"Alhamdulillah, By the grace of Almighty Allah, the Mujahidin of Ansar Al-Islam (AQIS, Bangladesh branch) were able to assassin Xulhaz Mannan and his associate Samir Mahbub Tonoy," read the statement. "They were the pioneers of prac-

tising and promoting homosexuality in Bangladesh," it added. "They were working day and night to promote homosexuality among

the people of this land since 1998 with the help of their masters, the US crusaders and its Indian allies." Five machete-wielding youths,

also carrying firearms, hacked Xulhaz and his friend to death inside his Kalabagan apartment on Monday. Xulhaz, a political process ana-

lyst at the USAID, was an editor of "Roopbaan," the country's only known magazine for the cause of the LGBT (lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender) community.

The killers also stabbed the security guard of the building while entering the apartment and hacked an assistant sub-inspector of police who had got hold of one of them.

All of them managed to avoid

attack on Xulhaz and his friend suggest that it is the act of Ansar Al Islam or Ansarullah Bangla Team," said an investigator of the Detective Branch of police.

Police suspect a five-member Secretariat. sleeper cell carried out the double murder and the nature of the attack has similarity to the one which left publisher Ahmedur Rashid Tutul and two of his friends injured at his office in October last year.

Jihadology, the statement was published by the Global Islamic Media Front on August 19. It claimed Ansarullah and Ansar al Islam are separate organisations working in Bangladesh.

Yemeni forces seize main oil terminal from al Qaeda

Yemeni government forces and their Emirati allies took back control of the country's largest oil export terminal from al Qaeda on Monday, security officials said, a day after routing the militants from their nearby stronghold.

The lightning advance is a shift in strategy for the Saudi-led coalition forces, which for over a year have focused their firepower on the Iran-allied Houthis who had seized the capital Sanaa and driven the government into exile.

Authorities of Jessore Science and Technology University (JSTU) yesterday closed the university for 16 days after police charged truncheons on students at a sit-in programme on the campus that left 20 students injured.

The students had been demonstrating for the last 21 days, demanding the withdrawal of an expulsion order for a student and suspension orders for four other students. Police also detained 28 students.

The agitated students said

police asked them to withdraw the sit-in programme in front of the university administrative building and attacked them when they were leaving the spot. JSTU Vice-Chancellor Prof Abdus

Sattar said they went for the sum-

mer holidays early to avoid any untoward incidents and asked the students to vacate their dormitories. He said following an allegation of harassment of a female student,

students beat up fourth-class staff Badal in December 2015. After investigation into the incident, the Regent Board of the university on May 4 decided to fire Badal and expel a student and sus-

pend four other students for different periods for their involvement in the incident, the VC added. Students started agitation for the withdrawal of the decision, he said.

When the students went berserk yesterday, they called police and the law enforcers brought the situation

under control, the VC said.

Some students instigated the general students and started throwing brick chunks at the police when they entered the campus to rescue the VC and other officials, who were besieged by the students, Vaskar Saha, assistant commissioner of

Police charged truncheons to disperse the students and removed the barricade from Jessore-Chaugachha Road, Vaskar said.

The clash ensued when Mostafizur's group attempted to recapture the office in the evening.

Raju Ahmed was killed on the spot. Mostafizur and Abdur Rahim, joint secretary of the union, were injured and admitted to Satkhira Sadar Hospital.

The prices have been fixed at Tk 23 a kilogram of paddy and Tk 32 a kg of rice. According to government estimates,

farmers' production costs for each kg of paddy and rice have been Tk 20.70 and Tk 730." 29 respectively. In the previous years, the government

used to buy mostly rice (9/10 lakh tonnes) and barely one lakh tonne of paddy, which would benefit mainly the rice millers and middlemen with the price incentives. It's a challenging task to break free from the clutches of middlemen, said Abdul
