'Not just the coach, but the captain too'

Chief selector Faruque Ahmed has overwhelmingly endorsed the idea of providing national coach Chandika Hathurusingha a selec-

tor's role. The former national skipper also said that he would love to see the captain perform that role as he believes that the involvement of coach and captain in the selection process will produce greater efficacy.

"I think it's (giving coach a selector role) a very good idea. It's not a new thing in our cricket because in my first term Dav Whatmore had the selector's role and from my previous experience I can tell you that there is nothing wrong in including the national coach in the selection panel," said Faruque when he was giving his views on the observations of Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) president Nazmul Hassan Papon and director Khaled Mahmud regarding the issue.

"Chandika has already spent two years here and he has a good idea about a group of players -- 25 odd players -- so his selector's role will be helpful. And I always believe the more heads you will involve the better result you will get. If the main goal is to reach a better solution, then a healthy and

logical debate always help you to get selecting the playing 11 because it's the the best," he continued. "And that is selector who picks the team assessing the reason I also want the captain to be a part of the selection panel because ultimately the captain leads the team in the middle after all those off-field plans," he added.

Faruque also identified two issues that he feels need to be seriously consid-

ered. "See, if Chandika gets the selector's role he needs to watch domestic matches to uncover new talent. One cannot depend only on a group of players; it will increase the team's value and the job for the other selectors will also be easier. On the other hand, it should also work the other way as it would be good if the selectors are also involved in

everything, so their input in final team selection will only serve the team's purpose."

Faruque has a reason to be happy as a chief selector as during his two stints in the panel Bangladesh earned a lot of success; his first stint produced the Tigers' 2007 World Cup success in West Indies, while his second saw the 2015 World Cup success in Australia-New Zealand. "Right from the board president everybody played a part in the success. Little things made a big difference. The selectors' role is to pick the country's best players and the coaches' role is to get the best out of them; this is the way things work. And you can only claim to be a good professional if you do your duty," he said.

Khaled Mahmud pointed out two issues two days back when he talked about the necessity of a revamp for the selection panel. When Faruque's attention was drawn, he was not interested in making any comment on Mahmud's view that the selectors are not quite good at keeping up with the fast-track thinking of Chandika. "Regarding lack of coordination I must say selectors also must get the proper treatment. See, if you don't send them to foreign tours there will be some gap in thinking," he observed.

A young British cricketer has died after reportedly being shot during an armed robbery in Trinidad.

Adrian St John, 22, is understood to have died following an incident on Sunday night. Local media reports say that a 24-yearold male has been arrested on suspicion of murder.

St John, who played for Alleyn Cricket Club in south London and for his university squad at the University of Hertfordshire, was captain of the The Chris Gayle Academy in London, which opened in 2013 to "improve access to good quality education, training and employ-

ment for at risk young people in Jamaica and the UK." Gayle tweeted: "Such sad news to hear. My condolences to his family & friends. Adrian

St John was the captain of the academy. #Sigh." Donovan Miller,

programme manager for the Chris Gayle Foundation, said: "I'm really finding it hard to come to terms with it, how someone could do something like that to such a lovely person."

Rose deported after 5 weeks in NZ jail

Franklyn Rose, former West Indies Test cricketer was deported from New Zealand on Tuesday after being held in prison five weeks for overstaying a work visa.

The 44-year-old Rose, a fast bowler who played 19 Tests and 27 ODIs, had lived in New Zealand since 2011 when he was granted a work visa to coach at **Auckland University** Cricket Club.

His visa expired in 2012 and he worked as a volunteer cricket coach at Auckland schools before being given a deportation order in 2014.

Rose appeared in the Auckland District Court on March 4 and had since been held in Auckland's Mount Eden Prison. He left Auckland on a flight Tuesday to Jamaica when his last appeal to remain in New Zealand was dismissed by immigration minister Craig Foss.

Mahmudullah Riyad might have been one of the better batsmen for Bangladesh during the World Twenty20 but he definitely

would want to forget the way he ended the campaign.

He managed to sky a full-toss in Bangladesh's penultimate Super 10 match, against India, when the Tigers required just two runs and then in the last game against New Zealand, he was deceived by a googly from Ish Sodhi. Considering that he is generally a good player of spin, the latter was disappointing as well, even if not as painful as the former.

With an aim to bury those memories, Riyad returned to the field yesterday after a break of nearly two weeks.

He had arrived at the National Cricket Academy in Mirpur early in the afternoon and sweated it out with a few routine drills. The Dhaka Premier League (DPL) is more than a week away and Riyad seems to be taking extremely serious preparatory measures.

And why shouldn't he? Of all the icon players, he was the first one to get picked. There was not much confusion as far as Sheikh Jamal Dhanmondi Club were concerned.

They knew that they had to select Riyad as soon as they received the opportunity to make the first call during the players draft.

It was something that Riyad appreciated. "I actually didn't notice it at first but I realised it later. It feels good to be the first Icon player to get

called and I would like to thank Sheikh Jamal," Riyad told reporters in his usual calm and composed method.

At the back of his mind, the memory of the India defeat might still be needling him, but on the whole, the 30-year-old seemed quite stress-free.

"In the last few months we were

really busy with cricket. But it's a lot more relaxing now because of the two-week gap we got after the World Cup. We have the DPL up ahead and there are a number of big series ahead as well and I have to prepare myself," he said. "I was out of cricket for the last two

weeks and honestly speaking it was a little boring. But right now it feels good after coming back to the field. I have started practising. Hopefully the league will start as soon as possible. We are all eagerly waiting to get some game-time again," added Riyad.

Sheikh Jamal may not have formed a team as strong as the likes of Abahani Limited or Prime Bank Cricket Club, but Riyad reckons it will be interesting to play for the 'young' outfit. "It's a young team and it will be

a big challenge for me and the club. But at the same time it's a good opportunity. I enjoy playing with youngsters. They like to take challenges," said Riyad. Having transformed himself into

an extremely consistent middleorder batsman, Riyad hopes he can continue his good run this year.

"My work ethic has been the key to my change. And I hope to work harder in the coming days and make myself fitter," he said.

Fabulous Fizz the gem in Sunrisers' rubble

Much to the delight of the country's cricket fans, pacer Mustafizur Rahman made his Indian Premier League debut yesterday when the

Sunrisers Hyderabad took on Royal Challengers Bangalore at the M. Chinnaswamy Stadium.

And he did so in style. On a track that proved to be a batsman's paradise, Mustafizur finished with figures of two for 26 in four overs -- an economy rate of 6.50. Compare that to the other bowlers, and Bangalore's team runrate of 11.3, and one can understand exactly how well the left-armer bowled yesterday.

Ashish Nehra, India's most economical bowler n the World Twenty20, went away for 9.69 runs per over, Bhuvaneshwar Kumar had an economy rate of 13.75, while Karn Sharma had an economy rate of 14.25.

What made Mustafizur's bowling effort a lot more special was the fact that he bowled two of his overs at the death, at a time when AB de Villiers, who smacked six sixes and seven fours during his 42-ball 82, was going great

Upon his return, Mustafizur bowled one of his slowers and outfoxed the South African legend. A flummoxed de Villiers just managed to sky one to mid-on. It's an aspect that has become a sort of a habit for the lefthander, getting wickets that matter the most.

The very next delivery Mustafizur removed Shane Watson and at that point of time, Hyderabad captain Warner would have been wondering why he hadn't

brought Mustafizur earlier into the game. Despite Mustafizur's brilliant finish -- he gave away 16 runs in the last two overs and scalped two

wickets -- Bangalore finished on 227 for four. He did well in the Powerplays as well.

While Nehra gave away 20 off two and Bhuvaneshwar leaked 19 runs, Mustafizur gave away just 10 runs in his first two overs and managed to deceive both De Villiers and Virat Kohli a number of times with his slower deliveries and his change of pace.

After the exchange, Sunrisers were restricted to 182 for 6. David Warner smacked a 25-ball 58 and was the leading run-getter for the side. Hyderbad looked good as long as he was there at the crease. However, once he got out, the rest of the team fumbled.

By the looks of things Mustafizur seems very excited about the IPL. In an interview with a Bengali Daily, Anandabazar Patrika, earlier yesterday he said: "It may be my first IPL, but I have come here a number of times before and I know quite a few places in Bangalore already. I have mixed well with the team and it feels good."

He also referred to Kohli as 'Dada' and said that even he had troubles facing his 'cutters'.

CUP had cancelled out a 17-minute strike by Ahmed Haswan Barki in the 36th minute.

The fourth successive defeat means the three-time Bangladesh Premier League champions stay bottom of Group E without any points while Selangor take their tally to seven from four outings, equal with Tampines Rovers who were yesterday beaten 2-1 by Ceres La Salle FC. Ceres FC are on the top with eight points.

SheikH Jamal had almost secured the first point of their campaign by holding the 1-1 draw till the 88th minute before Patrick coolly placed a through-pass from Adam Noor home after racing past defender Krishna Kumar.

Sheikh Jamal had chances to cash in on a man advantage as the hosts were reduced to ten men after Hafiz Kamal was sent off for hitting Jamal Bhuiyan in an offthe-ball incident, but the Bangladesh champions, too, were down to ten men as defender Yeasin Khan got the marching orders for a tackle on Mohammad Nazmi in

the 71st minute. Sheikh Jamal will host Tampines Rovers on April 26.
