Same hackers hit bank in Philippines

Hackers who stole \$81 million from Bangladesh's central bank have been linked to an attack on a bank in the Philippines, in addition to the 2014 hack on Sony Pictures, cybersecurity company Symantec Corp said in a blog post.


The US Federal Bureau of Investigation has blamed North Korea for the attack on Sony's Hollywood studio.

A senior executive at Mandiant, the cybersecurity company investigating the Bangladesh Bank heist, also told Reuters the hackers had recently penetrated banks in Southeast Asia.

In at least four cases, computer hackers have been able to gain a dangerous level of access to SWIFT, the worldwide interbank communication network that settles transactions. In the blog post published on Thursday, Symantec did

not name the Philippines bank or say whether any money was stolen, but said the attacks could be traced back to October last year. It did not identify the hackers.

Obama pays tribute to Hiroshima victims

Offers no apology AFP, hiroshima

Barack Obama paid moving tribute to victims of the first atomic bomb yesterday and called for a world free of nuclear weapons, during a historic and emotional visit to Hiroshima.

In a ceremony loaded with symbolism, the first sitting US president to visit the city met survivors of the fearsome attack that marked one of the final, terrifying chapters of World War II.

"71 years ago, death fell from the sky and the world was changed," Obama said of a bomb that "demonstrated that mankind possessed the means to destroy itself".

Nine killed as bus plunges into canal

33 hurt; driver loses control after tyre puncture, vehicle hits bridge on Dhaka-Barisal highway

At least nine people were killed and 33 others injured, after a bus smashed through the side railing of a bridge and plunged into a canal in Madaripur yesterday.

The accident happened around 2:30pm when the bus was crossing the bridge in Samaddar area on Dhaka-Barisal highway, said Moniruzzaman Fakir, assistant superintendent of police (sadar circle) in the district, quoting witnesses and some of the injured.

Suddenly, one of its tyres punctured, the driver lost control over the steering and the vehicle fell around 30 feet from the bridge into the canal, he said.

Five people were killed on the spot.

The bus had around 55 passengers and was heading towards Dhaka from Pirojpur.

On information, police and fire fighters rushed to the spot, rescued the injured and took them to hospitals in Madaripur, Faridpur and Barisal Medical College Hospital.

Four of the injured died on their way to the hospitals.

Many of the injured passengers were in a critical condition and the death toll may increase, said Moniruzzaman.

Names of only five of the deceased could be known. They are Sufia Begum, 35, Hira SEE PAGE 11 COL 6 PHOTO ON PAGE 2

Global economy is 'urgent priority'

Say G7 leaders, warn of dire consequences of 'Brexit'

Pumping up the world economy is an "urgent priority" G7 leaders said yesterday, as they warned there could be dire global consequences if Britain decides to leave the EU.

The Group of Seven industrial powers cautioned that the worldwide economy was patchy and faced unwelcome headwinds, but disputes erupted over how bad things actually are and the best course of action.

Wrapping up their meeting in rural Japan, the leaders endorsed a pick-and-mix approach to dealing with the malaise that has lingered since the financial crisis erupted in

"Global growth is our urgent priority," the G7 said in a final statement.

"Taking into account country-specific circumstances, we commit to strengthening our economic policy responses in a cooperative manner and to employing a more forceful and balanced policy mix, in order to swiftly achieve a strong, sustainable and balanced growth pattern."

The strained consensus reflects behindthe-scenes clashes within the grouping of rich nations.

Prime Minister Shinzo Abe argued that the global economy faced the risk of a "crisis", and drew comparisons with the mood when Japan last hosted the exclusive club, in 2008 just months ahead of the collapse of Lehman Brothers.

His three friends injured in attack


A local Chhatra League leader was chopped to death and his three friends were injured in an attack by criminals in front of Barisal Polytechnic Institute last night.

The dead is Reza, 22, and the injured are Mehedi, 20, Maruf, 22, and Purno, 20.

Ataur Rahman, officer-incharge of Barisal Kotwali Model Police Station, said a group of criminals chopped Reza and his three friends with sharp weapons indiscriminately around 9:30pm when they were chatting in front of the institute, leaving them injured.

The four were taken to Sher-e-Bangla Medical College Hospital where Reza died of his wounds around 11:15pm, added the OC.

Saudi cleric bans selfies with cats

A senior Saudi cleric has banned people from taking pictures with cats and says taking photos in general is prohibited.

Speaking in a televised broadcast, Sheikh Saleh Bin Fawzan Al-Fawzan was asked about "a new trend of taking pictures with cats" which "has been spreading among people who want to be like the Westerners".

The sheikh initially appears incredulous, asking: "What?! What do you mean pictures with cats?" He then declares: "Taking pictures is prohibited. The cats don't matter here."

Cellphone-cancer link found in major study

A major study has suggested there is a link between mobile phones and cancer. The report is an in-depth peer reviewed study conducted by the US government and represents a significant development in longrunning controversy over how mobile phones impact on users' health.

Researchers from the National Toxicology Program exposed male rats to the type of radio frequencies which are commonly emitted by mobile phones.

Following this exposure, "low incidences" of two types of tumours were found in the animals in both the brain and the heart. Tumours were not found in rats not exposed to the frequencies. More than 2,500 rats were experimented

on at various intervals over a two year period for the study. In a report released alongside the study,
