



Three months of steady T20 progress

Bangladesh's ICC World T20 campaign might not have been as memorable as the World Cup in Australia and New Zealand last year. Two of their main bowlers' actions were adjudged to be illegal, they failed to win a game in the Super 10 and

were even bundled out for their lowest ever T20I score in their last game against New Zealand.

Their performance levels throughout the tournament were inconsistent. They were, for instance, hammered against Pakistan on a flat track. In the next two games they came back well. They were a bit shaky against Australia but managed to create a fright. And against India, they put in a near-perfect performance. Having failed to ace that challenge, they crumbled against the Black Caps.

If one were to map out Bangladesh's performance levels on a graph, there would be as many valleys as peaks. However, if one looks at this team from a wider perspective, the amount of progress that they have made in the last two months becomes clear.

Barely three months ago Bangladesh had struggled to beat Zimbabwe. In between November 2015 to January 2016, they played the African nation six times at home and lost on three occasions.

Despite putting in firm performances in the ODIs in 2015, they failed to replicate those heroics in the T20 format. They lost the T20I series 2-0 against South Africa in July last year.

Going into the Asia Cup and the ICC World Twenty20, one of the most notable aspects was that the players barely had any experience in this format. In 2015, for instance, they had played just five T20Is. Their lack of experience was something that had reflected on the players' numbers as well.

Prior to the Asia Cup, one rarely saw a Bangladeshi batsman carry his bat through a T20I innings or even put on a mighty score.



Before the Asia Cup, there were only three players who had posted 80-plus scores for the Tigers in T20Is. Nazimuddin had scored 80 back in 2007, while Shakib Al

Hasan and Tamim Iqbal crossed the landmark in 2012. The last time a Bangladeshi bowler scalped a four-wicket

haul, before the Asia Cup, was back in 2013 when Shakib

recorded figures of 4 for 21 against Zimbabwe.

These numbers though have changed quite a bit in the last three months. Tamim, for instance, was a gem with the bat, scoring an unbeaten 83 against the Netherlands and following that up with a century against Oman. Sabbir Rahman scored a brilliant 80 against Sri Lanka in the Asia Cup and almost singlehandedly took the Tigers to a winning score.

On a similar note, Shakib and Mustafizur Rahman broke barriers and scalped four and five-wicket hauls in the ICC World Twenty20. Look at the bowling averages of Al-Amin Hossain and Mustafizur this year and you will find them right there at the top alongside the best in the world.

Taskin Ahmed and Mustafizur have boasted economy rates of just 6.16 and 6.12 respectively. Amongst bowlers from full-member nations who have bowled at least 12 overs this year, these economy rates are currently the second and third best. Only Angelo Mathews has recorded better numbers.

Considering that Bangladesh have historically been an unstable T20I team, which is currently ranked 10th, the way they performed in the last three months is very commendable.

They reached the final of the Asia Cup and they almost beat the favourites of the ICC World Twenty20 in their own den; the last three months have helped the Tigers set a foundation for themselves in this format, one which they can use to launch from in the near future.

Tigers set for short break

Having returned from the ICC World Twenty20, Bangladesh are set to take a slight breather from international cricket after three months of nearly continuous cricket. Their next tour is likely to take place in August when they are supposed to go to

India to play a one-off Test.

Following that series, England are scheduled to arrive in Bangladesh in October for a month-long tour. In the meantime, the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) is planning to arrange another series, which could be a tri-nation tournament, before England's arrival. However, the plan is still in its primary stage. After the England series, Bangladesh are scheduled to tour New Zealand in December.

In between all that there are individuals who will be taking part in competitions abroad. Shakib Al Hasan and



Mustafizur Rahman will be taking part in the Indian Premier League (IPL) that is scheduled to begin on April 9. Mustafizur will also travel to the UK after the IPL to represent Sussex in limited overs cricket.

For now though, the players' main focus will be the Dhaka Premier League (DPL). Most of them are expected to be on a break for at least a week before they start preparing for the country's premier 50-over competition.

Unfortunately though, a fixed schedule regarding the DPL is yet to be made. However, member-secretary of the Cricket Committee of Dhaka Metropolis (CCDM) Rakib Haider Pavel, expects that the tournament will begin by mid-April.

The clubs will be able to buy players through the 'Playerby-Choice' method.

In this system, the players are placed in groups and are assigned values based on their grades. The clubs will be able to buy their players on a turn-by-turn basis, the order of which will be decided based on a lottery.

However, the BCB is mulling one change in this system. They have put forth a proposal that will allow clubs to retain two players from their squads of the previous season.

This new addition to the system has not yet been approved by the CCDM and as a result has not officially been added.

Afghans end with a blast

Afghanistan downed powerful West Indies by six runs in a historic World Twenty20 match in Nagpur on Sunday,

handing the never-say-die underdogs their first ever Super 10 victory. Afghanstan had failed to qualify

for the semifinals heading into Sunday's match, but were determined to take home a consolation victory against the West Indies, who had already made the final four.

After being sent into bat, Asghar Stanikzai's side posted a respectable 123 for 7, with Najibullah Zadran smashing an unbeaten 48 against the

2012 World T20 champions. The West Indies, who had a perfect record heading into the match with

three straight wins, warned that they were not going to let up against Afghanistan. But their run chase got off to a

shaky start, with opener Evin Lewis lent Afghanistan spin bowling led by 17-year-old Rashid Khan meant the wickets kept falling.

With the West Indies needing 10 runs from the final over, Najibullah sprinted several metres along the boundary to take a spectacular, tumbling catch and claim Carlos Braithwaite for 13, just when he looked like bringing the West Indies home, as he had done against South Africa on Friday.

SA to play for pride

Skipper Faf du Plessis said his South African side will try to salvage some national pride against Sri Lanka in their final World Twenty20 match in New Delhi today.

Both teams have failed to qualify for the semifinals after disappointing performances in the group stages, and will be looking to head home with a win under their belts at the

Feroz Shah Kotla stadium. The Proteas' hopes of clinching a first international trophy were dented in their opening game, when England chased down a record 230 runs to win.

They comfortably beat minnows Afghanistan by 37 runs as expected, but lost a thriller when the West Indies successfully chased 123 with just two balls to spare and Sri Lanka's defeat to England on Saturday sealed their fate.

"The difference in getting across the line in big games is when big players step up," du Plessis said.


"I am a fighter and I know we've got a lot of fighters in our team. We are playing for South Africa, we are wearing the Protea badge." Title holders Sri Lanka
