# Bumper yield of Boro likely

Farmers hope for better price as harvesting begins

Farmers in most parts of the country have started harvesting Boro paddy with high hopes of getting a better price this season.

Their expectations were buoyed by a recent government promise to buy grains directly from the growers, not from the middlemen or millers.

Though Boro paddy was farmed on 48 lakh hectares of land last year, the acreage has shrunken to 46.85 lakh hectares this year, mainly due to low price last year. Besides, there has been some flash flood-induced crop losses early in the harvesting season in the northeastern haors.

Agriculture officials, nonetheless, are optimistic about achieving a bumper Boro output of 1.9 crore tonnes. If that happens, the total rice production this fiscal year would go a little over 3.47 crore tonnes, equalling the previous year's output.

Of the three rice seasons in Bangladesh, Boro is the biggest contributor to the staple production in the country. The other seasons are Aus and Aman. Taking the shrunken Boro acreage into consideration, the US

Department of Agriculture (USDA) projects Bangladesh's total Boro output to be 1.86 crore tonnes in the current season.

Upon return from the haor regions early this week, top officials of the agriculture ministry confirmed to The Daily Star that the flash floods caused significant damages to 22,000 hectares of Boro crop but it would not affect SEE PAGE 10 COL 5

#### PROF REZAUL KILLING 'Fanatics hated him for his music school'

Say police; 2 detained for quizzing

Four days into the killing of Prof Rezaul Karim Siddiquee, the police yesterday said they got information that the teacher had incurred wrath of fanatics by setting up a music school at his village Dargamaria in Bagmara upazila.

Police also detained two persons from Dargamaria and neighbouring Khajapara villages for they had reportedly been against establishing the music school, police sources said.

The arrestees are Raihan Ali, 28, imam of the Dargamaria village mosque, and Monsur Rahman, 50, a teacher of Gopalpur Islamia Alim Madrasa in Khajapara.

## Load shedding again

Power plants run short of fuel as vessel strike causes disruption to transportation

People of the country have been witnessing severe power cuts for the last couple of days because of a drop in oil-based power generation resulting from a shortage of fuel supply.


A strike by waterways transport workers since April 20 caused the fuel shortage forcing most of the power plants run by fuel oil to remain shut, according to officials at the Power Development Board (PDB).

Transport workers have not been supply-

ing diesel and heavy fuel oil to the plants and so power generation dropped by 500-700 megawatts, leading to load shedding though Bangladesh has enough power generation and supply capacity to meet the demand.

Meanwhile, with the mercury shooting towards 35-38 degrees Celsius and no rain, the demand for electricity rose even in offpeak hours in the morning and noon, PDB officials said.

#### Olama League not affiliated with AL

Reiterates ruling party after Olama leaders criticise AL leaders

The Awami League yesterday reiterated that the Olama League was not affiliated with the ruling party, a day after an Olama League faction came down heavily on some AL leaders for saying their party had no links with the organisation.

"The Olama League does not belong to the Awami League. Our joint general secretary [Mahbubul Alam Hanif] has already clarified the matter on behalf of the party," Syed Ashraful Islam, general secretary of the AL, said at a press conference yesterday.

"Even after that, if anyone makes any audacious comment, it is up to them," he said at the programme at his party president's Dhanmondi office in the capital. On Monday, Abdul Hasan Sheikh Shariatpuri, general

secretary of an Olama League faction, termed his organisation a "bridge" between religious Muslims and the AL. "The organisation is not just a like-minded body of the

AL, it is something more than that," he said at a press conference at the Jatiya Press Club.

At present, the Olama League is split into two feuding factions -- one led by Ismail Hossain bin Helali and the other by Shariatpuri.

DRAFT LAW ON JUDGE IMPEACHMENT

# Appointment issue ignored

The constitution has two specific provisions that ask the parliament to make laws for the appointment of a judge to the Supreme Court and also for the removal of a sitting judge by the House.

The first provision is now more than four decades old. One of them suggested making a law that would be very specific about who could be a judge of the SC in addition to the qualifications set in the constitution. Under the current mechanism, a citizen of Bangladesh who has been an advocate of the SC for not less than ten years or been in any judicial office for the same period is eligible to be appointed as a judge of the SC.

The other provision, which is merely around two years old, asks for a law that would define the mechanisms for the parliament to investigate allegations of misconduct or incapacity against an SC judge and to remove him.

The government has decided to act on the new one and the cabinet on Monday approved in principle a draft law specifying the procedure to remove a judge by the parliament.
