GATCO GRAFT CASE

Khaleda has to surrender in two months

The High Court yesterday released the full text of its verdict that rejected the two petitions filed by BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia challenging the legality of proceedings in Gatco corruption case.

Now, Khaleda will have to surrender before the trial court within two

months after the full verdict reaches the court, Anti-Corruption Commission's lawyer Khurshid Alam Khan told The Daily Star, citing the verdict. Meanwhile, Khaleda's lawyer AKM Ehsanur Rahman told

this correspondent that they were yet to get the certified copy of the verdict. Upon receiving the certified copy, they would file a leave to appeal petition with the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court challenging the HC verdict. Ehsanur said his client would seek a stay on the HC ver-

dict in the leave to appeal petition. If the apex court stays the HC judgment, the BNP chief would need not to surrender before the trial court. On August 5 last year, the HC rejected Khaleda's two writ

petitions that challenged the legality of filing the case and her trial in it, clearing the way for a lower court to resume her trial. It had also directed her to surrender before that court

within two months after the HC verdict was received by the court, the Special Judge's Court-3 of Dhaka.

More BRTC buses for school kids

The government will introduce more BRTC buses on all routes in the capital for the school-goers, Road Transport and Bridges Minister Obaidul Quader told the House yesterday.

Replying to lawmakers' queries, the minister also said the government has prepared a preliminary development project outline to upgrade Dhaka-Mawa-Khulna highway into four lanes on availability of

foreign aid. "The Feasibility Study and Detail Design under Technical Assistance for Sub-Regional Road Transport Project Preparatory Facility [SRTPPF] have already been finalised," he said.

Besides, the government would also upgrade into four lanes 55-kilometre roads from Jatrabari to Mawa approach road to the Padma Bridge and from the approach road on the other side of the river to Bhanga at SEE PAGE 10 COL 1

Turkey renews shelling of Syria

23 dead as missiles hit hospitals, school in rebel-held border town

Turkey defied international calls and shelled parts of northern Syria for a third day yesterday, insisting it would not allow Kurdish-led forces to seize key areas along the border.

The renewed shelling and fresh violence elsewhere in Syria -- including a suspected Russian air strike that killed 23 people at three hospitals and a schoolcast doubts on international efforts for a ceasefire to take hold this week.

The Turkish assault continued despite calls from its Western allies for restraint and drew fierce criticism yesterday from Russia, which said the "provocative" shelling was "creating a threat to peace and security in the Middle East and beyond."

The cross-border Turkish artillery fire, which began on Saturday, has added to an increasingly complex situation in Syria's northern Aleppo province just days before the ceasefire is due to begin.

Top diplomats from world powers agreed at talks in Munich last Friday on a "nationwide cessation of hostilities" within a week, in the latest bid to find an end to Syria's five-year conflict.

But advances in recent days by mainly Kurdish forces in Aleppo province have raised deep concern in Ankara, which accuses them of links to the Kurdistan Workers Party (PKK), an outlawed movement that waged a decades-long insurgency against the Turkish state.

Following similar fire on Saturday and Sunday, Turkish shelling again hit several parts of Aleppo province yesterday, according to the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, a Britain-based monitoring group.

MIR QUASEM CASE

Retired judge quits defence

Retired High Court judge Nozrul Islam Chowdhury yesterday withdrew from the defence of war criminal Mir Quasem Ali.

During the hearing on an appeal by Quasem challenging his death penalty, Justice Nozrul informed the Appellate Division that he would no longer be part of the proceedings.

Later, he told reporters on the Supreme Court Bar Association premises that he had quit as Quasem's lawyer due to "serious adverse environment".


It is not unconstitutional and unethical for a retired HC judge to move cases before the apex court, he said.

Nozrul retired on December 12 last year and began appearing in the Appellate Division to move cases as a lawyer on January 3 this year.

He said he had been involved with two other cases, in which Attorney General Mahbubey Alam was on the opposite side. The attorney general questioned the legality and ethical grounds of his moving the case on behalf of Quasem but he did not have anything to protest in those two

Digital makeover for Van Gogh's bedroom

Scientists in Chicago have produced a visualisation of Van Gogh's Bedroom in Arles, showing what it would have looked like before its colours faded.

The artist painted three versions of this famous scene, using broadly the same colour scheme. But time and light degradation have taken their toll on the pigments.

Using a variety of techniques, the researchers have digitally restored the light blue walls and door to their original lilac and purple.

The computer visualisation is part of a major new exhibition at The Art Institute of Chicago, which brings together all three versions for only the second time since Van Gogh produced them.

Mahmudur Rahman, acting editor of Bangla daily Amar Desh, was shown arrested in a bomb blast case yesterday, a day after the Supreme Court upheld a High Court bail granted to him in a sedition case. The former energy

adviser to a BNP government was expecting to be released from jail as he secured bail in all 74 criminal cases filed against him with police stations and courts across the country since December 2012. Meanwhile, BNP Joint

Secretary General Rizvi Ahmed yesterday alleged that the government was creating barriers to the release of Mahmudur. The BNP leader sought intervention from Chief Justice Surendra Kumar Sinha for his immediate release.

Bangladesh 63rd in global ranking

Second in South Asia, after India

Bangladesh ranked 63rd among 197 countries in terms of providing court access to children to protect their rights, according to the first ever global ranking by the Londonbased Child Rights International Network (CRIN).

Among Bangladesh's South Asian neighbours, only India fared better securing the 43rd position. Nepal was ranked 78th, Bhutan 85th, Pakistan 119th, Sri Lanka 123rd, Afghanistan 149th and Maldives 189th.

Belgium, Portugal and Spain were the top three countries of the list, while Kenya was the only country outside Europe to make the top ten. Relegated to the bottom of the pile were Palestine, Eritrea and Equatorial Guinea. "The Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC) does

not take precedence over national law [Bangladesh], but

national law is interpreted in a manner consistent with the CRC and other human rights obligations," said the CRIN report yesterday. The CRC has not as yet been directly incorporated into national law, but some provisions have been incorporated

in response to directions of the Supreme Court, added the report. "Bangladeshi courts have regularly referenced the CRC and other international human rights conventions where

relevant to a matter at hand." The Children Act guarantees children's right to participate in all stages of court proceedings, said the report titled

"Rights, Remedies and Representation".
