50,000 tonnes of wheat rejected

Consignment from Russia found substandard

The government has rejected yet another shipment of 50,000 tonnes of wheat imported from Russia on the grounds of poor quality.

The latest move came within a week of the rejection of two consignments of Russian wheat (weighing one lakh tonnes) on the same grounds.

Ilahi Dad Khan, director (procurement) at the Directorate of Food, yesterday told The Daily Star that upon tests carried on the latest consignment of wheat on April 27 "we informed the supplier ADM International that the wheat did not meet our specifications. We rejected it".

Bangladesh accepts wheat with a maximum of 0.7 percent foreign materi als (non-grain particles) but the shipment had 0.93 percent foreign materials.

The test revealed that the wheat of the consignment had "test weight" of 74.8 hectoliter against Bangladesh's set standard of 76 hectoliter. It had 12.03 percent protein content against the standard of 12.5 percent, said food officials.

"Now that we've rejected it, the supplier has to take it back," Ilahi said. A week ago the government rejected two consignments of wheat (each weighing 50,000 tonnes) sourced from Russia as it did not meet the set

specifications. A Russian official team visited Dhaka and Chittagong last week to know what was going on. Ilahi said the delegation returned home completely satisfied that "we followed due procedures in testing the imported wheat".

Asked about repeated incidents of Bangladesh being supplied with notup-to-the-standard wheat, food officials in Dhaka said they have sought explanations from two suppliers -- ADM International and Phoenix Commodities Ltd -- whose three consignments had been rejected.

Russia, a major global wheat exporter, is the prime supplier country for Bangladesh.

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GRABBING RAILWAY PROPERTY

7-yr jail for offenders

The cabinet yesterday approved the draft of the "Railway Property (Unlawful Possession Reclamation) Act-2016" with a provision of maximum 7 years of jail or fine for illegally occupying and stealing railway properties. Unlawful possession of any railway

property would be considered as a punishable offence, Cabinet Secretary Mohammad Shafiul Alam told reporters after the meeting at the secretariat.

The draft law is being formulated translating the martial law regime promulgated "Railway Property (Unlawful Possession) Ordinance-1979" into Bangla as per directives of the Supreme Court. There will be little changes in the proposed law, he said. The cabinet secretary said anyone help-

ing others in keeping railway properties under their possession illegally would be sentenced to five years of rigorous imprisonment or fine or both.

As per the proposed law, the railway security force could arrest any accused without warrant as such acts would be considered as "cognisable offences", he said.

The officer concerned in charge of the Railway Security Force could exercise

Obama poked fun at himself, the Democratic and Republican presidential candidates, and reporters. On a serious note he praised Washington Post former Tehran correspondent Jason Rezaian, released in January after 18 months in an Iranian prison.

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Office timings revised for Ramadan

There would be a 15minute prayer break from 1:15pm. The new timing would be effective for all the government, semigovernment, autonomous and semi-autonomous institutions, he said.

The Ramadan is likely to begin in the first week of next month.

Bangladesh Road Transport Authority (BRTA) wants to reduce fare by 3 paisa per kilometre for long-haul buses following the recent fuel price cut.

Bus owners, however, want that the fare be reduced by 2 paisa.

Both the parties came up with the proposals at a meeting at the BRTA office yesterday, said Nurul Islam, director (engineering) of the BRTA.

"We will send both the proposals to the ministry. The ministry will make a final decision in this regard," he told The Daily Star.

The government on April 25 cut fuel prices by Tk 3 to Tk 10. The price of diesel and kerosene has been reduced to Tk 65 from Tk 68 a litre, octane to Tk 89 from Tk 99 and petrol to Tk 86 from Tk

Currently, a passenger has to pay Tk 1.45 for travelling each kilometre on interdistrict routes.

KARWAN BAZAR FIRE

Probe report in 2 weeks

The fire service yesterday started a probe into the Karwan Bazar fire that gutted 186 shops on May Day.

Jahurul Amin, deputy director (operations) of Bangladesh Fire Service and Civil Defence, leads the fivemember committee, said Brig Gen Ali Ahmed Khan, director general of the fire service.

Jahurul said they would submit a report on the cause of the fire and extent of the damage in two weeks.

The Dhaka North City Corporation had been trying to move the market elsewhere and a section of the shopkeepers suspect that it was a case of arson.

DNCC Mayor Annisul Huq also visited the spot yesterday evening and said there was no link between the city corporation's attempt to move the market and the fire.

The fire broke out in Uttar Karwan Bazar Babosayee Janakalyan Samity (Hasina) Market, which mainly sells fruits, spices and groceries, near Janata Tower around 8:00pm. Most of the shops in the market were closed for May Day.

Locals told The Daily Star that the fire began right after a nor'wester and that they tried to douse it.

The fire engines reaching the spot ran out of water after some time, they said.

A total 26 fire engines eventually tamed the fire after two hours of effort.

Mohammad Ali Babu, owner of Star Mahbub Bedding Store said he had a tin-roofed shop in the market. His shop was on the ground floor and his storage on the first floor.

He said he lost almost everything that night and that his five employees have no jobs now.

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
