INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY: SOME REFLECTIONS

Rokeya Prachi, a popular face on and off the television, is an activist who works for the rights of women. Arts & Entertainment recently caught up with her for opinion on Int'l Women's Day, and the position of women in Bangladesh. Excerpts:

"Every year on this day we celebrate the power of women. There are women who are not aware of their rights, and there are men who are blind to women's rights. When there is gender equality, the world is beautiful. This day is an inspiration for us women to dream of a world without gender bias," says Rokeya Prachi.

Asked why the number of women directors and crew in TV and film is very low, she responds "It's true that despite the large number of female actors, the number of directors and crew is very low in media. I think our women are not yet confident that they can play a big role here. We need to highlight the success



stories of women directors and crew. If we focus on their success, more parents will encourage their daughters to take part in this profession."

Answering a separate question about the future of women in Bangladesh, she adds, "The position of women in Bangladesh is good compared to the first world. Now women are participants in every sphere, including politics. Our prime

minister is a woman, and women in general are playing key roles in building the nation. I would like to thank our male counterparts for changing their outlook. A man has to prove himself as a partner in marriage, and many men are now working for women rights and equality. This is a very good sign. I am hopeful that we will have equality in all spheres of life in coming days."

Noted actor Afroza Banu has been vastly popular on screen for the past few decades. The Daily Star caught up with the veteran to know her opinion about Int'l Women's Day. With so many stories of oppression against women all over the world, is there much to celebrate on International Women's Day? Afroza Banu: I think we have a point in celebrating the day, thinking about the condition of all women. We need to raise awareness against torture and oppression. And this day is important to aware men and women about the equal rights of women. This day brings a very positive vibe, and encourages women to break the shackles.

What do women need to do to make themselves heard, in a society like Bangladesh? Afroza Banu: The situation has

improved a lot. Once women were confined to the four walls, but now they have participation in every

sphere of society. However, still there are many barriers, and women are overcoming those. They are taking part in sports and doing well there. What is your impression of the While there are numerous women-

centric works being done on TV/films and theatre, why are there so few women directors, crew etc? Afroza Banu: I agree that the number is very low. But there are women doing well behind the camera.

future of women in this country? Afroza Banu: First of all, we need to educate women. The government is playing a tremendous role in ensuring education of women. There is no alternative to education for the development of women.

Shamim Azad, a poet and writer, believes this year's theme for the International Women's Day - Pledge for Parity -- does not fit too well, in terms of Bangladesh's social circumstances. "The core point is parity. I don't think there should be a pledge: there should be a demand for parity," she told The Daily Star in a conversation. "Society has not treated women the same as men in our country," she adds.

Asked about her opinion on women's participation and development in the country, particularly in the cultural sector, she says "Tremendous progress has been made in arts



and culture by women, which is extraordinary because women are

not the privileged ones in society. Although it looks nice and colourful with women moving freely and taking up positions at work, there are still certain job roles that are not

given to women; roles that could

challenge cultural taboos."

But then, what is the way forward for women? "Women and men should get equal opportunities from their homes, and in the society," says Shamim Azad. "In terms of equal opportunities, it becomes a double whammy for girls. To create a better mindset, it has to start at a young age. Boys and girls should be treated based on their talent, potential and intellect, and not based on their gender," she concludes.

Zootopia registers best Disney animation debut

Yes, 2015 was a great year at the box office, but 2016 has hit the ground running. Disney's "Zootopia" premiered in theatres this week to nearly universal critical acclaim, and audiences seem to have listened. The animated feature definitively won the box office during its opening weekend. However, beyond merely garnering the number one spot, the tale of Nick Wilde and Judy Hopp also set an all-time box office record for Disney animation. A new report from ComicBook.com indicates that the film's \$73.7 million opening weekend box office debut makes it the best ever opening for Disney animation (the film has already gone on to haul \$200 million globally). Prior to the release of "Zootopia", Disney's animated superhero feature "Big Hero 6" held the three-day record with \$56 million. Behind that, "Wreck-It Ralph" and "Tangled" both came in with roughly \$50 million during their respective opening

tale of Elsa and Anna premiered to a paltry \$250,000 in a single theatre, but then went on to garner close to \$67 million the following week when it

experienced a wide release. Outside the realm of Disney movies, "Zootopia" managed to break yet another record as well. Over the course of its three-day premiere it managed to dethrone the previous record holder for highest grossing animated March premiere, "The Lorax", which hit cinemas

in 2012. What makes this accomplishment even more impressive is the fact that "Zootopia" managed to do something no other movie has been able to accomplish in the last three weeks: taking down "Deadpool:, which had recently gone on to become not only the highest grossing R-rated comic book movie of all time, but managed to garner numerous other records during its short run.
