One killed in Magura police shootout

A suspected robber was killed during a "gunfight" with police in Kashundi bridge area on Magura-Dhaka highway early yesterday.

The deceased was identified as Aminul Islam, 30, of Azampur in the sadar upazila of Magura.

Aminul was an accused in five robbery cases filed with Magura sadar and Islamic University police sta-

Sudarshan Roy, assistant superintendent of police in Magura, said a team of law enforcers conducted a drive in the area around 2:00am after receiving a tip that a gang of robbers were felling logs on the road to commit a robbery in the area.

As police approached the spot, robbers opened fire on them prompting the law enforcers to fire back, triggering a gunfight, police claimed.

"Aminul was caught in the line of fire and received four bullets while others managed to flee," Roy said.

A number of people from adjacent areas rushed to the spot on hearing the gun shots.

"Police rushed Aminul to Magura sadar hospital with the help of locals but the doctors declared him dead at 3:00am," witnesses said.

Police said they fired 18 bullets during the exchange.

Four police constables were injured during the incident. They were constables Taz Uddin, Kamrul, Mamun, and Lal Mia.

Police recovered a 9mm pistol, five bullets, two crude bombs and sharp weapons from the spot.

The body was sent to Magura Sadar Hospital for an autopsy.

Wishing anonymity, a deputy governor of the BB, said the Federal Reserve Bank of New York failed to do due diligence in dealing with the hacking threat.

However, the Federal Reserve Bank denied that its payments systems were breached, reports Reuters.

"To date, there is no evidence of any attempt to penetrate Federal Reserve systems in connection with the payments in question, and there is no evidence that any Fed systems were compromised," said New York Fed spokeswoman Andrea Priest in response to queries about the claim.

There have been plenty of positives from the Asia Cup. Take for instance the rise of Mahmudullah Riyad. The batsman has averaged 121 in the tournament. Sabbir Rahman, the player of the series, was the other batsman who displayed brilliant skills. The interesting part is that neither of these batsmen attempted to thud every ball outside the park. They both initially depended on singles and then smacked the deliveries when the right time arrived.

These are typical qualities that a good T20 player has. All that Sabbir and Mahmudullah need to do is nurture them and make the best out of it.

While these two players did shine, the unfortunate aspect and possibly a concern was the failure of the rest of the batting order. Soumya Sarkar did hit form towards the end, but still seems a bit rough. Shakib Al Hasan and Mushfigur Rahim had awful experiences in the middle order. Mohammad Mithun is yet to get set in international cricket.

If Bangladesh want to do something special in the ICC World Twenty20, they will need their main men to stand up.
