A Keeper of Our Visual History

t is 1981. A Bangladeshi Masters student in the US visits the Metropolitan Museum in New York. There, in an exhibition called India Festival, he sees photographs from the 1880's - sepia-toned memories, works by photographic luminaries such as Lala Deen Dayal, depicting people and places in an different era. The student is enchanted. Then and there, he decides that when he returns home he will devote himself to searching out and collecting old photographs in Bangladesh.

Fast forward three decades. I am visiting my bibliophile cousin Khokon Bhai in his house in Dhaka. Knowing my passion for photography, he shows me a book that contains many old photographs and historical mementos of Dhaka. Dhaka Club Chronicles (2009) is a pictorial history of the venerable institution founded in 1911. The book is replete with historical photographs, documents, and pieces of history. I look through it with great interest. To my delight, Khokon Bhai gives me the book as a present.

The author of the book is Waqar Khan, none other than the student at the Met. It is his second book. His first, called Rare Photographs of Eastern Bengal, was published by Standard Chartered Bank in 2003 to great acclaim.

Coming home after his studies, Waqar travelled all over the country, meeting patriarchs and matriarchs of old families and convincing them to open up their family albums to him. Over twentyfive painstaking years he has built a collection of 10,000 vintage photographs scanned from various sources. They cover the period 1850-1960.

I ask Waqar about his goal. "I want to build an organised archive of these photographs that future researchers, academics and authors can access. Anyone interested in our history should be able to see these photographs from my archive. For example, the photographs can be used as illustrations in history and sociology books."

I am intrigued by the portraits in his collection. Who were these people? "They were mostly landowners (zamindars) and the newly emergent middle classes," he says. Then he describes the historical background. Photography became commercially viable very soon after its invention in Europe in 1839, reaching subcontinental shores within a few short months. It created a sensation among members of the local upper classes who wanted their portraits taken. Waqar uses the term "self-memorialization" to express this social phenomenon. The camera's precision in rendering a portrait made it popular. Overnight, portrait painters found themselves in the background.

Much of the action took place in late 19th century in Kolkata, Madras and Bombay, where European photographers such as Bourne and Shepherd set up shop. In Dhaka, the German Fritz Kapp was the only European photographer, working under the patronage of the Nawabs.

Waqar used his contacts not just within Bangladesh, but also in Great Britain and India, while assembling his collection. The historical value of these photographs cannot be overstated. In the Dhaka Club book, for example, I see Ramna turned into a makeshift airfield where Allied planes are refuelling in 1945. I see riders preparing their horses for the Nawab's Cup Horserace in 1892. And I see festival-goers in 1911 celebrating the coronation of King George V at the Dhaka Gymkhana Club. (Mercifully I see no vuvuzelas!) I ask Waqar for his parting thoughts.

"Photography is an art. These images arouse one's senses at various levels. They also provide one with indispensable historical, visual and social insight." Indeed, his illuminating work is an effort worthy of our highest praise and support.

A Chittagong University student went missing while he was taking a bath in the Halda River in South Nangalmora area of Hathazari upazila in Chittagong yesterday. Noman Chowdhury of Sarakghata in Rangunia upazila

Panchagarh Sadar yesterday. The deceased was Mehedi Hasan Raju, 16, of Matikata Cantonment area of Dhaka.

Police said Mehedi went there with a team of Tablig Jamaat. He went to the river, adjacent to a mosque where he was staying, to take a bath and drowned as he did not know how to swim.

3 lakh new tourism jobs by 2018

Says Menon adding Cox's Bazar airport to be upgraded to int'l one

The Cox's Bazar airport will be upgraded to an international airport by 2018, and the government is taking measures to further enrich the country's tourism sector, said Civil Aviation Minister Rashed Khan Menon yesterday.

"We are also trying to initiate Sylhet-London flight," he mentioned while addressing a "Meet the Press" programme at Sagor-Runi auditorium organised by Dhaka Reporters' Unity.

Mentioning that the Bangladesh airlines industry was a profitable sector, the minister said the government was planning to increase its international routes.

"Talks on expanding the routes to Japan and Canada are going on," he added.

Mentioning that there were some problems in the management of the aviation sector, Menon also said the government recently restructured the board of Biman



Bangladesh Airlines to bring discipline and dynamism to it.

The government has primarily chosen four places in the southern part of Padma Multipurpose Bridge to build the Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib International Airport, which is to be the country's largest airport, he said.

BSS reports: regarding tourism, Menon said about 3 lakh people would get employ ment in the sector within 2018.

He said, "Vigorous campaign is on both at home and abroad to attract tourists from different countries including China, Thailand, Bhutan, India, Myanmarand Malaysia to Bangladesh."

The tourism industry has already drawn attention of foreign travellers and Memoranda of Understandings have already been signed with some countries including Malaysia, Nepal and Thailand, mentioned the minister. He said, "Lithuania, Latvia, Ukraine and some other countries are also keen on the tourism sector of Bangladesh."

Education Minister Nurul Islam Nahid yesterday called upon entrepreneurs to play a role in developing the country's science and technology sector.

He was addressng an award-giving ceremony organised by United Group on United International University campus in the capital, says a press release.

At the event, United Group honoured 50 researchers whose research publications were published in international journals in the field of science and engi-

neering in 2013. The minster handed over the awards to the recipients.

Nahid said assistance of the entrepreneurs would help materialise the government's goals.

United Group Chairman Hasan Mahmood Raja presided over the ceremony.

Female drivers driving

Bobita Rani Das chose the profession in 2003 after receiving training from Brac. She is currently employed by IDE Bangladesh for its Rangpur office.

"I do not see myself as a female driving a vehicle, rather a driver doing her job. My salary is around Tk 20,000. I get other facilities, too," she added.

Shawkat Ali, secretary of Bangladesh Road Transport Authority (BRTA), told the news agency that the BRTA has also launched a driving school following the success of the programmes initiated by Gonoshasthaya Kendra and Brac. "Around 500 female drivers took licenses from us.

Their accident records are much lesser," he said, adding that the number of non-professional female drivers is also increasing. According to BRTC, about 450 female drivers have

female drivers have the digital licenses. "Female drivers are found to be more careful about rules and regulations. They don't have the tendency to overtake vehicles," said Engineer Nurul Islam, a BRTA
