6 suspected Huji men arrested

Plan to launch attacks on cultural programmes foiled, claim police

Police arrested six "members of banned militant outfit Harkat-ul-Jihad al-Islami (Huji)", including its "Kushtia regional commander", in the capital's Kotwali area on Tuesday evening.

The arrestees were active members of Huji and loyal to the outfit's convicted leader Mufti Abdul Hannan, who is now in jail, said Additional Commissioner Monirul Islam, chief of the Counter Terrorism and Transnational Crime unit of Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP), at a press briefing at the DMP Media Centre yesterday.

He claimed that the group was preparing to carry out attacks on cultural programmes and on secular-minded cultural and political leaders in the capital and elsewhere. The aim of the attack was also to draw attention of

international terror organisations and get funding from those, according to police. On information, a police team arrested the Huji mem-

bers at a park in Zindabahar area on Tuesday evening while they were holding a meeting there.

Of the arrestees, four are from Kushtia. They are -regional commander Sazzadul Alam alias Mukti Sir, a mathematics teacher of Lahini High School in Kushtia; Mejbahur

EC won't seek army for UP polls

BGB to join other law enforcement agencies to ensure secuirty

The Election Commission is not going to seek army deployment in the upcoming Union Parishad polls as the EC apprehends lower level of violence compared to other elections.

"Currently, we don't see any logical ground to deploy army. No such situations have arisen that requires the move," said Election Commissioner Shah Nawaz.

He was talking to reporters at his EC Secretariat office in the capital yesterday.

"As these are grassroots level elections, all candidates and voters are usually known to each other. So, don't think there will be major violence during the polls," he observed.

Although the minimum marriageable age of girls will remain unchanged at 18, a rule of the proposed Child Marriage Restraint Act would allow girls, aged 16 to 18, to get married under special circumstances, with permission from courts or their parents.

Under the Child Marriage Restraint Act, 1929, the minimum marriageable age of girls is 18 now.

In Bangladesh, around 65 percent girls are married off before they reach 18, according to the State of the World's Children 2015, a Unicef report.

EXCHANGED ENCLAVES

India's new citizens to get voting rights

The Indian government will place a bill in parliament to amend electoral laws to give voting rights to people who became citizens of the country following the recent exchange of enclaves with Bangladesh.

A meeting of the Indian cabinet yesterday gave its nod to amend Section 11 of the Delimitation Act, 2002 and Section 9 of the Representation of the People Act, 1950, in this regard, said an official statement.

More than 14,000 people of 51 enclaves, that became part of India, have become its citizens.

The budget session would begin on February 23 and the proposed bill is likely to be introduced on March 1.

The plan is to get it passed by both the Houses of parliament by March 4 so that the Election Commission can begin the delimitation exercise, said sources. Once passed, the proposed Election

Laws (Amendment) Bill, 2016 will enable the EC to carry out limited delimitation of state legislature and parliamentary constituencies in Cooch Behar district of West Bengal. In July last year, Bangladesh and India

exchanged 162 enclaves.

The term of the 294-member West Bengal legislature ends on May 29 this year and fresh elections are likely to be held before that.

Blast hits military in Turkey capital

At least 18 killed, 45 wounded

At least 18 people were killed and 45 wounded by a car bomb targeting the military in the heart of the Turkish capital Ankara on Wednesday, the city's governor said.

The bloodshed came on the heels of a string of attacks in Turkey, blamed on jihadists but also on Kurdish rebels. The bomb aimed at a convoy of military service vehicles, Ankara

governor Mehmet Kiliclar said, quoted by the CNN-Turk and NTV channels. Plumes of smoke rose from the scene, close to the headquarters of the Turkish military and the parliament.

The powerful blast was heard all over the city, sending residents to their balconies in panic, an AFP correspondent said.



Mega bug set to hit devices, apps

A major computer security vulnerability has been discovered - with experts cautiously warning it could potentially affect hundreds of thousands of devices, apps and services.

However, due to the nature of the bug, it is extremely difficult to know how serious the problem is. "Many people are running around right now

trying to work out if this is truly catastrophic or whether we have dodged a bullet," said Prof Alan Woodward, a security expect from the University of Surrey.

Google engineers, working with security engineers at Red Hat, have released a patch to fix the problem.
