The government plans to slash the prices of diesel, kerosene, octane and petrol by 15 to 25 percent to allow the economy to benefit from the slump in

The finance ministry has sent a proposal to the energy ministry to cut the prices of octane and petrol by 15 percent and that of diesel and kerosene by 25 percent.

The price of octane might come kerosene. down to Tk 84.15 a litre from Tk 99 now. Petrol might be Tk 81.60 a litre, down from Tk 96, while diesel and kerosene may sell at Tk 51 from Tk 68 a litre at present.

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# Bangladesh's digital footprints growing

### Huawei's global connectivity report ranks 50 countries

Bangladesh has been included in a list of 50 countries for its growth in areas of smartphone uptake, mobile broadband and high-speed internet access in 2016.

The country ranks 49th in Huawei's Global Connectivity Index 2016, one spot better than Pakistan, which was positioned last on the list. Neighbouring India came in at No. 44.

The index, which is now in its third year, measures how the 50 countries, which account for 90 product and 78 percent of the global population, are progressing with digital transformation.

The progress is quantified using 40

indicators that cover the supply, demand, experience and potential of five technology enablers: broadband, data centres, cloud, big data and the internet of things (IoT).

Investing in these five technologies enables nations to digitise their

economies.

The index identified three groups percent of the global gross domestic of nations: starters, adopters and uptake in smartphone, mobile frontrunners. Bangladesh, with a score of 23 out of 100, was grouped in the 'starters' category, which is in the early stage of ICT infrastructure

build-out.

"Starters are not fully benefitting from the digital economy and its potential to raise incomes and overall quality of life," said the report.

To become adopters and then frontrunners, the report recommended starters should increase their ICT investment to accelerate nationwide broadband coverage, reduce tariffs and provide subsidies for smartphones, and issue more telecom licences to raise coverage and encourage competitive pricing.

### Pran to export \$3m of cassava to New Zealand

Pran, a food processor and agribusiness company, has bagged its maiden \$3 million export order from New Zealand for cassava, a tuber used to produce starch and glucose.

Cassava is a staple crop in parts of the world. It is used much like potato and admired for its versatility in cooking.

Md Mizanur Rahman, chief of export at Pran, said the company has secured the contract from Khan's 2nd Generation Ltd, an Auckland-based company.

The cassava will be shipped off to New Zealand this month through Chittagong port.

"Necessary preparations have already been taken for the export," Kamruzzaman Kamal, director of marketing at Pran-RFL Group, said in a statement yesterday.

Sylvan Agriculture Ltd, a unit of Pran, has recently signed a deal with the Australian company.

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## Furniture, plastics exporters get cash incentives

### Plastic goods makers oppose conditions of the incentives

The government yesterday announced cash incentives on exports of furniture and plastic products in a bid to boost exports.

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Furniture exporters will get 15 percent and plastic products 10 percent as cash incentive against their exports based on "freight on board" value. Bangladesh Bank issued two separate

notices in this regard yesterday. With these two new sectors, the number of categories that enjoy cash incentives on exports now stands at 14. According to the notices, factories that

have bond licences and get duty drawback will not be eligible for the incentives. However, exporters of plastic products Promotion Bureau. have protested the provision.

"Manufacturers will now be encouraged to explore new markets for exports," said Salim H Rahman, managing director of Hatil, a furniture maker that exports its products to Middle Eastern countries, Russia, Australia, Canada and Bhutan.

Presently, there is no fully exportoriented furniture factory in Bangladesh. Some factories export besides selling their products in the local market.

The cash incentives will encourage

businesses to set up fully export-oriented factories, said Rahman. Bangladesh exported furniture worth about \$39 million in fiscal 2014-15 and

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### WB cautions Bangladesh against risks

Bangladesh should be cautious about risks emanating from the political, trade and financial sphere, the World Bank said Sunday, as it warned South Asian countries against a more difficult global environment.

"Political, financial and trade shocks are the main risks. Heightened uncertainty surrounding the national election would adversely impact investment, growth, and inflation," the WB's biannual South Asia Economic Focus report said.

While politically stable at the moment, both Pakistan and Bangladesh have to continuously deal with terrorism and security threats, although Bangladesh will see growth sustained at levels above 6 percent, it said.

Most economic indicators are stable, with economic growth set for a rise in 2017 due to increased government consumption and investment, a recovery in private investments, as well an easing of regulatory and infrastructure constraints, the Washington-based lender said.

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## NBR eyes additional Tk 100cr in tax from govt employees

Some 1.34 lakh additional government employees are likely to pay taxes during the current fiscal year due to a spike in their salaries following the new pay scale, taxmen said.

"We expect to get more taxes from government officials," said a senior official of National Board of Revenue. The NBR may get an additional Tk 100 crore in tax from state servants, according to the taxmen's estimate.

Previously, about 75,000 government officials were under the tax net.

NBR Chairman Md Nojibur Rahman has sent letters to secretaries of ministries and chiefs of departments to ensure smooth tax collections from government employees.

Taxmen said basic salary, festival allowance and bonus are taxable and the money should be deducted at source as per the income tax law.

A government employee is required to determine payable tax at the beginning of the income year, which is then deducted from the salary every month.

Based on the tax payment, the state employee will have to submit a certificate on tax deduction, which will be issued by the accounts officers along with the income tax returns, the NBR says, which incorporated the provision in the tax rules during the passage of the budget for the current fiscal

In the letter sent to secretaries and heads of departments, Rahman emphasised compliance with tax deduction rules during payment of salaries and allowances to government employees.

Taxmen said the approach to deducting tax from government employee income was somewhat lax previously, but the incorporation of the new provision will help ensure tax receipts from all public servants who earn more than Tk 250,000 a year.
