Prices up on high demand

Commerce ministry sees no dearth in supply

Prices of some essentials whose consumption goes up during Ramadan are on the rise already despite adequate supply, much to the worries of the consumers.

Prices of chickpea, sugar, garlic, lentil and cooking oil have jumped up compared with those a year or a month ago, according to the prices quoted in the market data of the Trading Corporation of Bangladesh (TCB) yesterday.

A market analysis by the commerce ministry in the middle of May found that the supply is good enough to meet the expected demand during Ramadan staring early next month, when commodity prices are expected to rise further riding on high demand.

Market analysts say it has become a tradition that prices of almost all grocery items would skyrocket before and during the fasting month.

Aware of this, Commerce Minister Tofail Ahmed held a meeting with the Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industry, and wholesalers and retailers on May 17. He directed them to keep the market stable.

The minister said supply of all items, including rice, sugar, edible oil,

SHIPWRECKS IN MEDITERRANEAN

700 migrants feared dead in a week: UN

A week of shipwrecks in the Mediterranean culminated yesterday with 700 migrants feared dead and survivors giving harrowing testimony of dozens of small children drowned.

Survivors brought to safety in the Italian ports of Taranto and Pozzallo told the UN's refugee agency (UNHCR) and Save the Children how their boat sank on Thursday morning after a high-seas drama which saw

one woman decapitated.

"We'll never know the exact number, we'll never know their identities," said the UNHCR's spokeswoman Carlotta Sami. But multiple witness reports suggested over 500 people had drowned in that shipwreck alone.

With some 100 others missing after a boat sank Wednesday, and 45 bodies recovered from a wreck that happened Friday, the UNHCR said it feared up to 700 people had drowned in total this week.



HUMILIATION OF TEACHER

HC asks district admin to report

Orders it to give details on steps taken against those responsible

The High Court yesterday directed the district administration of Narayanganj to submit three separate and detailed reports specifying steps taken so far against the perpetrators responsible for humiliating schoolteacher Shyamal Kanti Bhakta.

The deputy commissioner and the superintendent of police of Narayanganj and the officer-in-charge of Bandar police were asked to submit the reports before the court by June 8.

Expressing dissatisfaction over the three reports submitted by the three officials concerned yesterday, the court said it would take action if the next reports were prepared insincerely.

The HC bench of Justice Moyeenul Islam Chowdhury and Justice Md Iqbal Kabir also fixed June 9 for passing further orders on the issue.

During hearing of a suo moto rule, the court said the reports submitted by the DC, the SP and the OC were not

prepared in line with the rule and order. SEE PAGE 11 COL 2

Bloodshed makes mockery of polls

The ongoing union parishad polls redefined the universal definition of election. It has also presented a new model of ballots, which matches no international standards for elections.

Now, the election, according to the new model, is no more a peaceful mechanism for people to choose their representatives casting votes.

More than 100 people were killed and a few thousands were injured in electoral violence since February. Incidents of capturing polling stations, stuffing ballot boxes and intimidating opponents were rampant in the last five phases of the elections.

More than 200 chairman candidates were elected uncontested, denying people their right to vote.

All these have surpassed the previous records and have taken the ongoing elections to an unprecedented level.

The ongoing elections mock the Universal Declaration of Human Rights of 1948 and the spirit of our constitution. Article 21 (3) of the UDHR unequivocally says that the

will of the people shall be the basis of the authority of the government; this will shall be expressed in periodic and genuine elections which shall be by universal and equal SEE PAGE 11 COL 1
