FAMILY PLANNING: Equity and choice in the SDG Agenda






Family Planning brings about change. With access to modern contraception girls and women can decide for themselves if and when they are physically, emotionally and financially ready to bear a child. Mothers are then in a position to provide their child with better nutrition, education and health care, opening up a world of opportunities for child and parent alike.

The 2012 London Summit on Family Planning, which the Bangladesh Government participated in, called for modern contraception to be made available globally to an additional 120 million women and girls worldwide by the year 2020 (FP2020) of which 6.75 million will be from Bangladesh.

Some progress has been made towards the pledges, but still the existing efforts have not been enough to deliver on promises and can affect the overall development of Bangladesh. Because FP2020 goals are not stand-alone but important milestones on the way to achieving the Sustainable Development Goals in 2030, which call for access to contraception for all.

The Bangladesh story of success




The story of success however seems to have come to a halt. In the past five years the TFR has remained stagnant, in some regions it has even begun to rise slightly. The picture varies across Bangladesh, what was once a clear East-West divide, with the Eastern divisions Sylhet and Chittagong Division faring worst in terms of CPR, TFR and unmet need for contraception and the Western divisions Rangpur and Rajshahi performing best on those indicators, has changed somewhat. The Eastern regions are beginning to catch up, but a worrying trend is discernible in the central Dhaka division were the TFR is actually increasing. One of the main reasons for a stagnating or rising TFR is the large and still growing population.

For example: It requires at least 450,000 new women to accept any modern FP method to achieve just a 1% increase in CPR.

These figures alone point to the need for a revitalization of family planning in Bangladesh.

Why is family planning so important?



Bangladesh is today the most densely populated country in the world, placing enormous pressure on services, infrastructure and environment and impeding economic development. The current scenario of population growth is daunting, even a low growth scenario of 52 million additional people between 2011 and 2060, as stated in the 2015 UNFPA supported Demographic Impact Study (DIS 2015), would lead to enormous challenges for labour force participation, urban population growth, and environmental sustainability. To minimize further population growth, fertility rates need to reach replacement level as early as possible as it will take 20 to 30 years more to stabilize population growth even after that.

Recommendations

Reaching newly married and couples with high unmet need for family planning

Besides the relatively low rate of women and men who agree to long-acting or permanent methods the age of marriage has a decisive impact on fertility in Bangladesh. A higher age at marriage of girls would mean opening potential roles for women beyond motherhood. Higher levels of education and literacy could lead to formal employment, contributing to economic growth and individual empowerment. Use of family planning services before the birth of the first child among married adolescent girls still remains too low. Currently only 51% of 15-19-year olds are using a FP method.

Special attention needs to be given to girls and women living in rural and hard to reach areas for whom services are especially hard to come by. This also applies to girls and women working in tea plantations, belonging to ethnic minorities, refugee populations, fishing communities, and those living in urban slums.



Increasing uptake of long-acting or permanent methods

Long-acting or permanent methods are an ideal option for couples who already have all the children they desire, but who remain fertile for a long period of time. This will help reduce the high number of pregnancies which are terminated annually - 1.3 million or about 30% of all pregnancies in the country. Long-acting methods also show a much lower rate of discontinuation, compared with short-acting methods, such as pill or condoms, an important factor, considering that the discontinuation rate is still quite high at 30% (BDHS 2014).

Post-partum Family Planning

The unmet need for FP in Bangladesh stands at 12%, however during the first two years after a birth it is as high as 44%. The post-partum IUD can be provided directly after delivery in a pain-free and time-saving manner. Combining post-natal care visits with family planning services needs to be strengthened, a task which the newly established cadre of professional midwives will be able to provide.
