WAR CRIMES Prosecution asked to submit charges against five Moulvibazar men on May 4 STAFF CORRESPONDENT

The International Crimes Tribunal-1 yesterday asked the prosecution to submit the formal charges, if any, on May 4 against five Moulvibazar men for allegedly committing crimes against humanity and genocide during the 1971 Liberation War.

Yesterday was fixed for submitting the charges but prosecutor Sultan Mahmud Simon sought one month more time. The tribunal fixed the date allowing his prayer.

The accused are Samsul Hossain Tarafder, 65, an alleged local Al-Badr commander; Nesar Ali, 75, Yunus Ahmed, 71, Ujer Ahmed Chowdhury, 63, and Mobarak Mia, 66, alleged Razakars, according to the tribunal's investigation agency.

All of them are from Rajnagar upazila in Moulvibazar.

Of the five, Yunus and Ujer have been in jail since October 13 last year while the rest are on the run.

The agency on January 20 said to have found evidence of the "involvement" of them in six incidents of crimes committed in the district. The following day, the agency handed over the probe report and other documents to the prosecution.

The charges are killing of Danu Mia, looting and torching of three houses and confinement of three people; abduction, confinement and torture of three people and looting and torching of the houses of one Harendra Bhattacharya; killing of one Jamini Mohan Dev and abduction, confinement and torture of three

people; abduction of four people including one Rasraj Bhattacharya; abduction and torture of four people and killing of two; and killing of 14 people including one Shushital Dhar.

### SCBA polls start today

The two-day annual election to Supreme Court Bar Association (SCBA) for its 14 executive posts, including president and secretary, begins today. The polling will start at

10:00am and continue till 5:00pm with a one-hour lunch break at the bar building, Nimesh Chandra Das, superintendent of SCBA, told The Daily Star yesterday.

Some 5,028 lawyers are enlisted as voters, he added.

Awami League presidium member Yusuf Hossain Humayun and Azher Ullah Bhuyan are contesting as candidates for the post of president and secretary from the SASP panel, while former SCBA president Zainul Abedin and incumbent Secretary AM Mahbub Uddin Khokon are the candidates from JAOP for the president and secretary posts.

### Water management must be planned

Experts tell seminar marking World Water Day

Speakers yesterday called for adopting a planned water management system for all seasons to overcome drought, flood and river erosion across the country.

They also urged the government to take necessary action to prevent water pollution, while addressing a seminar organised by Bangladesh National Committee of ICID at Buet's Academic Council Building, marking World Water Day-2016

This year's theme of the day is "Water and

Jobs". Water Minister Anisul Islam Mahmud said, "Apart from initiating a well-designed water management system, we need to ensure optimum use of water during a crisis."

Criticising building of houses at the low laying lands which get submerged during the monsoon, the minister said, "It is time to take action against those illegally occupying these lands, and we need to create public . opinion in this regard." Anisul said they were adopting projects

to reclaim about 15,000 square kilometres of land now under rivers. Dr Abdul Matin, a professor of the than 4.5 million slum department of water resources engineering at Buet, in his keynote presentation, said, .

"Safe water management and conservation. strategy is inevitable to deal with water crisis. during the dry season." River stabilisation, management and land development projects should be implemented in a planned and coordinated

opportunities, added Matin. He suggested lessening dependency on foreign experts as they have "little knowledge" of the country's topography.

# Thirsty Sylhet city keeps suffering

As new water plant yet to go into operation

The ongoing scarcity of water has almost crippled Sylhet city, which demands 8 crore litres · of water on a daily basis, whilst the city corporation is being able to supply 3 crore litres.

To meet the demand, a new Tk 130 crore surface water treatment plant is being . constructed in Kushighat area under the Department of Public Health Engineering · (DPHE), which will use water from the \* Surma river to add 2.8 crore litres of water to the daily supply.

But the plant has not been functioning · even after the construction was completed a · couple of months ago, alleged DPHE

 officials. Ali Akbar, executive engineer of SCC, said,

in Sylhet, DPHE is officially responsible for the production of water and SCC for ensuring the supply. The plant has not been handed over yet. Moreover, SCC was not even involved in the planning or construction."

"Hopefully, it will be done by the end of

June," he said. "But it may not successfully

operate, especially during the dry season, as the source of water is Surma, and the river is dying due to the declining flow from upstream.' Eheteshamul Russel Khan, executive engineer of DPHE, Sylhet, said, "The plant may not be perfectly functional right now, as

the water level of Surma is below expectation. But we have sorted out the problem and will use an alternative way of pumping

water from the river in the dry season."

## Move to set up stone crushers protested

Environmentalists and citizen groups yesterday formed a human chain at Sylhet Central Shaheed Minar, protesting setting up of stone crushing machines in haors and wetlands in the district's Jaintapur upazila.

Bangladesh Environmental Lawyers' Association (Bela) and Water Keepers Bangladesh formed the human chain participated by rights activists, environmentalists and locals.

The government has recently planned to set up stone crushing machines in four wetlands--Dibi Haor, Kendri Beel, Harafkata Beel and Yambeel in the upazila.

Expressing grave concern over the move, protesters said a huge pile of stones and debris would shortly fill the lands,

Nazrul Islam, an inhabitant in the area, said he along with others protested filling of the lands, but the authorities concerned kept doing so, disregarding dire environmental consequences.

Another resident, Afroz Mia, said such actions would take their toll on the environment, destroying natural beauty in the locality.

Bela Sylhet Division Coordinator Advocate Shah Shaheda Akhter said, "The move will resolve a problem, but create another."

Asked, Jaintapur Upazila Nirbahi Officer (UNO) Mohammad Khaledur Rahman said the lands were found to be suitable for setting up such machines, adding that a suitability test was carried out.

Some 1,500 stone crushing machines are currently operating in the district.

#### Youth held with fake drugs at Dhaka airport

Customs officials yesterday seized 14 kilogrammes of counterfeit medicines and cosmetics worth about Tk 1 crore at Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport in the capital.

Being informed, the customs officials recovered 600 bottles of alleged skin care medicines and 100 tubes of facial creams from a suitcase of Tazim Ahmed, who arrived from Kolkata by a flight of Biman Bangladesh Airlines, said Director General of Customs Intelligence Dr

Mainul Khan. The seized items were brought from India violating import policies, added the official.

### Passport brokers jailed

A mobile court assisted by Rapid Action Battalion yesterday convicted 24 illegal passport brokers near the passport

office in the capital's Agargaon. The court led by Executive Magistrate Helal Uddin jailed one for six months, eight for two months, five for one month and fined 10 from Tk 1,500 to Tk 10,000, said Rab-2 operations officer Yeasir Arafat.
