Jamaat ban likely in JS June session

Says Liberation War Affairs minister BSS, Dhaka

Liberation War Affairs Minister AKM Mozammel Haque yesterday said Jamaat-e-Islami might be banned and properties of executed war criminals confiscated as a bill in this regard would be placed in Jatiya Sangsad's budget session in June.

He was addressing a human chain formed in front of the capital's Jatiya Press Club by Bangabandhu Adarsha Bastabayan Sangsad protesting, what they claim, a "deep conspiracy" hatched by BNP Joint Secretary General Aslam Chowdhury and Mossad in India.

The minister demanded exemplary punishment for those "involved in a conspiracy to oust the government of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina".

Arrest killers, ensure security of minorities

Rights activists, religious leaders urge govt

Human rights activists, leaders from different religious community yesterday urged the government to arrest the killers of the Buddhist monk in Naikkhangchhari immediately as well as ensuring the security of the minority communities.

Calling for a collective move against the murder, they said people from all religions need to be united, otherwise killings would continue unabashed, while addressing a human chain in front of the Jatiya Press Club in the capital organised by Bangladesh Buddhist Federation.

U Damma Oaing Cha Bhikkhu, a 73-year-old Buddhist monk was found dead, with his throat slit, inside his temple in Bandarban on Saturday. Advocate Rana Dasgupta, general secretary of the Bangladesh

Hindu-Buddhist-Christian Oikya Parishad, said a smokescreen has been created to hide the real criminals of the recent killings.

Barrister Biplob Barua, assistant secretary of central sub committee of Awami League, said the monk's murder is a part of the series of killing and hoped that none will make any comment regarding the murder that will interrupt the investigation.

3 injured as locals protest cop raid

Three persons were allegedly injured as police dispersed Gondamara union locals protesting a raid in Chittagong's Banshkhali upazila yesterday when the 90-year-old father of a convener of a committee against a proposed coal-fired power plant was detained.

Additional Superintendent of Police Habibur Rahman claimed two locally-made "light guns" were recovered from the house of Liakat Ali, son of detainee Hazi Dudu Miyan and convener of House and Graveyard Protection Movement Committee.

Superintendent of Police (SP) Hafiz Akhter said the detainee would be released after information concerning Liakat was collected.

Liakat is one of the over 3,000 people accused in three cases, two over murder and one over assault on police, filed SEE PAGE 4 COL 4

Healthcare makes Denmark haven for mothers

Denmark was ranked the fourth best country to be a mother in Save the Children's annual Mothers' Index last year. But, what does it take to be that?

"Because you have little risks as you give birth to a baby," says Agnete Nørrelund-Madsen, a mother-of-two, aged four and

"We have an excellent healthcare system where skilled midwives and obstetricians are there. Everybody is provided quality care through taxed money, not from your pocket," she told this correspondent at Bella Centre in Copenhagen where a four-day 4th Global Conference of Women Deliver began yesterday.

The conference brought together some 6,000 participants -- politicians, govern-

academics, NGOs and media -- from across the world to discuss and find solutions to health challenges faced by women. Madsen, who works for non-profit

organisation Maternity Foundation, said a mother gets eight months of paid leave in Denmark, two before the birth and six afterwards, while a father 14 days of paternal leave after the delivery. "This makes the parents keep their child

in their close touch and care. A mother too can have the full six-month period to exclusively breastfeed her child," she said. Known for its strong management of

ecosystems and governance, Denmark maintains a strong taxation system ranging from 40 to 50 percent and provides free education and healthcare, something that
