



# Fifty Khasi families in uncertainty

Set to lose their homesteads, land for betel leaf cultivation after exchange of adversely possessed land with India

Welsi Amse has always dreamt that her children would become doctors one day. She has been squeezing every penny possible from the meagre earnings from a betel leaf garden at Pallathal Punji in Moulvibazar for the last few years.

But all her dreams have started to fade away after she came to know that her betel leaf garden, her only source of income, would soon be taken away. Now, the 35-year-old woman is worried sick over how she and her five-member family would survive if their land is taken.

Around 50 Khasi families living in Pallathal Punji (indigenous neighbourhood) in Moulvibazar's Baralekha upazila would lose their homestead once the exchange of the adversely possessed land, following the signing of the land boundary agreement, start happening.

# Saarc Youth Action Plan finalised

March 17 meeting to recognise youths' role in development of the region

Recognising the important role youths can play in the region, the South Asian countries have decided to finalise a SAARC Youth Charter and Action Plan in the upcoming Council of Ministers meeting in Nepal.

Foreign ministry sources said the foreign ministers of the eight SAARC countries will ink the "Youth Charter and Action Plan" to guide regional cooperation in this area, covering a comprehensive range of issues related to youths.

The South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation (SAARC) Council of Ministers is scheduled to sit in the Nepalese city of Pokhara on March 17.

Ahead of the 37th session of the council, the cabinet of Bangladesh is going to give its nod at Monday's meeting with Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina in the chair.

Foreign Minister AH Mahmood Ali would lead a Bangladesh delegation at the inter-summit, also known as SAARC Council of Ministers, which is comprised of the foreign ministers of the member states.

Some people with high levels of supposedly "good" cholesterol are at much greater risk of heart disease, a study suggests.

A bloodstream tussle takes place between "bad" cholesterol dumping fatty material in the arteries and good cholesterol taking it away. But a Cambridge University study in the journal

Science showed more good cholesterol was not always better. It is thought the findings may help find new ways to protect the heart. Eating olive oil, fish and nuts raises levels of

high-density lipoprotein (HDL) - which is more commonly known as good cholesterol. It is one of the things doctors test for when predicting your risk of a heart attack.

However, repeated trials that raise HDL with drugs have flopped, leading doctors to think something else is going on. Some insight has come from studying rare mutations that leave people with high levels of good cholesterol.

Trials showed people with a mutation in a gene called SCARB1, which affects one-in-1,700 people, had very high levels of good cholesterol.

Lying on a hospital bed, Bijoy Marma looked absolutely helpless. Several parts of his feeble body had bruises and his eyes could tell you that he was still haunted by fear.

The seven-year-old was beaten mercilessly after his abduction from Rajasthali upazila of Rangamati on Thursday morning. Luckily he was rescued and his "abductors" were arrested yesterday, said police.

The victim, a class-II student at Islampur Government Primary School in the upazila, was undergoing treatment at Bandarban Sadar hospital.

# 33 hurt in clash in Bagerhat village

At least 33 people were injured, including eight by bullets, in a clash between the supporters of two UP members in Mollahat upazila yesterday.

ANM Khairul Anam, officer-in-charge of Mollahat Police Station, said there had been a longstanding dispute between the two members of Udaypur Union -- Azizur

Rahman Muku and Kamrul Mollah -- over establishing supremacy in the area.

Kamrul is the member of Udaypur Uttarkandi ward while Muku of Astail ward.

Locals said supporters of Muku beat up Kamrul's brother Roisul Mollah on Thursday night. Later on that night, Kamrul's men beat up Muku and some of his followers.
