2 more killed in UP polls violence

84 killed so far STAR REPORT

Two more people, who were critically injured in violence over the fourth phase of the union parishad polls held on Saturday, died yesterday.

Around 26 people were also hurt in post-polls violence in Tangail and Jamalpur yesterday.

At least 71 people were killed and some 6,000 others injured in violence over UP polls until May 4, according to Shushashoner Jannoy Nagorik (Shujan), a citizens' platform for good governance.

Thirteen more were killed in violence as of yesterday, according to The Daily Star findings.

In Rajshahi, Zahid Hasan, 34, of Konda village in Bagmara upazila, died from his injuries at a local clinic early yesterday, said Motiar Rahman, officer-incharge of Bagmara Police Station.

With Zahid, three people were killed there in violence over the polls. On Saturday, two people were SEE PAGE 10 COL 4

Ongoing UP polls turn out to be the bloodiest

The ongoing Union Parishad polls have become the bloodiest election in Bangladesh history.

This level of intense local violence was never seen in any previous elections -- parliamentary or local -- since the independence of the country.

Widespread violence has already left 84 dead and more than 6,000 persons injured since the beginning of the polls in last March.

At least 71 persons were killed till May 4, according to Shujan, a citizen platform for good governance.

Thirteen more were killed in violence as of yesterday. In some areas, houses of rivals were also attacked and set

The violence shows an alarming rise in enmity among people based solely on political identity and it might appear

as a major threat to peace in the country. If this streak of violence continues, the death toll might rise further as two more phases of polls to 1,457 UPs are scheduled for May 28 and June 4 respectively.

In the last UP elections held in 2011, at least 27 persons were killed and 3,136 were injured in election related violence, according to Democracy Watch, a non-profit that works on democratic reforms. Its numbers are based on reports published in different newspapers.

Earlier, in 2003 UP polls, 80 persons were killed and 7,209 were injured, Democracy Watch says.

Reactions of the then EC-led by MA Sayed in 2003 and the current one-led by Kazi Rakibuddin Ahmad are opposite.

CEC Sayed-led EC had struggled for deployment of army to ensure security of the polls. But the then BNP government SEE PAGE 10 COL 2

Australia relaxes ban on freight

Cargo security at Shahjalal airport improved, claims minister

Four and a half months after imposing a ban on freight to Australia from Bangladesh, the country of the southern hemisphere has relaxed the ban, allowing Bangladeshi freight to be re-screened in a third country before reaching Australia.

In a letter to the Ministry of Civil Aviation and Tourism on May 5, the Australian High Commission in Dhaka informed the government about the relaxation of the ban that was imposed on December 19 last year, Civil Aviation and Tourism Minister Rashed Khan Menon said at a briefing yesterday.

"The Australian government's move came as a result of overall improvement of cargo security at Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport," the minister said, citing the letter.

Last fiscal year, Bangladesh exported products worth \$606.88 million to Australia, with apparel items accounting for \$533.62 million, according to data from the Export Promotion Bureau.

There is no direct cargo flight between Bangladesh and Australia.

Meanwhile, Bangladesh is still banned by the UK from sending cargo directly to the island nation. The ban was imposed in March.

However, the UK validation team, working in Shahjalal International Airport, on May 5 allowed three airlines to carry cargo to the UK and the EU countries from Bangladesh.

The upgraded security at the cargo village does not mean that the ban on direct cargo flight from Dhaka to London has been withdrawn. The freight SEE PAGE 10 COL 4

EC seeks more action to check polls violence

As violence continued with each phase of the Union Parishad polls gone by, the Election Commission has asked the home ministry to ensure a congenial atmosphere for the next phases.

"Maintaining law and order as well as ensuring voters' security, especially minorities', are the prime pre-requisites for free, fair, impartial and peaceful elections," said the EC in a letter to the home secretary on Sunday. "The letter has been sent to remind

them [ministry officials] of their duties during elections. Their cooperation is very crucial for fair polls," said EC Secretary Sirazul Islam.

The EC wrote the letter against the backdrop of violence and irregularities that took place centering on the four phases of UP elections between March 22 and May 7.

Arresting criminals, recovering arms, curbing violence, increasing police patrol and ensuring voters' security are necessary for ensuring a congenial atmosphere for the next phases, it said.

Is this the future private jet?

Private jet flying could change forever as the world's first electric vertical takeoff and landing aircraft is about to hit the market.

The egg-shaped plane, called Lilium, has been heralded as high up as the European Space Agency (ESA), who highlight its environmental benefits as well as not needing to land at an airport.

The plane takes off and lands vertically, meaning it can use helipads. The aircraft, designed in Germany, has a top speed of 250mph and a range of 300 miles.

Republican civil war deepens

Donald Trump is poised to breeze through another round of primary contests this week -- while the Republican Party splinters around him.

Trump's ascent to the top of the GOP, which was capped last week with Ted Cruz's devastating loss in the Indiana primary, happened so fast that even the billionaire himself was surprised. And the whipsawed party establishment now faces immediate choices -- none of which particularly appeal to them.

Will they unite behind their party's standard-bearer? Will they sit out the 2016 campaign? Or will they fight on, in a quixotic quest to undermine Trump?

Trump's opponents are still sorting through the wreckage of the GOP primary season for a path forward. But it has become painfully clear over the past five days that party unification will be tough to come by, if it happens at all.

Past presidents, party leaders and prominent Republicans are all choosing sides, from unenthusiastic acceptance (Bob Dole) to pledges not to vote for either party in November (former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush and Sen. Lindsey Graham) to musings about a third-party bid (Bill Kristol).

Trump himself enters his first full week as the presumptive nominee by signalling that he has limited patience for or interest in the establishment's rebellion.

He'll meet Paul Ryan on Thursday, after the House speaker's extraordinary announcement to CNN's Jake Tapper that he's "just not ready" to support Trump.

But Trump has also made quite clear he doesn't intend to cast off the provocative style on the campaign trail that alarmed the Republican establishment and resonated so deeply with primary voters.
