Soumya, Fizz recognised

Indian newspaper The Times of India has honoured Soumya Sarkar not once, but twice in their list of the five best catches in the ongoing World Twenty20.

Soumya occupied the top two spots for his acrobatic efforts, the first-placed catch

was the one against Pakistan in the Super 10 stage. On that occasion, Soumya ran about 15 metres and took a catch off a hit from Mohammed Hafeez, only to find himself flying over the boundary rope. However, showing great presence of mind, he flung the ball back, returned, and completed the catch.

The second-placed effort came in the Super 10 match against India. Soumya leapt high and held a catch off a bullet-like stroke by Hardik Pandya with the ball sticking to Sarkar's hand like a creeper to the ground. The other players in the list of best catches were Ravindra

Jadeja and Pandya of India, Najibullah Zadran of Afghanistan and Zeeshan Maqsood of Oman.

Meanwhile, Bangladesh pacer Mustafizur Rahman was picked in Cricket Australia Digital Media's website in their team of the tournament. The only Bangladesh to feature in the side, the site wrote: "The left-armer has bowled with good pace and clever variation, and has left more than one batsman looking foolish... At only 20, Rahman has a bright future at the highest level."



Oz into final



Captain Meg Lanning's aggressive half century helped holders Australia reach their fourth consecutive women's World Twenty20 final Wednesday after beating rivals England by five runs in the first semi-final.

Put in to bat in New Delhi, Australia posted a competitive 132 for six after Lanning's 50-ball 55 before their bowlers then restricted England to 127 for seven.

Lanning took control, starting off cautiously and then changing gear to give the England bowlers a hard time., registering her eighth T20 fifty as she hit six boundaries.

Australia will meet the winner of the second semifinal between West Indies and New Zealand in the title showdown in Kolkata on Sunday.

Lanning leads Kohli, Gayle take centre stage

India face Windies in second semifinal today

Chris Gayle is determined to grab the World Twenty20 limelight back from in-form Virat Kohli when

the West Indies and India clash in a mouthwatering semifinal in Mumbai on Thursday. The destructive opener smashed an

unbeaten century, which included 11 sixes, in the West Indies' opening win against England but has only batted once since, making just four. Kohli has been the star of the

tournament so far, expertly guiding

India through the group stages with a half-century against Pakistan and 82 not out in a crunch win over Australia. With the flat wicket at Mumbai's Wankhede Stadium a dream for

batsmen, the last-four showdown between the hosts and 2012 champions is set to be a battle of the big-hitters.

"I am looking to show what Chris Gayle is," Gayle warned ominously on Tuesday.

"I have only batted twice but this [semi-final] is a perfect opportunity to actually start the tournament and try and pick up where I left off, get a big one for the team and put them in a winning position," he added.

The 36-year-old described Kohli, who is the top run-scorer left in the tournament with 184, as a "world about individual players.

nature of T20 cricket. And that's the nature of Chris Gayle. No names, just cricket ball, beat it as hard as possible," Gayle added.

India's coach Ravi Shastri said his bowlers were aware of the danger posed by Gayle but were determined to tame him. "Bring it on. All our

bowlers will target him," said Shastri in his eve-ofmatch press conference.

The former Indian all-rounder meanwhile said that Kohli was on his way to proving himself as one of the greats of the game after a lull in form.


By contrast, the Windies won their opening three games to top Group One before being shocked by Afghanistan.

Waqar blasts Afridi in leaked report

In the wake of Pakistan's dismal performance in the World Twenty20 and consequent elimination from the tournament, head coach Wagar Younis wrote a report as the head of a

fact-finding committee to the Pakistan Cricket Board. However, the report was leaked to the media, much to the chagrin of the bowling legend. Here are some excerpts from the report: ON SHAHID AFRIDI:

We lost to New Zealand, Asia Cup and the World T20 due to poor captaincy. Over several occasions, I had made it clear that Shahid Afridi was not performing with the bat, ball or as a All the time he [Akmal] managed to retain

captain but I was not listened to. Poor his place in the team. Andrew Symonds tactics really cost us matches. A meeting was held after the New Zealand T20 series, where the boys emphasised that they felt confused with what the captain was telling them to do.

Shahid Afridi didn't attend a few meetings and practice and this is not how a captain leads from the front. He was so fixated on his own performance that he did not execute any game plan or use the right player at the right time.

His sudden decision on changing the batting order or field placement did not help the team. He appeared to be under so much pressure and playing poorly, it really reflected poorly on the team.
