Machete attack kills 1 in Kushtia

Homeopath the latest victim of similar killing, university teacher wounded; victims known as promoters of Baul songs

Machete-wielding assailants have struck again, this time killing a homeopath and critically injuring a university teacher in Kushtia yesterday.

It comes six days after an elderly Buddhist monk was hacked to

death inside a temple in the hilly district of Bandarban.

It is not clear who carried out the attack and why, but police said it bore the hallmark of the ongoing attacks on freethinkers, secular and online activists, academics, bloggers,

writers, publishers, minorities and people of

different ideologies by suspected militants. The dead is Sanaur Rahman, 60. He died minutes after the attack.

The injured is Saifuzzaman, 42, an assistant professor of Bangla at Islamic University in Kushtia. He is in critical condition with injuries in his shoulder, neck, chest and hands. He was brought to Dhaka by an air ambulance and was admitted to the Apollo Hospitals. Doctors will operate

on him today or tomorrow. The two were

good friends, partly because of their common interest in Baul philosophy.

Three youths aged between 25 and 30 intercepted the two at a secluded place at Bottoil near Sadar

upazila around 10:45am when they were going to Sanaur's village home on a motor-



Cyclone storm Roanu may make landfall in the south-eastern coast of Bangladesh this afternoon or evening, said a special cyclone bulletin of the Met office yesterday.

"It will cross the coastal areas tomorrow [today] afternoon with moderate strength. Its impact may not be as strong as Sidr [a cyclone] but there will be rain," said the duty forecasting officer of Dhaka Met office yesterday evening.

Around 2:00am today, Roanu was about 295 kilometres southwest of Mongla Port yesterday evening and was heading towards Chittagong-Noakhali coast.

Shamsuddin Ahmed, director of Bangladesh Meteorological Department, said there had been incessant rainfall due to the cyclone. Offshore SEE PAGE 11 COL 2

The dead is Naimul Islam Naim, 14, of Koburhat Sardarpara area in Kushtia Sadar upazila.

Another "Shibir" activist, Hafizul Islam, also 14 and of the same area, was injured in the blast.

The incident happened around 11:15am when the two teenagers were going towards Koburhat Bazar on foot, according to witnesses and police.

Boro farmers at the mercy of middlemen

Buyers offer prices lower than govt-fixed rates for paddy, rice; procurement by govt yet to start

When the government had declared at the very beginning of the harvesting season that it would buy a higher volume of paddy directly from farmers, Boro growers across the country pinned high hopes on the domestic food procurement scheme.

But two weeks have gone by since the paddy and rice procurement drive was officially launched on May 5 and thousands of the Boro growers still remain at the mercy of private buyers and middlemen.

The farmers are being offered much less by the buyers and the middlemen than what the government had promised under the public procurement scheme.

The reason farmers are losing out is because in reality the government rice-buying drive has not started yet. Thanks to procedural delays, the food directorate is yet to open its silos for farmers to sell paddy and rice.

As per a late April decision, the government is supposed to complete procuring 13 lakh tonnes of paddy and rice from Boro growers between May and August.

Contacted, Ilahi Dad Khan, director (procurement) at the Directorate General of

Food, acknowledged the situation and attributed it to the district food officials not getting Boro farmers' lists from the agriculture officers concerned at the grassroots.

Golam Mawla, food controller of

Lalmonirhat, said they were not being able to start buying rice due to the delay in getting the list. It is almost the same all over the country as reflected in the official procurement

figure which has not yet reached the 500tonne mark in past two weeks. As a result, farmers' expectation to get price benefits out of the public grain pro-

curement has not met. Farmer Mohammad Hasan Ali, who reaped 37 maunds of paddy (1 maund = 37.37kgs) out of his 84 decimals of Boro

land in Tangail, couldn't be happy when he was offered Tk 600 for a maund of paddy. Though this fetched him almost no profit, Ali still cultivates paddy as he said, "Paddy cultivation does not require any-

one to invest all the money at once. Besides, I also need rice to feed my family." Afsar Ali is a farmer of Aditmari in Lalmonirhat.

Suspect shot near White House

Taken in custody

Secret Service officers yesterday shot a male suspect near a security checkpoint close to the White House after he apparently brandished a weapon, a law enforcement source said.

The suspect was shot in the abdomen and taken into custody, according to two sources familiar with the incident.

President Barack Obama was not at the White House, and Vice President Joe Biden was secured in the White House complex during the incident.

The city's EMS said a patient identified as the suspect has been transported to a local hospital with critical injuries. Another law enforcement official said investigators have located the suspect's vehicle near the shooting area.


