BJP has a small presence and was not expected to win. The two most formidable women in Indian politics, Mamata Banerjee and J Jayalalithaa emerged clear winners in their states

on Thursday. Mamata Banerjee's TMC looked set to sweep West Bengal despite being closely associated with two big corruption scandals, the Narada and the Sarada scams. The TMC has won 177 seats of the 294 Assembly seats in West Bengal. Including those wins,

the TMC is leading in 212 seats. The Left's alliance with the

Congress has won a mere 60 seats and is ahead in 13, which puts it ahead in a paltry 73 seats. The Left's loss was the BJP's gain. It has actually won 3 seats here and is ahead in 2 - in 2011 it didn't win a single seat. Its vote share has actually gone up to 10% from 4% in the 2011 Assembly polls.

"These results show that the people are accepting, appreciating and supporting our pro-development ideology," Modi told supporters at his party's headquarters in New Delhi.

Assam is the first northeastern state to be controlled by the BJP, whose traditional power base is in Hindi-speaking north, central and west India.

Political analyst Ashok Malik told AFP that yesterday's results showed the BJP was now India's only truly national party.

"This expansion for the BJP comes at a time when the Congress is shrinking, even though they have different social constituencies," said Malik, a fellow with New Delhi-based Observer Research Foundation think-tank.

"And now, the BJP is the only pan-India national party, which the Congress once used to be."

The BJP needs to win state elections to gain more seats in the nation's upper house of parliament, which has been blocking reforms seen as crucial to fuelling the economic growth it has promised voters.

Most members of the upper house, which has obstructed measures such as a planned standardised goods and services tax, are indirectly elected by state legislatures.

The BJP mounted a fierce campaign in tea-growing Assam, promising to support indigenous rights and crack down on illegal immigration

from neighbouring Bangladesh. Migrants have long been accused of illegally entering the state from Bangladesh and grabbing land, causing

tensions with local people and sporadic outbreaks of communal violence. India's seven northeastern states,

joined to the rest of the country by a narrow sliver of land, are culturally distinct from the rest of the country and have a long history of separatist insurgencies.

"People were fed up and they wanted a change... that's why this time they've voted for BJP and its alliance partners," said Sarbananda Sonowal, BJP's Assam chief ministerial candidate.

Partial results showed Congress had just 26 of the total 126 seats in Assam and the BJP-led alliance had 86.

The party also made gains in Kerala in the south. Modi's party swept to power in a

general election two years ago promising business-friendly reforms to overhaul the economy, but lost out in two critical state polls in 2015.

With final results from the five states still to come in, regional parties looked set to win in Kerala and Tamil Nadu in the south.

Jubilant supporters of Tamil Nadu's popular Chief Minister Jayalalithaa gathered outside her house to celebrate, many of them painted in the

colours of the state flag. The former movie star known as "Amma" (Mother) has long enjoyed a huge following in prosperous Tamil

Nadu where she has won three terms as chief minister since 1991.

The 68-year-old has earned loyalty with a series of populist schemes including giving away gold, goats and kitchen appliances at election time, but has also drawn accusations of corruption and an autocratic govern-

ing style. Congress vice-president Rahul Gandhi, who fronted the campaigning in several states, tweeted that his party would "work harder till we win

The probe report said the headmaster physically punished a student during class hours on May 8. He later apologised to the student's family.

The family next day lodged a written complaint to the school committee against the teacher. In the complaint, the family did not mention anything about hurting anyone's religious sentiment, said a top official of the ministry, citing the report.

On May 13, a meeting was convened to discuss the utilisation of a development fund of Tk 50 lakh. But instead of discussing this, the issue of "hurting the religious sentiment" was brought up, the report mentioned.

Before the meeting, an announcement was made through loudspeakers of a nearby mosque that Shyamal had made anti-religious comments, and several thousand people gathered on the school premises, said the probe report.

The probe body termed the managing committee incompetent as it did not play its due role.

'THE MP SLAPPED ME TWICE'

"The MP slapped me twice and asked me to do squats holding ears," Shyamal told reporters at a local hospital where he is under treatment.

Narrating the incident, he said he went to the school to attend the meeting, but he found a different situation there.

Some locals beat him up around 10:30am and Salim Osman came to the place in the afternoon.

"I was so weak at that time. The lawmaker entered the room where was confined to and he slapped me in my face without saying anything."

The MP then took him out of the room and asked him to do squats ten times holding ears. "I was compelled to do so to save my life."

Asked why such an incident happened, Shyamal said some locals were conspiring against him so that he leaves the school.

He added the MP assured him of better treatment abroad if he gives a written statement supporting Salim.

Regarding the MP's claim that Shyamal did the squats on his own, the schoolteacher said that's a blatant

"He [Salim] told this just to save himself," he said, adding, "A lawmaker who can beat up a teacher should be suspended."

Shyamal thanked the education minister for reinstating him.

PROTEST CONTINUES

The jet had been flying from Paris to Cairo overnight when it disappeared off radar screens, without sending a distress signal.

French President François Hollande confirmed that the plane had "crashed" and Paris said its accident department had opened an investigation.

Cairo's state prosecutor also ordered a probe into the incident, a statement said, signalling suspicion that foul play could have caused the crash.

Egypt's Aviation Minister Sherif Fathy said he could not rule out either terrorism or a technical problem.

"I don't deny the hypothesis of a terrorist attack or something technical. It is too early," he told a news conference, adding that no wreckage had been found. "The possibility of having a differ-

According to experts, different natural factors like temperature of water, strong current, adequate rainfall and thunder shower create a congenial atmosphere for mother fishes to release eggs.

Although there was a heavy down-

pour in Chittagong on Wednesday, the

indigenous fish released a small amount of eggs yesterday, which experts termed "sample spawns". Halda expert Manzoorul Kibria said the mother fish release eggs between Baishakh and Ashar (April and June)

immediately. This year the indigenous fishes released sample spawns on April 8 and on April 21, as the atmosphere was not favourable in those phases, he said.

But the atmosphere was congenial

every year and fishermen collect those

yesterday, yet the mother fishes did not release eggs in a large scale, he added. "It is a matter of worry as to why the

mother fishes just released sample spawn despite having all the favourable natural factors," he said. Kibria, also an associate professor of zoology department at Chittagong

University, said usually the mother

fishes release sample eggs before releasing eggs in full. They do so to monitor whether the released eggs can survive. Man-made hazards like cross-

rubber dam on the river at Bhujpur and

industrial waste were destroying the spawning ground and decreasing the production of eggs, he said. "I have heard that Chittagong port has been advised to hoist a local warning signal today [yesterday] ... It's

believed that mother fishes do not

release eggs at the time of natural disasters," the Halda expert said. Mohammad Ali, another Halda researcher, echoed Kibria. He too held environmental hazards and indiscriminate catching of mother fishes responsible for the decrease in the production

of eggs.

Contacted, Sheikh Harunur Rashid, assistant met officer of Chittagong Met Office, said Chittagong Port was advised to hoist signal-4. Manzoorul Kibria said, "The fisher-

men should not be frustrated as there is still time in this season for the mother fishes to release spawn in a large scale."
