The film is set to bow on June 9, 2017.





Jon Spaihts is penning the script. Plot details are vague other than the fact that the film will be set in the present day, unlike the previous three installments starring Brendan Fraser.

Wallis is best known for her work in Steven Knight's "Peaky Blinders". She also starred in the 2014 horror film "Annabelle" and the comedy "Brothers Grimsby". Wallis will play Maid Maggie in Guy Ritchie's upcoming King Arthur movie — set for release in 2017. She also recently wrapped Zack Whedon's thriller "Come and Find Me" opposite Aaron Paul.




The language of film is further and further away from theatre, and is closer to music. It's abstract but still narrative. Everything feels less rehearsed. It's more experimental than classical.



KANTHASHILON TO COMMEMORATE WAHEEDULHAQ

Two-day festival takes off

Kanthashilon, one of the leading recitation organizations of the country, is holding a twoday festival starting tomorrow, to commemorate cultural movement pioneer Waheedul Haq, through a memorial reunion.

At a press conference yesterday, organisers informed that the Prime Minister's information secretary Iqbal Sobhan Chowdhury will inaugurate the event, to be held at the Shawkat Osman Memorial Auditorium at the National Public Library. Thespian Ataur Rahman and Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy DG Liaquat Ali Lucky will discuss the life and works of Waheedul Haq.

Speakers said Waheedul Haq, the luminary who founded Kanthashilon (and Chhayanaut),

passed away on January 27, 2007, but his dream of spreading the reach of Kanthashilon across the country lives on. In order to realise that dream, all Kanthashilon alumni from its first to 85th batches have been invited to the event, to voice their opinions and chalk out plans. Organisers hoped it would turn out to be a grand festival of cultural activists.

The two-day memorial will feature music, dance and recitation from cultural troupes Satyen Sen Shilpi Goshthi, Udichi Shilpi Goshthi, Khelaghar, Wrishij Shilpi Goshthi, Takkhashila, Kalyan Parampara, Kalparekha, Swarbanjan, Dhwani, Bohnishikha and Ochin Pakhi Baul Samiti (Commila) - along with solo recitations by noted elocutionists, sharing of reminiscences, certificate-giving, a rally and discussions.

Touquir to bring Jibananda Das on silver screen

National Award Winning film director Tauquir Ahmed has long-cherished a dream to make a biopic of iconic Bengali poet Jibananda Das. His dream now turns to reality as he readies to shoot the film from the first quarter of 2017.

The actor-director is doing research for the yet-untitled film and will subsequently write the script.

The film will focus on Jibananda Das' life as a poet, his works and other aspects of his personality. Asked why he wants to make a

film on the poet, Tauquir said, "Every Bangalee has a soft corner for Jibananda and his poetry, and I am no exception. For a long while I've thought of making a film on the romantic poet; everything is going well so far." The director also informed that

his production house Nakkhatra Chalacchitra takes its name from Jibananda's poem. He has also named many plays inspired by the poet's work. Meanwhile, Tauquir's latest film

"Oggyatonama" awaits clearance from the censor board. He expressed the hope that the film would release within two months.

Tauquir is not directing any television play at the moment, though he is acting in plays.



Bachchan's long battle with TB



............... Sixteen years ago, Bollywood veteran Amitabh Bachchan made a comeback in showbiz—albeit on the small screen - with the immensely popular TV game show "Kaun Banega Crorepati". But for him, it was also a time of immense pain as he was diagnosed with tuberculosis in the spine and had to pop in 8-10 painkillers a day.

The superstar revealed this to an audience here at a programme on the occasion of World TB Day on Monday night saying he was diagnosed with the disease on the day he started shooting for "KBC".

"In 2000, I was detected with TB and went through a very rigorous treatment for almost a year. I contracted TB on the day I was going to start TV show KBC. It was a TB of spine. It's very uncomfortable. You cannot sit or lie down. Most of the time, I was on 8-10 pain killers a day just to survive the period when I was anchoring the game show," the megastar said as he joined US Ambassador to India Richard R Verma, civil society and health workers for a reception ahead of World Tuberculosis Day on March 24."I am

a tuberculosis survivor" and that is



why "I took up" the cause of spreading awareness about the disease," said the actor who is Indian government's brand ambassador of the campaign against TB.

The Big B said "many people ask me why I contribute my services to a medical cause. I have had a complicated medical history. One of the reasons I took up TB is because I am

a TB survivor."

He said that with treatment for a year, he became free of the disease. "The reason I disclosed is that I felt that the word survivor is somehow is a very powerful word. When I say I am TB survivor, it seems like I survived a plane crash or boat sinking. If you survive that, it lends a lot of power and strength to what you are saying deeper. It's like saying that I have survived it because I went through a

process," he said. "...I said let me go there and say I am a TB survivor and I play with my grand-children and lead a normal life. It cannot get transferred. There are precautions, of course," he said.

Bachchan, said TB is normally associated with people who live with lesser means but everybody is "vulnerable" to the disease.

"It seems a little arrogant and immodest to say but what I really want to say is that if it can happen to me, it can happen to anyone. It's not trying to place degree among people. It's just trying to say that anyone can contract TB. If it is not detected in time, it can become grave. I had the medical help and guidance to get it detected and if I am sitting here as healthy, it was partly because we were able to detect the disease in time," he said.
