## 3 brothers convicted

One gets death sentence, 2 others jail until death

The war crimes tribunal yesterday convicted three brothers from Habiganj of crimes against humanity and handed down death penalty to one of them and jail until death to the others.

"The accused persons being members of local Razakar Bahini took extremely culpable stance against the pro-liberation civilians of the locality," the court said in its verdict.

All the four charges brought against the three -- Muhibur Rahman Boro Mia, Mujibur Rahman Angur Mia and their cousin Abdur Razzak -- were proved, it said.

Muhibur, 65, was awarded death sentence while his younger brother Mujibur, 60, and cousin Razzak, 60, were sentenced to jail until death for their involvement in the killing of a freedom fighter and abduction of another freedom fighter who never returned.

Regarding the execution of Muhibur who shot dead freedom fighter Rajab Ali on November 11, 1971, the three-member tribunal led by Justice Anwarul Haque said he could be executed "by hanging or shooting". SEE PAGE 10 COL 2

#### TECHNICAL GLITCH Airtel network disrupted for 20 hours

A large number of subscribers of Airtel in Dhaka and 10 other districts faced network disruption for around 20 hours from 8:53pm Tuesday because of a technical glitch at its switches.

The carrier said the network was restored around 6:30pm yesterday and subscribers who did not have signal bars were back online.

In a statement, Airtel said they were deeply sorry for the unintended inconvenience caused to the customers. It sent texts to their customers apologising.

The glitches, however, had no connection with the deadline of biometric SIM reregistration, said the fourthlargest operator.

Some 1,000 stations of the carrier in Dhaka and some other districts faced the disruption.

## MPs can't be at helm without election: HC

From now on, no lawmaker can become chairman of the governing body of any private school and college without elections.

MPs cannot even nominate anybody for the post. The High Court yesterday declared illegal

the rules that were allowing them to become chiefs of the committees of the educational institutions. A lawmaker, however, can become the

chairman through election to the governing body, and that too, of maximum four educational institutions, ruled the court while

delivering a verdict on two writ petitions. There are allegations that several ruling

party lawmakers flout government rules to become chairmen of governing bodies of private educational institutions in their constituencies.

They also allegedly nominate their relatives for the post in a bid to appoint teachers of their choice.

There are over 18,500 non-government secondary schools in the country and all of them are being run by their governing bodies.

Yesterday, the HC scrapped the special governing body of the capital's Viqarunnisa Noon School and College led by Civil Aviation

and Tourism Minister Rashed Khan Menon. The court also asked the authorities concerned of the government to create an SEE PAGE 10 COL 5

#### Fruit bagging to ensure chemical-free mangoes

Fruit bagging is gaining popularity among the mango growers in the district as an effective alternative to chemical pesticides.

A good number of farmers are also using pheromone traps to hang among plants for catching pests.

More farmers are adopting these two eco-friendly methods after successful use of these at different orchards last year, said scientific officers at the Regional Horticulture Research Station in Chapainawabganj.
