Two Hindu pilgrims were killed and six others injured in stampedes at Shibchaturdashi Fair in Chandranath Dham in Chittagong's Sitakunda upazila on Monday night, said the civil surgeon.

The deceased were Bidyut Dash, 45, of Habiganj; and Manoranjon Dash, 70, of Chittagong's Fatickchhari, said Mohammad Fakhruddin, inspector of Sitakunda fire service.

Of the sick, five people were admitted to Sitakunda Upazila Health Complex, he said.

On information, a team from Sitakunda Fire Station took the seven to the heath complex where the two were declared dead, said Fakhruddin.

Chittagong Civil Surgeon Azizur Rahman Siddique said following dehydration the seven fell to the ground while climbing a 1,250-foot hill through a huge crowd to worship in a temple.

Meanwhile, another pilgrim Bakul Rani, 48, was also taken to the health complex due to diarrhoea yesterday morning, Fakhruddin said. Tariqul Islam, senior

assistant superintendent of police of Sitakunda Model Police Station, told The Daily Star that many pilgrims fell sick due to severe heat and dehydration. The venue of three-day

fair had been abuzz with footfalls of lakhs of Hindus since Sunday. On Monday, the pilgrims worshiped lord Shiva, which was the main attraction of the fair.

Men's mindset towards women needs to change

SP Shamsunnahar tells discussion while sharing her experiences as a female police officer

No matter how far ahead a woman is in her career, she has to prove her capabilities at every step while the capabilities of men are taken for granted, said Shamsunnahar, police superintendent of Chandpur yesterday.

Being in a position widely considered to be suitable only for men, she talked about what it was like to be a police officer as a woman at a discussion. "Whenever a question of giving responsi-

bilities to a female member of police force

pops up, my male colleagues ask whether a woman is fit for the job; sometimes my male subordinates raise questions about the capabilities of their female colleagues in front of me," she said.

As a rights activist brought up the topic of sexual assault on women on Pahela Baishakh, last year, she admitted, "Even I would feel helpless in a situation like that. Is police protection enough in such situations? The mindset of boys needs to change. Until then, I think girls would have to be careful."

The discussion titled "Experience of Professional Women" was organised by United Nations Association of Bangladesh (UNAB) at an auditorium of Bangladesh Institute of Law and International Affairs (BILIA) in the capital. Shamsunnahar led the Police Week 2016

parade on January 26. She was the first woman to do so. Commenting on her personal experience in

the police force, she said she always strived to do her job with perfection. "I don't want anybody pointing fingers at me and say that I had got the job because I am a woman but didn't have the efficiency to do it."

She added that women had successfully defied traditional gender roles, but it is the perspective of men that needed to change.

She also initiated the Women and Children Repression Prevention cell in the district police office. "About 10-15 women with different crises come to our cell everyday. Seeing the distressed women trusting me is a fulfilling experience," she added.

Rajuk reclaims more parking lots, roads, footpaths

Rajuk yesterday launched simultaneous drives in various parts of the capital to reclaim footpaths, road width and parking spaces.

The Dhanmondi team demolished illegal commercial occupation of parking spaces at four buildings on Panthapath and penalised the building owners Tk 8 lakh, said Md Nasir Uddin, executive magistrate.

owners spent around Tk 3,000 to set up walls around the trees where people used to sit, but the trees were felled. Three coconut, two teak and two jackfruit trees were cut, he added.

They will replant trees at suitable points after the development work is complete, he assured.
