ICC lauds hosts Bangladesh

International Cricket Council (ICC) CEO Dave Richardson yesterday

congratulated the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) for successfully hosting the ICC Under-19 World Cup. He said that there was 'no stone left unturned in providing a secure environment'.

"I would like to express our appreciation for the BCB for hosting a very successful event.

Well done, not only to the Bangladesh board but also to the match venues and the practice venues. You can imagine how many of them there are that had to be used, thank you for all of them," said Richardson at a city hotel yesterday.

"One of the most important facets of hosting any event, unfortunately, is the safety and security. In this respect, I'd like to express our appreciation to the prime minister of Bangladesh, the government and all the security agencies who worked together with the ICC and BCB.

"Certainly, for this event, probably more so than any previous event, absolutely no stone was left unturned in providing a secure environment. We realise this was a massive undertaking, some would say even a top one, on the occasion. I don't think we can be too careful with matters of safety and security, and the standards have been set for all our future events going forward," he

Richardson further said that the success of the tournament proved that the ICC had taken the right decision when they allowed the correct decision, and we're

Bangladesh to host the World Cup despite Australia's pullout.

"I think we're very pleased with the fact that we made the decision to carry on with the tournament, despite Australia's decision to withdraw their team. I think the outcomes and the results show that that was the correct decision.

"A member country is not entitled to just withdraw from a tournament, it has to be justified. Now, as to whether Cricket Australia was justified, those questions have already been answered. At this stage, to carry on with the tournament was

pleased with it," said Richardson.

"Another point is we can't force a particular country into competing. It's up to them. As I said, it might run the risk of being in breach of a contract, but that's the decision they need to take," he added.

He also congratulated the West Indian team for winning the championship and putting on a brilliant show.

"We heard lots of rumours and stories about the young people in the Caribbean being attracted to other sports like basketball or football, etc. But I think the talent that we saw during the tourna-

Chance to face T20 demons

Bangladesh national captain Masrafe Bin Mortaza said the Tigers are hopeful of doing well in the upcoming Asia cup despite the fact that they are yet to be sure of their footing in the shortest format like they are in 50-over cricket.

Having won only 15 of their 50 Twenty20 matches, this is the one format where Bangladesh still look like newcomers even with the Asia Cup and the ICC World Twenty20 in India in March around the corner.

"We have had good practice. Everyone is here except Mushfiq [Mushfiqur Rahim], Tamim [Iqbal] and Shakib [Al Hasan]. The others also practised well here," he said while talking to reporters at the Zahur Ahmed Chowdhury Stadium in Chittagong yesterday.

Expectations will be high after the Tigers' home successes last year. While those results came in their favourite 50-over format, this time the Asia Cup will be held in the T20 format.

About Bangladesh's weakness in T20s, he said: "We are not up to the mark in the T20 format. If we can do well here our confidence will increase. We are working towards that aim. We have some experienced players and some youngsters; if they can do well I hope something good will happen."

"We are doing some specific practices and trying to overcome the problems we have in the T20 format," he said, adding that it was natural that fans would come to the matches with high expectations. "We will try to deliver in the match with the same confidence with which we are practising."

Praising the U-19 cricket team the captain said it is a great achievement that they handled the pressure of playing in the country and became the third-placed team in the tournament. He hoped at least four to five cricketers will play in the national team in the future. He also praised Bangladesh U-19 captain Mehedi Hasan Miraz for his achievement of becoming man of the tournament and hoped that the youngster can perform far better for the national team in the future.

One talking point surrounding the Asia Cup is Tamim Iqbal's absence as he is expecting his first child with wife Ayesha Siddika during the tournament and has been granted leave. "His absence is unfortunate for us and for Bangladesh cricket, but obviously family comes first. He will become a father. I think it is necessary for him to stay with family now."

The Bangladesh team have been staying in the port city since February 8 and after today's practice they are scheduled to fly back to Dhaka for final preparations before taking a short break.

The Asia Cup will kick off with the Bangladesh-India match on February 24 at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur.

Everyone except Darren agrees

The threat of the West Indies being forced to field a second string side at the World Twenty20 was averted on Sunday when 12 of 13 players in the original squad signed the contracts which had caused a standoff with the board.

West Indies Cricket Board (WICB) had given the players a deadline of Sunday to agree to the financial terms, which represented a sharp drop in pay compared to previous tournaments, or they would be replaced.

After a week of claim and counterclaim, with plenty of recriminations on both sides, only batsman Darren Bravo declined to take up the deal.

"The West Indies Cricket Board is in receipt of 12 signed contracts from players who were selected for the upcoming 2016 ICC World Twenty20 tournament," the WICB said in a news release on Sunday.

The WICB said that they had not yet decided on a replacement for Bravo. Australia inflicted a crushing innings defeat on New Zealand with a day to spare in the first Test in Wellington when they dismissed the home side for 327 on Monday.

In a Test that will be remembered for two majestic innings by Adam Voges and Usman Khawaja, as well as an umpiring howler, Australia won by an innings and 52 runs. Voges scored 239 after he was wrongly

given not out when bowled for seven. Bowler Doug Bracewell was adjudged to have sent down a no-ball, although TV replays showed it was a legitimate delivery.

New Zealand were on the back foot from the time they lost the toss and were 51-5 in the first session, according to skipper Brendon McCullum.

Nathan Lyon, Jackson Bird, Mitchell Marsh and Josh Hazlewood all shared the spoils as the last six New Zealand wickets fell for 149 on day four. Australian captain Steve Smith said it was

the first step in their quest to regain the number one Test ranking which will require them sweeping the two-Test series. "We want to be number one in the world

in all three formats and I think this Test match is a step in the right direction," he said.

"It was a pretty good toss to win. Having said that, we had to put the ball in the right areas for extended periods and I think we did that. We put the NZ batters under pressure and reaped the rewards."
