Banglalink CEO vows zero tolerance for misconduct

Banglalink's Chief Executive Officer Erik Aas yesterday vowed to take a zero tolerance approach toward noncompliance in his company.

Since Aas assumed his current role in December last year, Banglalink has terminated its contracts with five vendors as well as some employees for non-compliance.

Asked whether there was corruption in the company, he said: "Unfortunately there are some employees who were found involved in activities that violated the code of conduct."

"Some of our colleagues were not compliant with our systems, so we have terminated them in accordance with the company rules," he said in his first interaction with the media as the CEO of the country's second largest mobile phone operator.

"We do not even find fair prices for products that are produced in Germany -- there is a lot of competition between the brands. So, there are constraints and the journalists have to report on that," he said.

He however said the real value of the work on those products that are made in Bangladesh and sold in Germany should not be so low.

"But how can we change the consumers' behaviour? It is extremely difficult."



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

Bangladesh Economic Zones Authority will award PowerPac Economic Zone Private Ltd a qualification or final licence tomorrow to develop and operate Mongla Economic Zone in Bagerhat.

As PowerPac has fulfilled all the conditions, including an environmental impact assessment, feasibility study and a master plan in line with a prequalification licence, Beza will now sign a developer agreement and give it the final go-ahead.

It will be the first qualification licence among the 10 economic zones, four of which are modelled on public-private partnership and the rest six will be built by private entities.

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Acme gets go-ahead for Tk 409cr IPO
