Totti steals the show

A Paulo Dybala brace kept Juventus's title push on track but Francesco Totti stole the show in Serie A with two goals in a 3-2 win over Torino that moved Roma closer to Champions League qualification.

Juve's closest rivals Napoli had fired a warning shot after putting six unanswered goals, including a hat-trick from Belgium midfielder Dries Mertens, past Bologna on Tuesday.

But the Turin giants were not to be fazed as they continued their bid to emulate their 1935 feat of winning five consecutive titles by beating Lazio 3-0.

After Mario Mandzukic put the Turin giants in front six minutes before the interval, the Croatia striker turning Paul Pogba's pacy drive into the net, Juventus moved up a gear against Simone Inzaghi's visitors.

side, Lazio travelled north with some hope club, went one better. having claimed two consecutive victories under Inzaghi after he replaced Stefano Pioli two weeks ago.

But the Lazio coach had warned of Juve's "invincibility" and after the visitors lost rightback Patric for a second bookable offence against Dybala the writing was on the wall.

From the free-kick, Brazilian midfielder Hernanes forced Federico Marchetti into action but the Lazio keeper could do nothing minutes later when Dybala sent him the wrong way from the spot after Leonardo

Bonucci was hauled down in the area.

Dybala completed his brace with his 16th league goal of the campaign, the Argentine collecting Sami Khedira's ball to beat Marchetti from distance just after the hour.

Juve's 26th win of the season maintained their nine-point lead on Napoli with four games remaining.

Third-placed Roma were trailing 2-1 with four minutes remaining after Josef Martinez had added to Andrea Belotti's first half penalty in the 80th minute for visiting Torino.

That meant Napoli looked likely to open up an eight-point gap on Luciano Spalletti's side, but the Italian coach had other ideas.

Roma had seen several penalty claims waved away during the game and Spalletti

played his final card five minutes from the end. Totti had levelled late when he made a late cameo appearance in a 3-3 draw at Atalanta on Sunday.

Seconds after replacing Seydou Keita, Totti slid in at the back post to meet Miralem Pjanic's free-kick to guide the ball past Daniele Padelli on 86 minutes.

Three minutes later Roma won a controversial penalty for handball in the area, and although Padelli got a touch on Totti's drive it was not enough.

The ageing captain was mobbed by the bench and fans were seen crying in the stands as Roma kept the pressure on to sit five points behind Napoli.

Diego receives highest honour

Argentine football legend Diego Maradona has been honoured by Nicaraguan president Daniel Ortega with the highest award bestowed by the Central American country, where Maradona is visiting with girlfriend Rocio Oliva.

The official Nicaraguan government website El 19 reported on Wednesday that Ortega had awarded Maradona the insignia of the Order of Augusto Cesar Sandino, praising the footballer as a "fighter, a gladiator of peace and justice" during a private ceremony

in his office on Tuesday. Photographs of the event showed Maradona, clad in a black shirt, embracing Ortega before kissing the

medal in appreciation. "Thanks Daniel, I'm going to take care of it like the one I got in '86 -- like the World Cup," Maradona said, recalling Argentina's

World Cup triumph of that The presidential decree bestowing the award emphasized Maradona's "sporting greatness and human qualities" as well as his friendships with Cuban revolutionary leader Fidel Castro and Hugo Chavez, the late leftist president of

Venezuela.

Klopp not getting carried away

Liverpool manager Jurgen Klopp refused to get carried away after his rampant side crushed neighbours Everton 4-0 in a one-sided 226th

Merseyside derby at Anfield. Wednesday's Premier League encounter

was little short of a humiliation for the visitors, who finished the match with 10 men after Ramiro Funes Mori's second-half red card.

In truth, the match was already over by then as first-half headers from Divock Origi and Mamadou Sakho set the Reds on the path to victory.

Straight after the break, Funes Mori clattered Origi in a shocking tackle, for which he received his marching orders, and Liverpool then twisted the knife even further with a second-halfshowing of complete dominance.

Substitute Daniel Sturridge -- on for Origi, who was stretchered off -- slotted past Joel Robles to add a third after an hour before a wonderful strike from Philippe Coutinho capped off a memorable night for the home side with 14 minutes remaining.

But while Klopp admitted that his team are enjoying their football, Origi's injury took some of the gloss off the win and the German said that the margin of victory could be partly explained by Funes Mori's exit.

"We did well. Usually after a 4-0 win I don't know how to keep the smile of my

face, but tonight it's pretty easy," Klopp said. "In the first half it was a derby, so it was more wild than a normal football game, but it's a derby so you accept this.

"We could have done better, but lost some patience in the wrong moments. We forced some things too early and we didn't have the movements, especially not behind the line.

"But of course the two goals were at the

perfect moment and what can I say about the second half?

"It changed completely with the second half and when (Everton's John) Stones also had to come off. It was not easy for Everton.

"We are in a good moment -- that's how it is. We made good chances and we could have scored more."

Origi's injury marred Liverpool's victory, but Klopp allayed initial fears that the Belgian striker had broken his leg.

"I didn't see the pictures, but it was a big shadow on the game," Klopp said.

"It's not broken. I went into the medical room and saw him smiling. The ankle is twisted and we have to wait to see what happens to the ligaments now."

Everton manager Roberto Martinez is now under fire like never before.

After a series of insipid displays this season, particularly at Goodison Park, the Spaniard is rapidly running out of support on the terraces.

He hit back at his critics in the week and claimed he has moved the club on since replacing David Moyes in 2013.

But he had no excuses following this destructive defeat and admitted that it was the worst possible preparation for Saturday's FA Cup semi-final clash with Manchester United at Wembley.

"It was disastrous," he said. "It was a horrible showing that started with the best intentions, but ended with an inability to do the basics right.

"It was shocking, it was a horrible experience for everyone connected to the football club and it was a game that turned on us not defending well enough before half-time.

"We lost concentration. We give them a soft cushion with two goals before half-time and that was a massive blow."

DDSOC reaffirms support for Salahuddin

> However, there were whispers in the football arena that incumbent senior vice-president Abdus Salam Murshedy has struck a deal with the Save Football panel to clear his way to term. Following the withdrawal of three candidates on Wednesday, Murshedy -- who could not be reached for comment yesterday afternoon -- has been elected unopposed to the senior vice-president's post.

Ronaldo plays down injury concern

Three-time World Player of the Year Cristiano Ronaldo has eased concerns he suffered a significant hamstring injury after limping off minutes before the end of Real Madrid's 3-0 win over Villarreal on Wednesday.

"All good. Thanks for your support," Ronaldo posted to his over 55 million followers on social media network Instagram on Thursday.

Madrid sports daily Marca reported that Ronaldo remains a serious doubt for Saturday's trip to Rayo Vallecano with Real keen to protect the Portuguese for next week's Champions League semifinal first leg away at Manchester City.

Before hobbling off towards the end of Madrid's eighth consecutive La Liga win to remain just a point behind leaders Barcelona and Atletico Madrid, Ronaldo had played all but one minute of Real's previous 43 La Liga and Champions League games this season. And Madrid boss Zinedine Zidane admitted he should have taken more precaution to rest the 47-goal forward in recent weeks.

"I am calmer now than when I saw him leave the pitch," said Zidane.



Roy defends Vardy



Leicester City striker Jamie Vardy should not have been sent off for diving during last weekend's 2-2 draw with West Ham United, England

manager Roy Hodgson said on Wednesday. Vardy, capped six times by Hodgson, was shown a second yellow card after appearing to invite a foul from Angelo Ogbonna and then going to ground during the second half

of Sunday's game at the King Power Stadium. Vardy's furious reaction to his dismissal saw him hit with a Football Association misconduct charge, meaning he could be banned for two matches, but Hodgson felt that he had

every reason to feel hard done by. "Vardy got sent off at the weekend, but once again I will go out on a limb -- I don't see that. I don't see that as a dive," Hodgson told journalists during an FA media briefing in London.

"I think he was unbalanced. I don't think it was a penalty either. I think he was unbalanced, running at that speed.

"I think there was a very slight contact with the defender, who was trying to cover. I think he went down because he was unbalanced. I don't think he was trying to dive.

"But of course all the pundits I hear say he was trying to dive, look how he dived. I don't see it. I wouldn't blame him for that. I sympathise with him. I think he was very, very unlucky." The image of Vardy, 29, angrily berating

referee Jon Moss was splashed across British newspapers' sports pages on Monday, but Hodgson said that his reaction, though unfortunate, was understandable.

"He has reacted like human beings sometimes react," Hodgson said.

"He hasn't just said to the ref, 'that is alright, understand' and shakes hands and have a good game. He has called him a few names. But he is a human being and that can happen."
