

ANOTHER RU PROFESSOR KILLED

Enemy of none, lover of sitar

Say family, colleagues; he never spoke against religion; 'IS claims responsibility'; 4th RU teacher killed in 12yrs; cops see blogger-killing hallmark

He was a sitar player. All his life, he was devoted to music, culture and peace.

His family members and colleagues don't believe he had enmity with anyone. He never said or wrote anything against any religion or hurt anybody's religious sentiment.

Yet, Prof AFM Rezaul Karim Prof AFM Rezaul Karim Siddiquee of Rajshahi University was brutally murdered in the city's Shalbagan area yesterday in an attack that police say bears the hallmark of the previous blogger kill-

The 58-year-old professor of English was on his way to the university when he was pushed to the ground from behind and hit in the neck with a scissor-like sharp weapon about 7:40am, police say.


Two killers reportedly came on a bike when the teacher was waiting for his university bus. It took them less than a minute to complete their mission. They sped away, taking the weapons with them, according to police and witnesses. Prof Rezaul, who was in

white check shirt and blue pants, died on the spot. He was almost beheaded.

The body, recovered by police at 11:00am, was sent to Rajshahi Medical College for autopsy.

The attack follows the killing of another RU teacher, Prof KM Shafiul Islam of sociology department. He was stabbed dead near his residence on November 15, 2014.

3 YEARS OF RANA PLAZA DISASTER

Trial of two cases yet to start

The trial for the killing of more than a thousand people in Rana Plaza collapse three years ago is yet to begin.


The case filed for the violation of building codes in the construction of the nine-storey Plaza has been facing a similar fate.

However, charges were pressed in June last year against the accused in both the cases upon completion of the investigations.

The hearing on the charge framing is scheduled for April 28. The accused are expected to be produced on the day before the trial court where the cases were transferred in March last year, said a court source.

CPD hails reform measures

The Centre for Policy Dialogue (CPD) yesterday lauded the reforms made after the Rana Plaza disaster to ensure workers' safety at garment factories in Bangladesh but said more needed to be done.

Foreign diplomats, international development partners and local rights groups also praised the development in the sector after the world's worst industrial disaster that hit the country in 2013.

On this day that year, Rana Plaza, a multistorey building came crashing down in Savar on the outskirts of the capital, taking with it the lives of at least 1,134 people -mostly garment workers -- and injuring

Doctors were operating on him at the time of filing this report last night. DMCH sources said his intestines tore in several places because of the high pressure. Around 11:00am, his four colleagues -- Saddam, Kamrul,

Zahid and Awal -- pumped air into his stomach during a tea break inside the factory, fellow workers said.

Factory Manager Zahirul Islam confirmed this to The Daily Star. Police detained the four, but no case was filed as of last

In August last year, a 13-year-old boy died after his former employer similarly pumped air into his rectum in Khulna.

The incident sparked outrage all over the country.

A Khulna court in its verdict described the murder as "heinous and barbaric" and sentenced two people to death for his murder.

Dhaka signs Man victim of an Paris Climate Agreement

UNB, Dhaka

Bangladesh has signed the historic Paris Climate Agreement, aiming to take various measures to save the world from the disastrous consequences of climate change.

Some 175 countries, including China and the USA, signed the deal at the UN headquarters in New York on Friday. Environment and Forests Minister Anwar Hossain Manju signed the agreement on behalf of Bangladesh.

The signing day coincided with the International Mother Earth Day. The signing ceremony turned out to be an event closely resembling the annual UN General Assembly sessions, featuring around 60 heads of state and government, according to a message

Third-phase polls 'fairer'

Say EC, AL; BNP alleges massive ballot-stuffing

The Election Commission and the ruling Awami League claimed that the third phase Union Parishad elections were free and fair while the BNP expressed frustration over the polls.

At a post-polls briefing yesterday, Chief Election Commissioner Kazi Rakibuddin Ahmed said people had cast their votes in 620 union parishads of 46 districts this time in a congenial atmosphere compared to the first two phases.

Irregularities and violent activities in the latest polls were fewer than before, he

Large-scale violence did not take place since special measures had been taken to ensure transparency, the CEC said, adding, "We are expecting that the next polls will also be held in a congenial atmosphere."

Violence lessens, not irregularities

Man shot dead in Pabna, over 200 hurt in 10 districts; voting in 24 polling centres suspended

The election to 614 union parishads in the third phase of UP polls yesterday saw some stray incidents of violence and electoral irregularities, including ballotstuffing and taking of polling stations mostly by ruling party men.

Polls violence left one dead in Pabna and more than 200 injured in 10 districts. The injured include 11 journalists and four policemen, two of whom were hit by bullets.

237 OUT OF 614 The extent of violence in this phase was much less compared to the previous two phases in which more than 40

people were killed and several hundred injured. Yesterday's polls, however, were marred by electoral

irregularities as in the previous two phases of elections.

In the evening, Chief Election Commissioner Kazi Rakibuddin Ahmed told reporters that though there were some stray incidents of violence and irregularities during voting, yesterday's election was fairer than the previous two polls.

However, talking to this newspaper on condition of anonymity, an election commissioner expressed dissatisfaction over the incidents, saying the extent of violence lessened, not irregularities. Voting in the third phase of the partisan local polls began

at 8:00am and continued till 4:00pm without any break. Three polling officials were withdrawn for helping fake
