Curtain falls on SA Games

The curtain was drawn on the 12th South Asian (SA) Games yesterday at the Indira Gandhi Athletics Stadium in Sarusajai, Guwahati with athletes bidding adieu to each other with the hopes of meeting in the next edition in Nepal two years from now.

This edition marked a successful competition as the highest number of athletes competed for the highest number of gold medals (239) in the Games' 31-year history. The Games also produced 12 new records, with hosts India keeping hold of their dominance on the eight-nation event with 188 golds, followed by Sri Lanka (25), Pakistan (12), Afghanistan (7), Bangladesh (4) and Nepal (3).

"We are happy because the 12-day Games came to a successful end with the cooperation from all government officials and people of Assam and Meghalaya. The delegates also expressed their happiness with our hospitality and arrangements," Tarun Gogoi, chief minister of Assam, said in his speech.

Bangladesh's state minister for youth and sports Biren Sikder, alongside government officials from other countries, were entertained by performances from local bands as well as cultural performances at the start of the show.

The Games officially came to an end when Sarbananda Sorowal, chairman of the 12th SA Games organising committee and sports minister of India, stated: "I declare the 12th South Asian Games closed."

Following Sorowal's announcement the torch of the Games was put out and a dazzling fireworks display lit up the sky. Afterwards, Nepal Olympic Association president Jibon Ram Shrestha received the flag of the Games from his Indian counterpart N Ramachandran.

"We feel proud to be the host of the next South Asian Games. We have successfully held two editions and we are hoping to host another successful Games," said Satya Narayan Mandal, Nepal's sports minister.

Women shine bright

Though there was very little hope of gold medals for Bangladesh from the 12th Asian Games

which was jointly hosted by Guwahati and Shillong, the country produced its second best results beyond its boundaries with four gold, 15 silver and 56 bronze medals after the 1995 SA Games in Madras where they had won seven gold, 17 silver and 34 bronze medals.

when they hosted the regional multi-sport extravaganza, but they struggled to produce good results away from home. This time too, they struggled to defend their previous edition's medals render all 11 gold medals - one but had at least something to

cheer about on the back of a short period of preparation.

Bangladeshi athletes were supposed to defend 11 gold medals after the disciplines like karate, golf and cricket, in which Bangladesh won seven gold medal from Dhaka SA Games, were excluded from the 12th edition, but they failed to defend those gold medals despite bringing a mega 521-member contingent, the third highest after hosts India and Sri Lanka.

Bangladesh eventually finished fifth, thanks to some brilliant performance by the female athletes. Swimmer Mahfuza Khatun Bangladesh always fared better Shila, weightlifter Mabia Akter Simanta and shooter Shakil Ahmed salvaged the blues to have bagged gold from afresh events of their respective disciplines, Bangladesh had virtually to sureach in men's football and men's

weightlifting, two each in women's taekwondo and wushu (one each in men's and women's) and men's boxing and three in shooting (two in women's and one in men's) -- they bagged in Dhaka SA Games in 2010.

Out of Bangladesh's four gold, 15 silver and 56 bronze medals, female athletes won three gold, 10 silver and 24 bronze medals to outshine their male compatriots.

The female athletes also played a part in winning two more silver medals in mixed events comprising both female and male athletes in archery.

The performance of women weightlifters and wrestlers were outstanding in their maiden appearance as the women weightlifters won one gold, two silver and two bronze medals in events while women wrestlers won three silver and five bronze medals in eight events. Women's kho kho team and women's handball team also produced silver medals in their maiden appearance. Female boxer Shamima Akter had a 'historic fight' with five-time amateur champion Mary Kom and had to be content with a bronze medal in her first international appearance.

Interestingly, Bangladesh won at least a medal in 19 out of 21

The women's side will play two practice matches ahead of the World Cup, after which they will start their campaign against favourites India in Bengaluru on March 15. Two days later they will face England in the same city. They will then travel to Chennai to play the West Indies before going to Delhi to face Pakistan.

More than anything, the biggest gain for the side would be the huge amount of experience that they will attain by playing so many matches in the next month.

Despite the lack of practice matches, Jahanara reckons her team is ready for the big game.

"I won't say the kind of practice that we have done is enough, but we have been given excellent facilities and with the two matches we will play prior to the World Cup, we should be ready in due time," she said.

This will be the first time Jahanara will be leading the side in a major event and it was clear that she was quite excited about it.

"It is obviously a great experience to lead the side. But I won't say that this is an extra pressure because all the players in our side are seniors and you can say that they are all captains. I just have to give the right instruction at the right time and the rest follows," she said.

Jahanara ended the press conference on the same note as she began: with confidence. In her ending statement she indicated that she expected the country to support the women's team as much as the men's side.

"Cricket is cricket, be it the men's team or the women's team. Everyone in the country expects us to do well and we actually believe that we can."
