Stay alert to any threat, safeguard sovereignty

PM asks army men in Cox's Bazar

UNB, Ramu, Cox's Bazar

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday asked the army men to stay alert to any internal and external threat, and thus safeguard the country's constitution and sovereignty.

She was addressing the flag-hoisting ceremony of seven units of Bangladesh Army at Ramu Cantonment in Cox's Bazar. The units include two infantry brigades of the army's 10 Infantry Division.

Pointing to the Chittagong Hill Tracts peace accord and winning the maritime boundary cases against Myanmar and India, Hasina said her government set up Ramu Cantonment to protect sea resources as well as maintain peace and stability in the CHT region.

A significant number of modern vehicles, helicopters and arms and ammunition have been inducted in the Bangladesh Army for further boosting its capability and efficiency, she mentioned.

"There's a plan to establish another division of Bangladesh Army at Lebukhali of Patuakhali to keep our southern frontier wellprotected... and this is how we'll build Bangladesh Army as a more time-befitting force through speedy and coordinated modernisation Insha Allah."

Describing the Bangladesh Army as a symbol of confidence and trust of people, the premier directed its members to be more efficient and welfare-minded.

Hasina also asked them to discharge their duties by maintaining discipline and keeping trust in senior leadership.

The PM said approval has been given to set up a cantonment public school inside the Ramu Cantonment. "The establishment of the Ramu Cantonment has sparked hope among the people of this region."

Paying rich tributes to Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, she said Bangabandhu had realised the necessity of a developed and professional army.

Earlier, on her arrival at the parade ground of the cantonment, Hasina was received by Chief of Army Staff General Abu Belal Mohammad Shafiul Huq and Maj Gen Ataul Hakim Sarwar Hasan, general officer commanding of the 10 Infantry Division.

A smartly turned-out contingent of the 10 Infantry Division presented a state salute to the PM.

Ministers, PM's Security Adviser Maj Gen Tarique Ahmed Siddique (retd), lawmakers and senior civil and military officials were present.

Grameenphone's Chief Corporate Affairs Officer Mahmud Hasan said his company was not within the confines of telephone service only, but was providing digital service to people.

Faridur Reza Sagar, managing director of Channel i, said, "We want to go forward with the young generation."

Around 8.7 lakh students from 2,000 institutions participated in the competition. Target building | Hackers bugged BB system in Jan

The hackers chose the weekend in four countries to break into the BB system. The weekly two-day bank holiday in Bangladesh starts at Thursday midnight and a day later in the US, the Philippines and Sri Lanka. Knowing that there would be no mutual correspondence immediately, the hackers sent the fake payment orders around the midnight on February 4, a Thursday in Bangladesh. About \$1 billion of the BB reserves is

kept in a current account with the Fed. The money is meant to make government payments against debts and consultancy fees for development projects.

The hackers attempted to steal all of it, but failed although they made it seem like real transfer orders using names of genuine projects, donors and authorities.

Of the \$101 million stolen, \$81 million was wired to two banks in the Philippines. The rest \$20 million was sent to a bank in Sri Lanka in favour of an NGO, whose account was opened just a month ago, according to the BB.

The sum that ended up in Sri Lanka has been retrieved, as the money was not disbursed because the NGO's name was wrongly spelled in the transfer order, BB officials said.

According to the Philippines Daily Inquirer, it appeared that a \$25-million transaction was ordered by the BB on behalf of the government's Kanchpur, Meghna and Gumti second bridges

The BB requested the RCBC to stop payment and refund the funds, and if the funds had been transferred, to "freeze or put the funds on hold," noting that the payment order was fraudulent. However this was a nonworking holiday in the Philippines.

The RCBC received a Swift message from the BB requesting to stop payment and freeze the accounts for proper investigation. However, withdrawals from the accounts totalling \$58.15 million had already been processed by the Jupiter Street branch of the RCBC.

The branch manager also cited several superiors attesting to the validity of the transactions, which -- on paper --were backed by underlying infrastructure projects in Bangladesh, reported the Inquirer.

The four beneficiaries opened US dollar bank accounts in the RCBC in May last year.

for processing transfers, the hackers may have spied on Bangladesh Bank staff to get a deeper understanding of the central bank's operations, according to experts in banking fraud.

CHANGES IN TRANSFER ORDER In the wake of the cyber attack, the BB

has changed the payment order mechanism. The central bank is not relying only on the SWIFT, a system that banks use for fund transfer requests and other secure messages.

While making a fund transfer order involving a significant amount of money, the BB would use verbal advice along with the existing SWIFT service, the BB has informed the New York Fed.

The BB is working with the Belgiumbased SWIFT authorities for making the service more secure, said a central banker.

The official said the BB would take assistance from the World Bank and an agency of the US to bring back money from the Philippines.

The primary discussion with them is underway, he said.

SENDING TROOPS TO SAUDI ARABIA

Dhaka to consider it only if UN approves

Bangladesh will consider sending troops to Saudi Arabia only if UN Security Council (UNSC) approves it and in case the two holy mosques face threats.

During a meeting of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina with Saudi Foreign Minister Adel bin Ahmed Al-Jubeir in Dhaka on Tuesday, it was made clear that Bangladesh would not participate in any military operation in any part of the world if not mandated by the UNSC, diplomatic sources said.

Hasina, however, gave a positive response regarding extending support to the Arab country in countering terrorism and religious extremism.

She welcomed the Saudi initiative to form a 34-nation coalition of likeminded Islamic countries to fight terrorism but at the same time cited the government's policy that requires UN approval for its participation in any military operation of the alliance.

The Saudi foreign minister paid the visit to Dhaka reportedly to know how Bangladesh could militarily assist the Middle Eastern country. A visit to Saudi Arabia by Hasina is on the cards by May.

At the meeting, Hasina told the Saudi minister that her country joined the Saudi-led Islamic Alliance (Dhaka calls it "Counter-Terrorism Centre") along with other Muslim countries as per its "zero tolerance" policy to fight terrorism and extremist ideology, highly placed sources said.

The Saudi minister did not directly seek military support from Bangladesh, but he expressed the hope that the government would come forward if Saudi Arabia and the custodian of the

two holy mosques there were threatened. The PM in response assured him of situation arises.

The People of Bangladesh hold Saudi Arabia and the mosques in high esteem and so would always stand by the people of Saudi Arabia against any threat, sources quoted her as saying to the Saudi minister.

Al-Jubeir said there would be no pressure on any of the alliance members to have military involvement. The alliance has military and non-

military aspects and its members can contribute to any of the areas, he added. At this stage, the PM said Bangladesh

would have an active role in sharing information, intelligence, policies, experiences and best practices with the Muslim countries, diplomatic sources During the meeting, Hasina and the

Saudi foreign minister agreed to deepen the bilateral cooperation in all fields, including defence, security, fight against terrorism, trade and investment and manpower, according to highly placed The Saudi minister appreciated the

valiant efforts made by the security and law enforcement agencies to root out "terrorism" from Bangladesh and the government's zero-tolerance policy towards all sorts of terrorism and violent extremism, sources said. It was also agreed that the two

countries would cooperate in developing an effective counter-narrative against the extremist mindset. Diplomatic sources said the Arab

country had launched an aggressive move to mobilise global support, especially from Islamic countries, since the diplomatic relations between Riyadh and Tehran were cut off after Saudi Arabia executed a Shiite cleric in January this Bangladesh's strong support if any such year.

Moosa, asking him to submit the wealth statement.

The businessman in his wealth report, filed on June 7, claimed that he has Swiss bank accounts frozen which contain \$12 billion and also owns about 1,200-bigha land in Savar and Gazipur.

Talking to The Daily Star, an ACC official said the accused could not file any document in support of his wealth statement.

Moosa during quizzing by investigators said he was leading a retired life.

Previously, he was involved in manpower business in Bangladesh through his company DATCO, added the official.

Giving false information is a punish-

able offence under sections 26(2)(a), 26(2)(b) and 27(1) of the Anti-Corruption Commission Act, 2004. If found guilty of the offence, an accused might face a jail term of up to

three years or a fine or both. In June 2014, Moosa in an interview to a local magazine said he owns properties worth over Tk 53,000 crore.

The anti-graft body had launched an inquiry in 2010 following news reports that the businessmen from Faridpur allegedly laundered over Tk 51,000 crore abroad.

Bangladesh Bank in June 2011 asked all commercial banks to provide the ACC with information and documents they had on Moosa.

The central bank's anti-money laundering unit in the same year sent copies of a letter to the banks, giving a brief introduction about the business-
