

'A Different Romeo and Juliet' premiered

Differently-abled artistes create magic on stage

................ For the first time in the theatre scene in Dhaka, the audience got to watch an incredible production by differentlyabled people on March 29 at the National Theatre Hall of Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy (BSA). The British Council Bangladesh, in association with Graeae Theatre Company, UK and Dhaka Theatre, Bangladesh brought Shakespeare on stage through theatrical piece "A Different Romeo and Juliet".

The play, with a cast of the differentlyabled, is a reinterpretation of Shakespeare's classic tragedy "Romeo and Juliet". The play has been produced as part of the global programme 'Shakespeare Lives' which marks the 400th anniversary of William Shakespeare's

The production has been directed by

Graeae Theatre's artistic director Jenny Sealey with assistance from Dhaka Theatre's Nasiruddin Yousuff.

"A Different Romeo and Juliet", as the name suggests, is different from other theatre productions which the Dhaka audience is familiar with. The play was presented with a Bangladeshi-- to be precise, a Dhakaiya makeover--that completely changed the setting of the original play retaining only the names of a number of characters.

Starting off with the jubilant scene of a cricket match between arch-rivals Khan Eleven and Chowdhury Eleven at Dhupkhola Field in Old Dhaka, the play instantly takes the audience into the plot as Romeo and Juliet come across each other at a traditional Dhakaiya wedding scene. The actors sing, dance and flip on stage overcoming their physical limitations, and urging the audience to join in

their celebration of life.

The play is designed to be comprehensible for deaf people as well with each character having a shadow copy articulating the action on stage in sign language.

The well-rounded production, encir-

cling the archetypal young lovers Romeo and Juliet, casts Rabbi Mia and Tayfur Rahman Roman (sign language) as the male lead, while Shakila Jafar and Jannatul Ferdous Srity (sign language) portray their women counterparts. The cast also includes Md. Saddam

Hossain, Afsaruddin Riyad, Md. Shariful Islam, Md. Mostafizur Rahman Sajal, Md. Murshed Miah, Mohammed Monir Hossain Sikder, Parveen Akter, Md. Sharif Hasan Chowdhury, Mohua Akter Mukta and Nur Islam Ripon.

The live music of Md. Shaheb Ali, Nargis Parvin, Baul Abdul Kafi and Sri Shantosh Chandra Barman added a bit more charm to the play.

Eminent artist Dhali Al Mamun designed the set for the play, while Nasirul Haq Khokon and Shimul Yousuff designed the light and music respectively.

As the show ended the audience rewarded the actors and crew with a standing ovation. Cultural Affairs Minister Asaduzzaman Noor and BSA director general Liaquat Ali Lucky came up on stage with the cast and crew to add a few words on the production.

Cultural Affairs Minister expressed his wish that if age were on his side, he would have portrayed Romeo alongside this Juliet.

The British Council launched the project in 2013 with a focus on bringing the people with disabilities to the light and showcasing their acting prowess to help pave the way for breaking social stereotypes.

World Theatre Day at AFC

Marking World Theatre Day 2016, Bangladesh Institute of Theatre Arts (BITA) and AFC jointly organised a seminar titled "Practicing Mother Tongue and Development Theatre: Context Bangladesh" on Sunday at the auditorium of Alliance Française de Chittagong.

Chief discussant at the seminar Dr. Ghosh of Bengali Department of Dhaka University said, "We are pleased to speak English fluently but are reluctant to speak Bangla correctly."

Chittagong University Vice Chancellor (VC) Professor Iftekhar said, "Practicing the mother tongue played a major role in the Cultural Revolution of China and the French revolution. Deadpool becomes the highest grossing R-rated movie

While "Batman v Superman: Dawn of Justice" certainly had a good weekend at the box office, "Deadpool" demolished all expectations in February as the R-rated superhero pic opened to a massive \$132.4 million—huge not just for an R-rated movie, but for a non-sequel, non-famous IP property—and now the film has crossed another box office milestone.

This past weekend saw "Deadpool" hit an astounding worldwide gross of \$745.9 million, which solidifies its status as the highest grossing R-rated



movie worldwide. Many figured this record was a possibility as "Deadpool" seemingly could not be stopped, continuing to add serious money weekend after weekend, and now it's official as the Merc with a Mouth surpassed The Matrix Reloaded's previous record haul of \$742 million

worldwide. Again, this is impressive for a number of reasons,

especially given that "Deadpool" wasn't an adaptation of something that was already massively popular to the general audience nor a sequel.

'Batman v Superman' shatters BO records

"Batman v Superman: Dawn of Justice" steamrolled past records -debuting to a gargantuan \$170.1 million over Easter weekend, despite being pilloried by critics. The numbers make it the top opening weekend for a DC Comics film, the best March launch ever and the sixth-biggest domestic opening weekend of all-time.

It's a shot in the arm for Warner Bros., which has been reeling from a series of costly bombs such as "Jupiter Ascending" and "Pan", and is looking to the Dark Knight and Man of Steel throw down to kick off a series of inter-connected comic-book franchises. Warner Bros. has already announced release dates for sequels and spinoffs for the next five years, with the first of these superhero adventures, "Suicide Squad", coming out in August.

The studio spared no expense, tapping Ben Affleck to assume Batman's cape and cowl, bringing back "Man of Steel" director Zack Snyder and Superman star Henry Cavill, and shelling out \$250

million in production expenses, as well as millions more in promotional razzle-dazzle.

It also undercuts the influence of top critics. Reviews for "Batman v Superman" were withering, but audiences didn't care. The film's

the family film's domestic total to \$240.5 million. Globally, the Disney Animation blockbuster has earned \$696.7 million, pushing it past the likes of "Tangled", "Big Hero 6" and "Ratatouille".

In third place, Universal scored a

Last weekend's champ, "Zootopia", slid to second place, racking up \$23.1 million to push counter-programming success with "My Big Fat Greek Wedding 2". The romantic comedy pulled in female crowds not interested in watching the superhero beat-down.
