommunication

Regulatory Commission, and Brig Gen Shaekh-Uz-Zaman, a senior official of National Telecom Monitoring Centre.

Bangladesh's six mobile phone operators began applying biometrics, such as verifying fingerprints, for SIM card verification and re-registration from December 16 last year. There is a lack of publicity over the reregistration process, and so people are not well aware of it, Tarana said.

"We are going through lots of trial and error but the job needs to be completed before the deadline and I am going to be strict on it."

"Initially, there were problems in the Election Commission's server, but everything is okay now with no complaints. So the operators cannot give excuses," she added.

Biometric SIM registration will continue till April this year.

BSEC suspends Ctg bourse's regulatory officer

....... Bangladesh Securities and Exchange Commission has temporarily suspended the chief regulatory officer of the Chittagong Stock Exchange and warned the bourse's chairman not to violate the demutualisation law again in future.

The stockmarket regulator also accepted the resignation letter of CSE Managing Director Wali-ul-Maroof Matin, who stepped down from the post two years ahead of his tenure's expiry over internal conflict.

The BSEC came up with the decisions on Wednesday following a probe report on the conflict between the port city bourse's management and the board of directors.

> Such kind of activities of the chairman and the directors of the board are not acceptable to the regulator in any case, the BSEC said in the letter.

> The CSE board's failure in taking decisions and directions also hampered the discipline of the bourse's management, the regulator said in the letter, while instructing the chairman and other directors of the board to refrain from any such practice in future.

CSE Chairman Muhammad Abdul Mazid was not immediately available for comment.

Research necessary for better energy solutions: PM's adviser

The energy adviser to the prime minister yesterday stressed the need for 'contextual research' on energy solutions to achieve excellence in the power sector.

"We have already formed an energy and power research council. There should be contextual research to know what kind of energy solutions are needed right now," said Tawfiq-e-Elahi Chowdhury.

The government has set a target to ensure access to energy for all in its Vision 2021. "But we are hoping that we can achieve the target even before 2021 -- maybe by

2018 or 2019." Chowdhury was speaking at a seminar on 'energy access versus energy poverty', organised by Sustainable and Renewable Energy Development Authority (SREDA)

at Biddut Bhaban in Dhaka. Presenting a keynote paper on 'multi-tier approach to measuring energy access: progress toward sustainable development goal', SREDA member Siddique Zobair said access to energy is now defined by having electricity or not having electricity.

But under modern definition, access to energy means the ability to use energy for all that is adequate, available when needed, reliable, of good quality, affordable, legal, convenient, healthy and safe, he added.
