MAMUNUR RASHID

celebrates his 17th birthday today!

A prominent actor, director and screenwriter, Mamunur Rashid has massive contributions to the theatre scenario of Bangladesh. The mastermind behind the theatre troupe Aranyak Nattaya Dal has also been involved in TV plays for years. He turns 68 today, but is celebrating only his 17th birthday, as his birthday falls on February 29, and comes only once in four years. The Daily Star interviewed the towering figure of media world on his big day. Excerpts:

People celebrate their birthday every year, but your turn comes once every four years. What are your birthday plans this time?

Mamunur Rashid: The ideas are very positive. People don't need to bother about my birthday as it comes after every four years. Counting birthdays, I will be 17 this year (laughs). But actually I'm 68 today.

What, according to you, brings meaning to life?

Mamunur Rashid: Life means work and feeling. Am I seeing the nature around me? Am I feeling everything around me? If I can, I'm living my life. Is my life of 68 years really meaningful for me? Every day I encounter questions, like can I really do something for people in my long journey? Every day I ask myself this. Sometimes I think wish I could give something more.

In your long 68 years, you have any regret when you look back?

Mamunur Rashid: A lot, especially the mistakes I made in my early days. It doesn't matter how long my life is: what's important is my work. Shakespeare lived for only 52 years, but what he did in that time, we are still millions of miles behind.

Why did you choose acting as a profession?

Mamunur Rashid: I grew up watching theatre at my village home. In childhood, the stage play "Sohrab Rostom" inspired me. A stage play can make people happy and sad. On the whole, destiny paved my way for the life of arts and entertainment.

Do memories of youth flood back to you at times?

Mamunur Rashid: Often. We used to hang out at Sharif Mia's canteen at Dhaka University. We often stayed there till late

night. Poets Nirmalendu Goon and the late Abul Hossain are my friends from that time.

Many young artistes attribute their success to you. How does it make you feel?

Mamunur Rashid: It's a great achievement for any artiste. A number of artistes came to the spotlight through Aranyak Nattaya Dal. Many have become dramatists, directors and designers, besides acting.

Is there any new grounds that you want still want to foray into?

Mamunur Rashid: I want to make a film, although I don't know when it will happen. Acting is now my profession. For livelihood, I'm still seen on camera. Besides, I'm active on the theatre stage. Apart from all this, I still dream of directing a cinema.

Butterflies of Bangladesh ends at Drik Gallery

A butterfly is a symbol of fragility and restlessness. A mass of butterflies, fluttering from flower to flower, remind us of the childhood days that we spent chasing them in gardens, fields, river banks and green fields. There is a belief that butterflies are the emblem of fortune too. The lovely little day-flying insect is also important in maintaining the ecological balance in many ways. But in reality, butterflies are rarely seen in Dhaka, the city of concrete and crowd. This deficit may not be cleared overnight, but a group

of young environmentalists under the banner "Butterfly of Bangladesh Inventory Team" are working tirelessly to enable city dwellers to see the colourful insect in pictures. The team has so far displayed four photo exhibitions of butterflies at Drik Gallery with the images they have captured from 30 different districts in the last five years. They have indicated 238 species of butterflies in Bangladesh.

The three-day (February 26-28) fourth phase exhibition ended yesterday with a display of 50 species of butterfly from eight different families. The inventory project aims to cover all 64 districts of Bangladesh eventually.

Besides displaying butterflies from an aesthetic point of view, the team also displayed scientific taxonomy of



the species that were made available for the exhibition. The title of the exhibition remained the same -- "Chhobi Dekhe Shekha" -- as it was in the last three phases.

Ishtiaq Uddin Ahmad, Country Representative for

International Union for Conservation of Nature, Bangladesh attended the opening of the exhibition along with launching of a book cover titled "Butterflies of Bangladesh, Inventory - Fourth Phase" as chief guest. Professor Monwar Hossain of the Department of Zoology, Jahangirnagar University, provided his expertise to the team to identify the butterfly species. The eight districts covered during the fourth phase of the project are --Moulvibazar, Habiganj, Jessor, Narail, Bandarban (Only Sadar Upazilla), Bhola, Cox's Bazar and Natore.




