# Ticket troubles irk desperate fans

Chaotic scenes dominated the area around the United Commercial Bank Limited's (UCBL) Mirpur 10 branch yesterday as desperate ticket buyers, for the Asia Cup final, and the police were involved in a number of clashes

throughout the day. So intense was the scenario that it led to eight individuals being detained and a number of injuries.

The police was also forced to block the road along that path and stop traffic activity for half-an-hour in the afternoon.

Most of the ticket buyers, who had queued up in front of the bank since Friday night, complained that the bank had sold very few tickets.

"At first we heard rumours that tickets won't be sold. And that's when a number of those standing in the line got agitated. And then once they did start selling tickets, they stopped after a very short time," said Ashfaque Chowdhury, a private university stu-

not only overcame many adversities in his career to become a rare example in sporting history, but created history by leading his team to achieve one glory after another since the last ICC World Cup in Australia-New Zealand. So why can't the first major trophy be won by the country under his leadership?

This is the sentiment and belief all around. Ask even a rickshaw-puller or CNG driver and they are also ready to sacrifice their earnings to watch the mouth-watering final. Traffic-free roads on the usually busy Sunday evening may not be unlikely, as it is expected that everyone will be glued to their television sets from 7.30pm, apart from those lucky ones who have gotten tickets to watch the match from the stands.

Mashrafe did not hesitate to declare during a lengthy pre-match press conference yesterday that India were overwhelming favourites and that the Tigers' success in the current Asia Cup does not mean they have become a formidable side in the shortest format overnight, but he also made a strong statement, saying they have taken a strong stride. The people and media love a trip down memory lane whenever the two teams lock horns, so even Bangladesh's 2007 World Cup success against India in the West Indies was brought into the discussion. And it was obvious that that heart-breaking 2012 Asia Cup final, the Tigers' first final in any major tournament, was revisited.

However, one can take inspiration from their captain when he assured that his side are no longer a team that lose close matches, like they did against Pakistan in the Asia Cup final four years ago at the same venue.

On paper, India are favourites and they have vast experience of playing such crunch games. They have so far put in clinical performances in the tournament, including the convincing win in the opening game against Bangladesh. The home side however also proved that they could land heavy punches on their opponents.

One thing is for sure; there will be no shortage of spectators' delight when bowlers like Taskin Ahmed go for the jugular. Overall one can have

high hopes with the Bangladesh pace attack and everybody believes that there will be no shortage of killer instinct from them in the final. A fourpronged pace-attack and change in batting order has been on the cards and it is believed that under the leadership of Mashrafe, the Tigers will leave no stone unturned to clinch their first

major trophy. There is no doubt the Tigers need to improve their batting. There are some concerns over the batting ability of the home side in T20 cricket despite their two victories against Sri Lanka and Pakistan, especially since it will understandably not match the formidable Indian batting line-up. But they proved in recent times that they are a team who are capable of overcoming every new hurdle and prove everyone wrong.

In the end, the emotion, facts and figures, all appear useless when one remembers that no one is a favourite in this format, where one over can change the whole complexion of the game.

Who ultimately reaches the summit will be determined after this evening's three-hour battle and Bangladesh captain Mashrafe, who is not a great fan of this format of the game, stated it will be fantastic for them if they can win the final, but all will not be lost if they lose the final; a spirit of pressure defiance that his colleagues will do

well to follow.

"Everything in life will not be ready for you. Therefore, what is needed is making the best decision based on the realities," she told the students.

Joshua Yap, associate dean (admission, recruitment & marketing) at the faculty of science of the University of Nottingham, Malaysia campus, said students need to strive for excellence.

"Keep up the energy. Generate energy ... not only for yourself, but for your family and the society."

## Zia's brother to float political party

Ahmed Kamal, younger brother of late president and BNP founder Ziaur Rahman, yesterday said he was likely to launch a new political party within a year or two. He, however, did not say when it

would be launched or what its name would be. "I may form a political party and that's why I have come here today," he told

reporters after a discussion at Institution of Engineers, Bangladesh in the capital. When asked about details, he said, "I will invite you [journalists] when I

will do that." Later, the former government official told The Daily Star that it might take a year or two to start the activities

of his party.

However, at the discussion titled "Shaheed Zia's Ideology and Restoration of Threatened Democracy," yesterday, he said he would work with the dedicated leaders and activists of the BNP to organise the party formed by his brother.

"I am with you and I will be with you as a fellow fighter to lead the party in the right direction. I will be with you to materialise the ideologies of my brother," he said in a statement.

"I can't help but tell you something about the current shaky situation of the BNP. Sometimes, I feel sorry as there are so many differences between the activities of the party and the ideologies Shaheed Ziaur Rahman had for the party." Kamal claimed that a vested quarter

with anti-liberation elements in it was trying to misguide the BNP leadership, including its Chairperson Khaleda Zia. "This quarter wants to keep the chairperson in the dark. On the other

hand, the dedicated party leaders and activists, including the grassroots, are paying the price. "We will have to stand beside them [the BNP men] to boost their confi-

dence and guide them to the right direction." He said, "I don't want to be in politics out of greed or for power. I want to stand beside the BNP and serve the

country in this trying time." At one point, he, without naming anyone, said it was inappropriate to create a controversy over the number of

people martyred in the Liberation War. Khaleda at a programme on December 21 last year had said, "There are controversies over exactly how many were martyred in the Liberation War. There are also many books and

documents on the controversies." Yesterday, Kamal said all the political parties should give up "the culture

of dirty politics". "We will have to keep Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman and Ziaur

Rahman above any controversy." Kamal is the only living brother among the five brothers of Zia. He retired as the general manager of Bangladesh Parjatan Corporation in

Apart from him, former BNP whip Ashraf Hossain, former editor of Daily Dinkal Kazi Siraj, and former leader of Bikolpodhara Bangladesh Sheikh Shahidul Islam also spoke at the programme yesterday.

Police in many cases show reluctance to record complaints and even back influential people in grabbing

land of the minorities. Besides, criminals sexually harass and rape minority girls to create panic among the community. Attacking temples and desecrating idols have

also become common. Because of all this, minorities are compelled to leave their houses, land and even the country.

"What is most alarming is that the state is not paying much attention to the issue," said the report.

Things have worsened due to the culture of impunity. Specially, the hope for justice gets thinner when any ruling party man is involved in the crimes. If this situation continues, religious minorities will become extinct in Bangladesh, it added.

"We demand that Bangladesh will be a secular country where equal rights of all communities will be ensured," said Rana Das Gupta.

Around a dozen top leaders of the Parishad attended the press conference.
