



Ushering in Pahela Baishakh in the capital

Marking Chaitra Sangkranti, the last day of the Bangla year 1422, and Pahela Baishakh, the first day of Bangla New Year 1423, leading cultural organisations and schools like Chhayanaut, Faculty of Fine Art (FFA) of University of Dhaka (DU), Shurer Dhara and Bengal Foundation ushered in Noboborsho through various programmes.

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Chhayanaut, the founder of ushering in Pahela Baishakh with a dawn time cultural programme at Ramna Botomul, began the celebrations this year with the theme "Humanity". The programme

set off with a duet rendition of a morning Raga Gunkeli. The event also featured presentation of 12 choral songs like "Anandadhwani Jagao Gagoney", "Oi Mohamanob Ashey" and "Manush Bhojle Shonar Manush Hobi"; 15 solo songs and three recitations.

The Mongol Shobha Jatra, a procession brought out by the students, alumni and teachers of the FFA, DU with people from all walks of life, has become an integral part of Pahela Baishakh, the biggest celebration in secular Bangla culture. Mongol Shobha Jatra took the Dhaka streets with the giant structures of mother and child, shampan, ox, horse, tepa putul, birds, elephants coupled with

colourful masks of king and queen, tiger, owl and many other folk motifs.

Shurer Dhara held a Chaitra Sangkranti programme and Hajaro Konthe Borshoboron at the open premises of Bangabandhu International Conference Centre. The programme featured songs from four lyrical dramas: "Mymensingh Geetika", Rabindranath Tagore's "Mayar Khela", "Hingshute Doitto" for children and another tale of Parshuram together with dance recital on the theme Noborosh and recitation.

Rezwana Choudhury Bannya has planned the programme. The organisation ushered in Bangla year 1423 with a choral rendition of Tagore song "Otho

Otho Re". Many other artistes took part in the celebrations, jointly arranged by Shurer Dhara and Channel i.

Bengal Foundation hailed Bangla New Year in a five-day (April 9-13) music festival at Bengal Shilpalaya, Dhanmondi featuring performance of Nazrul Sangeet, Rabindra Sangeet, the Three Poets' compositions and raga-based songs, folk music and classical music by noted and promising singers of Bangladesh.

Besides, Wrishij Shilpi Goshthi arranged a programme in front of Shishu Park; Mojo Baishakhi concert was held at Maul Chattar, DU and prominent bands performed at Abahoni Maath, Dhanmondi.

A platform for young choreographers

Six young dancer-choreographers from Dhaka will present a set of performances under the 'Young Choreographers Platform', today at 7pm at the Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy.

Organised by the Goethe Institut Dhaka, 'Young Choreographers Platform' is an initiative to promote and foster talents of young and potential choreographers in Bangladesh. This programme began from January of 2016 with the guidance of Tomas Bünger, a dancer and choreographer based in Bremen, Germany.

The young choreographers chosen for the program were Farhad Ahmed Shamim, Snata Shahreen, Shammy Akter, Tahnun Ahmedy, Parvin Sultana, Sudeshna Swamyamprabha and this writer. They had worked since January 2016 to construct a performance of



their own, implementing contemporary ideas. All the choreographers had expressed their urge to portray their performances as a tool or vessel for communicating through movements and techniques.

Farhad Ahmed Shamim, a performer

and dancer for Prachyanat Theatre, speaks in his performance about strenuous work and it's interconnection with humanity. The writer, student and dancer at Shadhona, made her piece solely around 'identity' and 'self inquiry'. Snata Shahreen, dancer and teacher for

Prachyanat Theatre and Nrityanchal, graces her piece with the portrayal of personal endeavors that transcends to a liberal reality. Shammy Akter, student and dancer at Shadhona, dives into a world of her own as she explores competition and the battles within oneself in her performance. Tahnun Ahmedy, dancer at Shadhona, expresses his piece to show the hierarchy and its dominance in today's generation. Parvin Sultana, actor and dancer for Prachyanat Theatre, speaks vividly about the lost measures taken towards catastrophes happening around the world to women and men. Sudeshna speaks about the dominance of the male and female, and how they are interdependent in the civilization of mankind.

The choreographers were assisted by Technical Director Faiz Zahir, Artist director's assistant Rezwan Parvez and costume designs were by Surovi Roy.



Before its release, a special premiere was held in Dhaka on April 12 evening at Star Cineplex in the city's Bashundhara City Shopping Mall. A host of distinguished guests including Cultural Affairs Minister

"Shankhachil", one of the most anticipated Bangla films of the

Asaduzzaman Noor, Channel i managing director Faridur Reza Sagor, Indian actor Prosenjit Chatterjee, film director Goutam Ghose, actors Kushum Sikdar, Mamunur Rashid and others attended the premiere show. In addition, there were a large number of celebrities and noted personalities present at the premiere.

Directed by Goutam Ghose, the film is a joint production of India and Bangladesh. Ashirbad Cholochchitro, Impress Telefilm, Prosenjit Chatterjee and Mou Roy Chowdhury are producers of the film.

The film encircles the story of a Muslim family living in the Bangladesh-India border region in Satkhira district. "Shankhachil" boldly depicts the scenario of border areas, and makes satires of the man-made boundary that separates people of the two countries. Beginning with a glimpse into the lives of people living on



the frontiers, the film takes audience to the main part which revolves around schoolteacher Muntasir Chowdhury Badol, his wife Laila Chowdhury, and their daughter Roopsha.

Before ending on a sad note, the film gives a message that it is humanity that surpasses everything. "Shankhachil" zooms in on the Partition of India in 1947 which separated Bangladesh and Indian state West Bengal. It is also a story that employs two times—the present time and the time of Partition.

Tollywood superstar Prosenjit once again revealed his reputed acting prowess as Badol, which the actor had said is one of the best roles he ever played in his career.

Kushum Sikdar also did a good job as Prosenjit's wife and mother of Roopsha. However, it is debutante child actor Shahjhbati (Roopshah), who steals attention with her outstanding screen presence. Her spontaneity and natural acting made the story realistic to its best.

The film has drawn a cast comprising apt actors from Bangladeshi and India including Mamunur Rashid, Deepankar De, Ushoshi Chakraborty, Arindam Shil, Prabir Mitra, Rosy Siddiky, Riaz Mahmud Jewel, Shakil Ahmed, Shahed Ali, Anum Rahman Khan, and Priyangshu Chattopadhyay.
