BNP crosses big hurdle

Finalises 718 single chairman candidates for UP polls; fails to reach understanding with Jamaat

BNP has finalised single chairman candidates in 718 union parishads as of last night with the deadline for filing nomination for the upcoming UP polls expiring today.

The party has failed to reach a consensus with Jamaat-e-Islami, a key component of the BNP-led 20-party alliance, over selecting single candidates in the elections to the lowest tier of local government body, said insiders.

The BNP central election coordination committee to select the party's chairman candidates has instructed the grassroots leaders to reach a consensus to select a single candidate in each UP where Jamaat wants to contest.

"Of the total 739 union parishads going for elections on March 22, we could not find candidates in around five because of the ruling party's torture and intimidation to our men," Mohammad Shajahan, chief of the BNP central election coordination committee, told The Daily Star last night. Emran Saleh Prince, assistant publicity secretary of the

party and another member of the coordination committee, said they have left around 15 UPs for the candidates of the BNP-led 20-party alliance. Candidates in those UPs will be finalised at local level, he

added. The BNP-led alliance on February 19 announced that it

would contest the UP polls under the banner of 20-party

alliance. The opposition alliance had earlier announced to contest

the municipality polls in the same manner. But the move failed as Jamaat men contested the polls independently from different municipalities along with the BNP candidates.

Confesses another accused in Habiganj child killings

More than seven people were involved in the killing of the four children at Sundartiki of Bahubal in Habiganj, said accused Jewel Mia in his confessional statement before a magistrate yesterday.

"On Friday Rubel Mia had said seven people took part in the killing mission, but Jewel Mia named some other people too. We will not reveal their names now," said Jaydev Bhadra, superintendent of police of Habiganj, in a press briefing at his office yesterday evening.

Fresh arson, riots erupt in India

Protesters cut water to Delhi; death toll 10 AFP, Rohtak

Fresh rioting and arson erupted in a north Indian state yesterday in caste protests that have left 10 people dead, and New Delhi faced a water crisis

after mobs shut down a key supply. Thousands of troops with shoot-on-sight orders were deployed on

Saturday in Haryana state after week-long protests turned violent, with rioters setting fire to homes and railway stations and blocking highways. Ten people have been killed and about 150 injured in the state since

told a press conference. The Jat rural caste is leading the protests, demanding quotas be set for Jats for highly sought-after government jobs and for university places. Caste members say they are struggling to find places despite India's strong

UK town 'destroyed by violent storms'

Evidence of violent storms that destroyed a lost town known as Britain's Atlantis has been uncovered.

The finds were uncovered off the coast of Dunwich, Suffolk - a small village which in the 11th Century was one of the largest towns in England.

The town was hit by a succession of storms in the 13th and 14th centuries and is now largely below the sea. Researchers said sediment gathered from the cliffs independently corroborated the historical record.

US MASS SHOOTING Six killed; suspect held

A gunman killed six people and seriously injured two others in the northern US state of Michigan, police said yesterday, after arresting an armed 45-year-old white male for the crime.

The suspect was apprehended at 12:40 am yesterday after a shooting rampage Saturday night at three different locations in the city of Kalamazoo, police said.

Police said the gunman seriously wounded a woman outside an apartment complex, killed two people at a car dealership and then shot to death four more and seriously wounded a teenage girl at a chain restaurant.

"What it looks like is we have somebody driving around, finding people and shooting them dead in their tracks," Kalamazoo County Undersheriff Paul Matyas told the local CNN affiliate 24 Hours News 8.

"This is your worst nightmare, when you have somebody just driving around randomly killing people," he added.

To protect all spoken words

Ethnic languages to be documented at International Mother Language Institute

The large building with its façade adorned with alphabets can't be missed from the VIP road opposite Kakrail Mosque in Ramna.

A wide flight of stairs leads to a display of world languages. Rows of tall panels on the floor of the gallery depict the origins and development of many ancient and modern languages.

This is the International Mother Language Institute (IMLI), a statutory body that came into being through the passing of a law on October 2010, almost a decade after 21st February was declared the International Mother Language

Day by the UN. "Information about 66 countries in Asia and Australia and Pacific, the status of their mother languages, including cultural diversity, number of mother language speakers and official languages etc. are displayed on the panels," said Professor Dr Jinnat Imtiaz Ali, Director General of IMLI.

The country's only language museum is located on the ground floor of the building. Opened in 2011, the language museum is working currently to digitise its content. Once done, users can click on links in display kiosks to get information about a country's location, its national anthem,

and folk songs. Videos will also tell of their cultural diversity. The main task of the IMLI is the protection and preservation of languages through an ethno-linguistic survey, Dr Ali said.

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
