



CPD for open hearing on BB reserve heist

The Centre for Policy Dialogue (CPD) has called for an open hearing on the Bangladesh Bank's reserve heist saying that the theft had not been discussed publicly at the state

"The Philippines parliament held an open hearing. Where is our standing committee on finance?" said CPD Distinguished Fellow Debapriya Bhattacharya at the Cirdap auditorium in Dhaka yesterday.

"Our parliamentary standing committee has not called for a meeting! It has not included it in the agenda and discussed," he said, while speaking at a press conference where the think-tank presented its recommendations for the upcoming budget.

Replying to queries, the economist said the reserve heist, the first reserve theft faced by any central bank in the world, prompted debate outside the country but in Bangladesh, despite it being a democracy, the matter was not discussed publicly at the highest level.

"I don't know whether the finance minister included the issue in the agenda for the cabinet meeting and informed the prime minister and other ministers."

The heist, which took place on February 4, came to light after a Filipino media outlet published a report at the end of that month.

"People got to know it from the foreign media. Most information came from the open hearing held at the Philippines Senate," Debapriya said.

The government has cancelled three national film awards bestowed upon the movie Brihannala in three categories in 2014, Information Secretary Martuza Ahmed told The Daily Star yesterday.

Allegations surfaced after the awards that the film's story completely matched the short story Gachta Bolecilo [The tree had said] of West Bengal's noted writer Syed Mustafa Siraj. Siraj's eldest son Abhijit Siraj raised the claims last year.

Brihannala director Murad Parvez had made his debut film Chandragrahan based on Siraj's story Rani Ghater Brittanto, with due permission from the writer and giving him credit.

BCL leader dies in police custody

A Chhatra League leader died in police custody in Munshiganj yesterday. The dead is Asif Hasan, 21, acting president of Kola Union BCL in Sirajdikhan upazila.

He was severely injured in an attack carried out by his "rivals" following a · feud over the UP polls held in the area on March 22, said his family members. Police arrested Asif instead of taking action against the attackers and he died due to their negligence, alleged Habibur Rahman, Asif's father.

Locals said there was a tension between Asif and Kola Union BCI General Secretary Yamin Hossain over the polls.

The victim was a supporter of the newly-elected chairman in the union, · Liakat Mir.

30 wild birds, 2 monkeys rescued

The forest department with

the help of Rapid Action Battalion yesterday rescued 30 wild birds and two rhesus monkeys from a weekly bird market, which sits every Sunday, in Tongi of Gazipur. Trader Golap Hossain

was fined Tk 20,000 for keeping those illegally, said Asim Mallick, wildlife inspector of the forest department in Dhaka. Firoz Ahmed, magistrate

of Rab, fined him after taking him to the department of forest office. The birds include 12

rose-ringed parakeets, one red-breasted parakeet, five eurasian collared doves, three emerald doves, two spotted doves and five tricoloured munias and two turtle doves. Besides, the wildlife team also rescued two rhesus monkeys caged in the market for sale.

"We have kept the birds and animals at our office. We are going to release

Apple has revealed it reclaimed almost one tonne of gold by recycling its own products in 2015. At current prices, that's



The figure was revealed in Apple's recentlyreleased Environmental Responsibility Report, which details the results of the company's ecofriendly efforts in the last financial year.

As well as the gold, Apple recovered three tonnes of silver (worth around £1.1 million at current prices), and over 1,300 tonnes of copper.

WEST BENGAL ASSEMBLY ELECTIONS

High turnout in second phase

Nearly 80 percent of about 1.22 crore voters exercised their right to franchise across 56 constituencies in the second phase of elections to the West Bengal assembly yesterday, amid allegations of sporadic violence and voter intimidation.

"At 5:00pm, the overall polling percentage was 79.70 percent," an Election Commission official said.

Meanwhile, Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi yesterday hit out at West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee for criticising the Election Commission at an election rally in Krishnanagar, West Bengal. "They are fighting the Election Commission. All of us

should follow the rules," PM Modi said taking a dig at the Trinamool Congress chief. "Elections will come and go Didi. But, if institutions fall

it will be very difficult to rebuild them," he said.
