POLITICAL PARTIES' INCOME, EXPENDITURE

HC for people's access to info

The High Court yesterday ruled that people must have access to income and expenditure statements of political parties under the Right to Information Act.

It also declared illegal the Election Commission's refusal in 2013 to provide such information to Sushasoner Jonno Nagorik (Sujan), a civil society platform.

The verdict came following the hearing on a writ petition by Sujan that had challenged a decision of the Information Commission to uphold the EC's refusal.

The observations of the HC and the basis of the verdict could not be known, as the court is yet to release the full text of the judgment.

Election Commissioner Shah Nawaz said the commission was yet to decide whether to move an appeal before the Supreme Court, challenging the HC verdict.

Petitioner's lawyer Sharif Bhuiyan told The Daily Star that public institutions were obliged to provide information relating to people's affairs to anyone seeking it under the RTI Act 2009 following the HC judgment.

The law, however, does not require the institutions to provide information about some issues, including personal, foreign countries, intellectual properties and researches. In those cases, the reasons behind not giving information must be laid out, Sharif said.

Yesterday's verdict will help establish people's legal and constitutional right to get information from the public institutions, he said, adding that it held significance to the media and journalists too as the institutions would be bound by the law to provide information to them.

Sujan Secretary Badiul Alam Majumder in June 2013 sought information from the EC about annual income and expenditure of the registered political parties.

Banglabandha opens immigration services

Immigration services at Banglabandha land port in Panchagarh and the corresponding Phulbari land port in Jalpaiguri of West Bengal began yesterday amid festivity and hope that it would boost trade and tourism between the two countries.

Home Minister Asaduzzaman Khan Kamal and Minister of State for External Affairs of India Vijay Kumar Singh jointly inaugurated the immigration services.

This is the 28th land port through which movement of people between India and Bangladesh would take place.

The immigration service is part of several measures being taken by the governments of Bangladesh and India to increase people-to-people contact and facilitate movement of goods between the two counties and the subregion.

The Phulbari immigrations will connect people from Rangpur and Dinajpur districts of Bangladesh, and Jalpaiguri, Cooch Bihar, Darjeeling and Dinajpur districts of northern West Bengal, and Sikkim and Assam, according to a statement of the Indian High Commission in Dhaka.

Prior to the inauguration, a discussion was held at Banglabandha land port, where Vijay Singh, who took part in Bangladesh's Liberation War in 1971, said the relationship between two neighbouring countries would be stronger through the opening of the immigration service there. The two countries would reap the benefits through trade, tourism,

education, and health care services, he said.

Echoing Singh, Asaduzzaman Khan Kamal said: "Through the opening of the port, the relationship between the two countries will be strength SEE PAGE 17 COL 4

The HC bench of Justice Farah Mahbub and Justice Kazi Md Ejarul Haque Akondo came up with the rule following a writ petition filed by Children's Charity Bangladesh Foundation, a rights organisa-

Jihad fell into an unprotected well shaft while playing with other children in Shahjahanpur Railway Colony on December 26, 2014.

His body was pulled out by a group of volunteers the following day, shortly after the government agencies called off the rescue bid, saying there was no sign of the boy inside the well.

DEADLY BLAST IN ANKARA

Turkey blames Kurdish militants

Vows response in Syria, Iraq as warplanes hit PKK camps

Turkish Prime Minister Ahmet Davutoglu blamed a Syrian Kurdish militia fighter working with Kurdish militants inside Turkey for a suicide car bombing that killed 28 people in the capital Ankara, and he vowed retaliation in both Syria and Iraq.

A car laden with explosives detonated next to military buses as they waited at traffic lights near Turkey's armed forces' headquarters, parliament and government buildings in the administrative heart of Ankara late on Wednesday.

Davutoglu said the attack was clear evidence that the YPG, a Syrian Kurdish militia that has been supported by the United States in the fight against Islamic State in northern Syria, was a terrorist organisation and that Turkey, a Nato member, expected cooperation from its allies in combating the group.

Within hours, Turkish warplanes bombed bases in northern Iraq of the Kurdistan Workers Party (PKK), which has waged a three-decade insurgency against the Turkish state and which Davutoglu accused of collaborating in the car bombing.

Also yesterday, at least six soldiers were killed in an attack on their convoy in southeastern Turkey blamed on Kurdish militants, security sources said.

Turkey's armed forces would continue their shelling of recent days of YPG positions in northern Syria, Davutoglu said, promising that those responsible would "pay the price". "Yesterday's attack was directly targeting Turkey and the

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
