Move to stop malpractice

Cabinet okays draft amendment to bidding rules in the law

The cabinet yesterday approved in principle a proposed law, with a provision prohibiting bidders from quoting a price 10 percent lower or higher than the official estimated price of a public procurement tender.

Another provision of the proposed Public Procurement (4th Amendment) Act-2016 stipulates that a tender would be deemed as cancelled if any bidder quotes a price more than 10 percent lower or higher than the estimated price. Currently, there is no limit on quoting prices. This allows

contractors to quote a low price at their whims to win a tender which adversely affects the quality of goods or work. The amendment is aimed at improving the quality of work and curbing corruption.

Another provision of the amendment seeks to increase

the ceiling of the estimated price of a "limited tender" from Tk 2 crore to Tk 3 crore. It would allow the government agencies or departments to award their listed contractors any tender amounting up to Tk 3 crore.

Briefing reporters after the meeting, Cabinet Secretary Mohammad Shafiul Alam said the amendments to the Public Procurement Act (PPA) have been brought to control the bidders' tendency to quote abnormally low or high prices of tenders.

Meanwhile, Transparency International Bangladesh lauded the cabinet decision saying it would help reduce SEE PAGE 10 COL 2

Amena Begum, wife of Saied Ali of Bohail Char of the upazila, said her husband cultivated chilli on five bighas of land and he started earning much from the sale of chilli.

Creative method still ineffective

Teachers of 40pc secondary schools cannot set creative question papers, shows govt study

Teachers of more than 40 percent secondary schools still cannot set question papers in creative method though seven years have gone since its introduction, according to a latest government report.

They either depend on question papers from outside or take help of fellow teachers from other institutions to compose questions to conduct internal exams.

Released on Sunday, the report was based on a survey of 6,594 out of countrywide 18,598 schools, conducted in Dhaka, Mymensingh, Sylhet, Chittagong, Rangpur, Rajshahi, Khulna, Barisal and Comilla regions by the planning and development unit of the Directorate of Secondary and Higher Education (DSHE).

The survey found that over 16 percent schools bought question papers from teachers' associations for internal exams last year while teachers of over 23 percent schools took help of their colleagues from other schools to compose questions as they could set those partially, as per the Academic Supervision Report, November-2015.

The education ministry claimed to have trained some 5 lakh teachers of different subjects in phases

in this method since its introduction at the secondary level in 2008.

The new textbooks brought out in the light of the method do not have any sample question. Students first answered to creative questions in 2010 Secondary School Certificate exams.

Mysterious death of 2 siblings

Two siblings died at Dhaka Medical College Hospital last night, hours after they are food bought from a Chinese restaurant at Banasree in the city's Rampura.

Family sources said Nusrat Jahan, 14, a seventh grader at Viqarunnisa Noon School and College, and Alvi Aman, 6, a nursery student at Holly Crescent School, along with their parents had their dinner at the restaurant on Sunday night. They brought the leftover food home and kept it refrigerated.

Yesterday afternoon, Jasmine Begum served the food to her children and asked them to go to sleep.

Around 5:30pm, the two were found lying unconscious on the bed. Family members whisked them off to a local clinic and later to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) around 7:30pm where doctors declared the siblings dead.

Rampura police visited the apartment of businessman Md Amanullah, the victims' father, on the fourth floor of a sixstorey building at Block B of Banasree.

The bodies were kept at the DMCH mortuary. Autopsies will be carried out on those at Dhaka Medical College today.

AIDS rumour empties Sri Lankan school

A school in western Sri Lanka has been emptied of all but one pupil amid false rumours that the boy has AIDS.

Parents removed their children from the Kurunegela school last week, despite the six-year-old having a certificate proving he does not have the disease.

His mother said many other schools had rejected him because her husband's death had been wrongly blamed on AIDS.

BNP to hold elections to 2 top posts

Ahead of the party's sixth national council, the BNP yesterday announced the schedule for elections to its top two posts -- chairperson and senior vice-chairman.

Jamiruddin Sircar, a

standing committee member of the party and also election commissioner, announced the schedule at a press conference at the BNP's Nayapaltan central office.

He said the elections

He said the elections would be held on the day of the party's national council on March 19. The aspirants would have to collect nomination papers on March 2 from the party's Nayapaltan office and submit it there on March 4.

The nominations would be scrutinised on March 5 and aspirants could withdraw those by March 6, said Sircar.

Raushan hails govt for dev

Critical of govt failure to ensure safe food

Leader of the Opposition Raushan Ershad last night thanked President Abdul Hamid for his address to parliament saying his speech is "a clean document of development and progress" achieved by the Awami League-led government.

She, however, blasted the government for its "failure" to ensure safe food and proper disposal of city's garbage.

"Our country has already passed more than 40 years. Why have we failed to set up a proper disposal system for garbage within this long period? Garbage remains scattered at city's different parts, causing serious health hazards," she told Jatiya Sangshad while speaking on the thanksgiving motion on the president's speech.

Raushan, also a senior presidium member of Jatiya Party, called upon Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina to visit the city at night in disguise to get a first-hand experience about the miseries of city people, especially the floating people and slum dwellers.

The ninth session of parliament was prorogued last night after 27 working days with the passage of thanksgiving motion on the president's speech of January 20.

As many as 211 MPs including Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina and the leader of the opposition took part in the thanksgiving motion. The participating lawmakers talked 53 hours and 46 minutes on the president's speech.

Chief Whip ASM Feroz piloted the motion, which was passed by a voice vote irrespective of treasury, opposition and independent MPs.
