Anjali earns trust of Lalmonirhat villagers for her help in safe delivery

Although she is not a doctor by profession, villagers of Gotmari in Lalmonirhat lovingly call her "Dakter

Anjali Rani, a community skilled birth attendant, has been supporting pregnant women during their pregnancies, deliveries and postnatal period for over eight years.

"My baby is alive only because of doctor apa [sister]," said Rabeya Begum of Gotmari village in Lalmonirhat.

She was saying how grateful she was to Anjali for being there by her side whenever she needed during her third pregnancy, delivery and postnatal period.

Rabeya had given birth to two stillborn babies earlier. So, she was worried and afraid this time. "What if the same happens again!" the 35year-old said.

Everything went smoothly this time during the normal delivery at home in Hatibandha upazila last year,

Rabeya said, adding that the midwife, Anjali, had taken care of it well.

Like Rabeya, many women in Gotmari and seven other villages of the upazila have had childbirths under the care of Anjali. They all appreciate her role in ensuring safe delivery and healthy baby.

Anjali passed Secondary School Certificate exams in 2002. Her poor family married her off to Bijoy Chandra Barman, a rickshaw-puller, of Gotmari two years later.

FBI warns on car hacking risks

The FBI and the US National Highway Traffic Safety Administration have added their voices to growing concerns about the risk of cars being hacked.

In an advisory note it warns the public to be aware of "cybersecurity threats" related to connected vehicles.

Last year Fiat Chrysler recalled 1.4 million US vehicles after security researchers remotely controlled a Jeep.

People who suspect their car has been

hacked were told to get in contact with the FBI. The public service announcement laid out the issues and dangers of car hacking.

"Modern motor vehicles often include new connected vehicle technologies that aim to provide benefits such as added safety features, improved fuel economy and greater overall convenience," it read.

"With this increased connectivity, it is important that consumers and manufacturers maintain awareness of potential cybersecurity threats."

'Typical of children aged eleven and under'

Study on speeches of US presidential candidates says about Trump's use of grammar

The grammar used by Donald Trump in his speeches as he campaigns to become the Republican presidential candidate corresponds to that used by students aged 11 and under.

The 69-year-old businessman's language tailed his counterparts. Ted Cruz and Marco Rubio -- both used grammar corresponding to children aged between 11 and 14 -- students between grades six and eight in the US.

But their vocabulary was more advanced and matched students aged between 13 and 16.

In the study, "A Readability Analysis of Campaign Speeches from the 2016 US Presidential Campaign", researchers



from Carnegie Mellon University's Language Technologies Institute (LTI) wanted to establish the reading level of the candidates' speeches. They analysed a number of transcripts for each candidate, including campaign trail speeches, victory speeches and defeat speeches.

They found that the Democratic presidential candidates also used grammar typical of students aged between 11 and 14.

But the vocabulary used by Bernie Sanders was more advanced than that used by Hillary Clinton. The 74-yearold Vermont senator uses words similar to those used by students aged between 15 and 18.

The researchers also compared the speeches of the current presidential candidates to past leaders. The historical review showed the language used by Abraham Lincoln, the US president from 1861 to 1865, and Ronald Reagan, who led from 1981 to 1989, was more advanced.
