Two held over killing of Ctg woman, child STAFF CORRESPONDENT, Ctg

A murder case was filed yesterday over the death of a woman and her daughter in their house at Kunjuri Bottal village of Boalkhali upazila in Chittagong.

Minati Bala Shill, mother of deceased Shelly Shill, filed the case with Boalkhali Police Station against 7 named and some 20 unnamed people, said police.The accused include Shelly's husband Asim Shill, his mother Sabita Rani Shill, uncle Sukumer Shill, two sisters and their husbands.

On Tuesday, police recovered the hanging body of Shelly Shill from her bedroom while the body of her five-year-old daughter Antora Shill was found lying on the bed at that time. Salahuddin

Chowdhury, officer-incharge (OC) of the police station, said police arrested Sabita and Sukumer, adding that they were continuing drives to arrest the rest.

Shelly's mother in the case statement alleged that the accused killed them following family feuds.

JS body for transparent, faster wheat import

The Parliamentary Standing Committee on the Ministry of Food has recommended that the food directorate takes initiatives for making the process of the import of wheat transparent and faster. At its 14th meeting, the committee also rec-

ommended taking necessary steps to purchase wheat within stipulated time from the countries producing quality wheat. It also recommended carrying out pre-

shipment inspection of wheat in coordination with international agents, says a press release. Committee chairman Md Abdul Wadud

presided over the meeting while members of the committee Food Minister Md Quamrul Islam, Md Hasibur Rahman Swapan, Sheikh Fazle Noor

Taposh and Shirin Naim attended it. State minister for food Nuruzzaman Ahmed joined the meeting at special invitation.

The meeting also recommended taking steps to complete implementation of all the projects under the food ministry.

It also suggested formulation of rules and regulations to expedite the recruitment process in the ministry. It also recommended appointment of legal

experts to maintain quality of food and send reports to the standing committee.

It also suggested appointment of efficient chemists at different silos for modernisation of all laboratories.

TODDLER'S DEATH IN CAPITAL Mother admits to killing: Cops

Fahmida Mir Mukti, 30, who is being suspected of stabbing her 18-month-old son to death in the capital's Uttar Khan on Monday night admitted to police that she killed her son and attempted to commit suicide afterwards, claimed Sheikh Sirajul Haque, officer-in-charge (OC) of Uttar Khan Police Station.

He said police has not grilled her intensively. They would interrogate her further after she overcomes her sickness.

Murad's next-door neighbour Naznin Akhter yesterday told this correspondent that both Murad- the husband and Mukti are married for the second time. They used to quarrel frequently, as they

suspected each other of having extramarital affairs, she added.

The toddler was buried at the Mohammadpur Beribadh graveyard on Tuesday.

24 passport brokers jailed, fined

A mobile court assisted by Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) yesterday convicted 24 passport brokers near the passport office in the capital's Agargaon.

The court led by Executive Magistrate Helal Uddin jailed six of them for six months, three for three months, eight for one month, two for 15 days and fined five people from Tk 3,000 to Tk 10,000, said Khalid Borhan, assistant director of Rab-2. The brokers have been taking money from passport seekers, promising them to provide with passports easily, he said.

ARTICLE 19 organised a discussion titled "Freedom of Expression and Incitement: Drawing the Line" at BRAC Centre Inn yesterday.



Affairs Officer's office are among the buildings ordered to be evacuated. "My office did not receive any notice," claimed Shahina Akhter, women affairs officer.

The traders of City Super Market, maintained by SCC, also refused to vacate since as the corporation has not arranged any relocation for their businesses, they claimed. "We oppose the evacuation as there was no damage from

the recent earthquakes. We have no place to go as the SCC is not arranging anything for us," said Nur Ahmed, general secretary of Sylhet City Super Market's Trader's unity. "Some residents and traders are rejecting the notice. Some of them asked for time. We will start evacuating

buildings that are highly risky," said SCC CEO Enamul. "Traders will be relocated when a new building is constructed demolishing the risky one," he said, adding, "We also sent notices to the residential building owners after the January earthquake, but they refused to comply. We

have to be strict now for their safety.

Jahir Bin Alam, prof of civil and environmental engineering of Sust, said, "In Sylhet, at least 360 high-rise buildings are at risk and the fire services do not have enough preparation...But the newly constructed buildings are maintaining codes, and authorities concerned are preparing to face the disaster," he said.

Advocate EU Shahidul Islam Sahin, former president of Sylhet District Lawyers' Association, said the SCC should not compromise in evacuating and demolishing risky buildings as the city is endangered by earthquake threat. The authorities who gave permissions and the engineers building the weak structure should be punished, he urged.

"Building code should be strictly maintained by all to keep the city safe. This is to ensure citizens' safety first, and then we have to show humanity by relocating the evacuated residents and traders."
