The sun appeared with all its grace on Tuesday morning much to the relief of the Bangladesh team, which was not certain of getting the opportunity for their only outdoor training session due to heavy overnight rain before their opening ICC World

T20 qualifier against the Netherlands today. With the Dhaladhar (white peak) mountain range in the

background, the Tigers had their much needed practice, albeit without young pacer Mustafizur Rahman.

While the rest sweat it out either with bat and ball in a two-and-a-half hours session, the left-arm pace bowler was involved in different fitness drills under team physio Bayjedul Islam Khan. After briefly standing at the bowling mark, he was seen doing all the stretching exercises to heal the side strain a week ago.

The 20-year-old actually did not bowl a single ball in the nets where Taskin Ahmed, Al-Amin Hossain and Abu Haider Rony ran in with the white cherry at full force. Although the team management left the issue of Mustafizur's participation against Holland in the hands of the technical staff, it was understood that his debut for the

ICC flagship event would be delayed.

All-rounder Shakib Al Hasan, who spent a good amount of time batting in the nets, got a painful blow on his right hand while facing a young Indian fast bowler. However, the lefthander, who has been going through a torrid time both with the bat and ball and had a forgettable performance in the Asia Cup final against India , returned quickly in the nets. Mushfigur Rahim as usual batted extra time with Ruwan Kalpage performing the bowler's role. Mushfiqur played some brilliant shots (no slog-sweep) against the Bangladesh pace trio, most of them either though the covers or straight overs the bowler's head. He was middling the ball so nicely that it was quite inexplicable why of late he is not clicking during a match. The right-hander also played some pull shots, which could be handy on a wicket like Dharamsala's.

And if you take the words of the ground's curator for



granted, Bangladesh might be tempted to field four pacers, considering the nice carry and bounce on the pitch. And if the sun shines like the way it did yesterday, there would be less swing during Bangladesh's opening game against Holland. In that event the Tigers may not play four pacers with left-armer Abu Haider possibly giving way to left-arm spinner Arafat Sunny. However, if the sky is gloomy then the wicket is likely to help the pacers.

At the moment it looks like Bangladesh will field the same side that played India in the Asia Cup final. There might be a riddle regarding Nasir Hossain's chance. But if was batting in the nets, it might be a reality.

IMPENDING POPULATION EXPLOSION Dharamsala is a municipal corporation in Kangra district of Himachal Pradesh. Located in the upper reaches of the valley, it is home to about 40,000 people. It's a popular tourist destination for its scenic beauty as well as the home of exiled Tibet leader Dalai Lama. Of late the HPCA (Himachal Pradesh Cricket Association) ground has attracted cricket fans from all

over because of its magnificent surroundings. But cricket, it appears, is causing great damage to Dharamsala's tranquility and the laid-back way of life. Think of an India-Pakistan game played here at the 24,000 capacity ground; already the online demand is for 1.83 lakh tickets. People living here believe that the city, surrounded by hills, simply cannot accommodate that many tourists. A recent study reveals that it has got 3000 accommodation facilities that include hotels at McLeod Ganj, which is located as high as 2024 metres above sea level. Dharamsala is a magnificent addition in the short list of spectacular venues. But it is certainly not a place for a commercial bonanza.

While the fifth round of the Bangladesh Cricket League, the country's premier first-class cricket tournament, began on a slightly balanced note on Monday, the scenarios of both the matches however

changed quite significantly yesterday. At the end of day two, Mominul Haque's Islami Bank East Zone and Mosharraf Hossain-led Central Zone were in firm control of their respective games which were

held at the Sheikh Kamal International Cricket Stadium in Cox's Bazar. Starting the day on 277 for 5, East Zone were bundled out for 392. Alok Kapali, who had reached his century on Monday, added plenty more to his account and finished his innings on 154. A good whip from number

eight Rahatul Ferdous further piled on the runs for the Easterners. Rahatul smacked two sixes and five fours in his 85-ball 62 and remained unbeaten at the end of the innings.

After the exchange, Naeem Islam-led BCB North Zone crumbled against East Zone's pacers who ran through their top order. Naeem was the only one who managed to put up some resistance, as he strutted his way to 43. Oddly enough, the heroes for East Zone yesterday were their quicker bowlers. Fresh out of the Under-19 team, Mohammad Saifuddin scalped three wickets, where as Kamrul Islam Rabbi, who was

recently selected in the national team, took three more. The one remaining scalp was taken by another fast bowler, Abu Jayed, a talented 22-year-old pacer.

Going into day three, East Zone should look to make the most of their good work and gain as big a lead as possible.

In the day's other game, Central Zone, buoyed by some good batting down the order, posted 425. They started the day on 289 for 5 with Sharifullah and Tanveer Haider at the crease. The two batsmen went about their merry way and took the team score to 347 before the stand was broken.

While Tanveer scored 84, Sharifullah posted 60. After their knocks, Mosharraf came in the end and added further woes for South Zone by smacking a 46. Abdur Razzak was the pick of the bowlers with a fivewicket haul for South Zone.

After the exchange, South Zone lost three wickets and ended the day on 131 for 3. Forhad Reza remained unbeaten on 50.

There couldn't have been a better time for Vusi Sibanda to score his first half-century in T20Is. Against the odds, Zimbabwe found themselves at 62 for four in eight overs against Hong Kong and they needed someone to bat them out of trouble. That's when Sibanda answered the call. His 59 off 46

balls included five fours and two sixes and gave his side that extra edge. Eventually the innings turned out to be a match-winning one as Zimbabwe edged past Hong Kong by just 14 runs.
